

Rogue River Group Discusses Translator

Rogue River - Richard Niquette, chairman, told a group of about 35 people here last week about the importance of obtaining new members for the Rogue River Translator association. He also pointed out that present members should keep their pledges.

The association has been formed to help obtain a translator so residents of Wards Creek, Fielder lane area, Highway 99 north to Frontier Trailer court, Foothills, Rogue River, Evans Creek area and parts of Old Stage rd. may receive a sharp picture from Channel 10, Medford.

The amount of money required to build the translator is approximately \$2,000. So far about one-half of this amount has been collected.

The deadline for starting the project is May 4, but if possible the association wants to have the amount collected by the last of April to have time to complete the necessary book work.

Park and Recreation District Proposed in White City Area

White City—A park and recreation district was proposed to more than 20 residents of the Cascade village area, who attended a meeting at the White City Realty offices last week.

According to John Laden, manager and spokesman for the company, the company is prepared to start on construction of a semi-public swimming pool and bath house and deed a piece of land of 8 or 9 acres for a park.

He told the village residents that White City Realty would build the swimming pool 20 feet wide at the deep end, 40 feet wide at the shallow end and 80 feet long complete with filter system, surrounding sidewalks, six-foot high fence and bath house facilities.

Would Dig Well

Laden added that the company would dig a well and install a pump to furnish water for irrigation of the park and provide water for the pool. The company indicated it would prefer that the district, which would own the park lands as well as the pool, do the landscaping, but the company would level the land.

The facility would be deeded to the park and recreation

district, should it be decided to form one, in exchange for an agreement to pay for the bath house within a five-year period, or longer if the district issued bonds.

The estimated cost of the pool and bath house was quoted about \$32,000 to \$35,000, with the district paying a maximum of \$11,500. Laden pointed out that the pool was as large as it could be without installing a larger chlorinator and running into higher operating expenses. It will be about 1,800 square feet and handle about 50 people at a time, he said.

Asks Appointment

Laden asked the group to appoint a chairman and consider the possibility of forming such a district. The district's board of directors would decide the size of the district, formation of policies, and how to pay off the note, Laden said.

He also told the group that the swimming pool would be for the use of the district people, and it could revert back to the White City Realty company if not so used.

Since it would take at least 90 days to form a district, Laden said the company was ready to start immediately so

the pool could be used this summer.

Volunteering to serve on a committee to study the idea were Charles Coon, chairman; Floyd Norton, Jack Masson, Mrs. Max Ross, Mrs. Joyce Day, and Dean Buckinger.

Frank Reich asked the group present to consider the possibility of forming an incorporated city instead of a fourth district in the area. Reich is now chairman of the sanitation district, and told the group he felt they should incorporate as a city before their problems became too large with the increase of population.

The group decided, however, to continue the investigation of a district, but asked that more information be brought concerning the incorporation as a city.

Institute Plans In Conjunction With Plays Made

Ashland - "From Stones to Spheres" is the title of a special course in renaissance philosophy which will be taught for the Institute of Renaissance studies in conjunction with the Oregon Shakespearean Festival productions this summer.

Dr. Arthur Kreisman, director of general studies and chairman