

Medford High Tracksters First In Rotary Relays at Grants Pass

Grants Pass — Medford High school's track and field contingent, garnering five first places and scoring heavily in three of the 14 events, triumphed here Saturday in the 14th running of the Rotary club meet.

The Black Tornado rolled to 166 9/10 points to outdistance its closest adversary, Grants Pass, by a fraction over 37 counters. GP's host team Cavemen recorded 129 1/5.

Rogue River edged Ashland by one-fifth point for third spot. The Chieftains tabulated 35 7/10 while the Grizzlies picked up 35 1/2. Eagle Point scored 21, Myrtle Creek 20 1/5, Phoenix 10 and Weed, Calif., 7 1/2.

Only Medford and Grants Pass entered full teams.

Hill Sets Record

One meet record fell. The Tornado's Jim Hill, who had been sidelined for two weeks by a boil and blood poisoning, leaped 22 feet 8 3/4 inches in the broad jump. The old mark of 22-1 was set by Medford's Len Griggs in 1960.

Other Twister blue ribbons were won by Dennis Brumback with 4:51.4 in the mile

and 2:05.8 in the half-mile, by Steve Toews with 54.5 in the quarter-mile and by Mike Dieble with 10.1 in the 100-yard dash.

Grants Pass grabbed firsts in four events with Bob Shepard taking the high jump at 5-10 and the low hurdles with a 19.8, terrific on the soft track, with Gary Van Koten soaring 13 feet in the pole vault and with the 880-yard relay crew of Steve White, Brad Lewis, Fred Perry and Shepard rounding in 1:37.2.

Ashland's Tom Huff won the javelin with 191-4 1/2.

Salyer Winner

The smaller schools did themselves proud. Don Salyer, Rogue River, was first in the high hurdles in 15.1 with Sam Charters, Eagle Point, taking second. Chris Jones, gained another first for the Chieftains with 23.0 in the 220. Jon Granby was the shot put victor for Phoenix with 51-1 1/2. Ross Barkhurst, Myrtle Creek, had top distance in the discus with 138-4 1/2.

After eight events Medford held a narrow lead of just 80 1/2 to 79 on Grants Pass. But, the Black Tornado col-

lected 26 points in the broad jump and then 22 in the half-mile to pull well ahead. Earlier the Tornadoes had collected 19 counters in the quarter-mile.

Jim Cain took second for Medford behind Hill in the broad jump with 21-9 5/8. Toews was second behind Brumback in the half and Jim Snodgrass was fourth for Medford. In the quarter Snodgrass took a second and Gary Griffin a sixth.

Equal School Mark

Hammons and DeWayne Turpin each pole vaulted a school record equalling 12-9 for Medford. On the scoring basis of least misses, Hammons was second in the event and Turpin fourth. GP's Tom Sparlin, who also went 12-9, gained third place points.

In addition to his two firsts and anchor on the relay team, Shepard was second by inches over Medford's Hill in the 100-yard dash.

Grants Pass was one-two-three in one event with Al Hutchins second and Terry Crenshaw third.

Ashland gained a double in the javelin when Dean Jackson was second with 183-11.

Despite the slow time of the mile, Brumback won the event easily.

Charters set three Eagle Point school records with 75.5 in the high hurdles, 20-8 in the broad jump and 20.3 in the low hurdles. He was second in the lows, as well as the highs, yesterday and fourth in the broad jump. He was six inches over the Eagle

Beavers Score Dual Track Wins Over Idaho, Cougars

Corvallis, Ore. — (UP) — Oregon State's Beavers scored rain-swept dual track meet victories over Washington State and Idaho Saturday.

The Beavers defeated the Cougars 89-46 and topped the Vandals 81-9. The meet was not scored on a three-way basis.

Norm Hoffman, Morgan Groth and Tom Wyatt turned in impressive performances for Oregon State despite a steady rain and low temperatures.

Hoffman won the mile run in 4:08.9. Groth captured the 880-yard run in 1:51.1 and Wyatt took first in the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.3. Wyatt's time tied his school's record for the event.

In all, the Beavers took 10 first places in the 17 events. The Cougars gained six and the Vandals one.

Elif Fredrickson and John Champlin were double winners for Washington State. Fredrickson winning the triple and broad jumps and Champlin coming in first in the 440 and 220-yard dashes.

Idaho's only first was provided by Paul Henden in the two-mile run in 9:14.4.

Sandy Koufax Strikes Out 14 In Two-Hitter

The most important figures in the National League Friday — far more significant than the mere standings — showed that Sandy Koufax had struck out 28 batters and allowed only 12 hits in 23 innings.

Add 'em up and they mean that the Los Angeles Dodgers' southpaw fireballer is fully recovered from the finger injury that cost the Dodgers the 1962 pennant and almost ended Koufax's career. They also mean that despite a faltering start the Dodgers are A-1 set for the long haul with Koufax and Don Drysdale to fire away as the league's best 1-2 pitching punch.

Koufax, sidelined virtually the entire second half of the 1962 season and winless after July 12, struck out 14 batters and pitched a two-hitter Friday night to give the Dodgers a 2-0 victory over the Houston Colts.

The ratio of strikeouts to innings pitched has always been the way to judge Koufax because of his blinding speed. He struck out an NL record of 269 batters in 258 innings in 1961 and had 218 strikeouts in 184 innings when he had a 14-4 record halfway through the 1962 campaign.

Bear Squad Tops Huskies

Seattle — (UP) — Showing mid-season form, the California track team swept past Washington here Saturday 8 1/2 to 6 1/2.

The Huskies, hampered by bad weather during practice, managed to hold their own in the field events, but were overpowered in the races.

The most exciting event was the last race, the mile relay, which saw Washington nip the Bears by inches.

Dale Rubin, California anchor man, started the final lap of the race 20 yards behind the last Husky runner, Steve Oldfield. Rubin looked as though he would make up the distance in a fantastic comeback, but Oldfield held on for the win.

The amazing New York Mets won their second straight game after eight consecutive losses Saturday by beating the Milwaukee Braves and Warren Spahn, 3-1.

Lefty Al Jackson scattered seven hits and also chipped in with a key hit for the Mets. The Braves scored their only run on a homer by Tommie Aaron.

The Mets presented Jackson with an early 2-0 lead against Spahn, the top southpaw pitcher in National League history. They scored once in the first on singles by Ron Hunt, Frank Thomas and Gil Hodges, then went ahead 2-0 in the second on a homer by Norm Sherry.

In the seventh, the Mets scored their insurance run when Al Moran singled and Jackson, after first fouling off an attempted bid, looped a hit-run single over the Milwaukee infield. Moran went to third on the hit and scored on Jim Hickman's single up the middle.

Bob Friend of the Pitts-

burgh Pirates allowed only four hits in subduing the Cincinnati Reds, 4-2. The Pirates broke a 2-2 tie with two runs in the seventh inning. One run scored on a sacrifice fly and the other came on a clutch single by Bill Virdon. Vada Pinson homered for the Reds.

Roy Sievers collected a triple, a double and a single in sparking the Philadelphia Phillies to a 6-2 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals. Relevoer Jack Baldschun held the Cards hitless for four innings to preserve the victory for rookie southpaw Marcelino Lopez.

The Chicago Cubs handed Billy Pierce his first loss at San Francisco's Candlestick park by blanking the Giants, 4-0. Pierce, who had won 14 straight games at Candlestick, gave up five hits and all of Chicago's runs before being chased in the fifth inning.

Bob Buhl limited the Giants to a pair of singles but needed relief help from Lindy McDaniel in the ninth inning when he developed a sore shoulder. Buhl highlighted his performance by twice striking out Willie Mays and Willie McCovey.

Five of Houston's runs were unearned, partly as a result of two errors by Maury Wills, who finished the game with three miscues.
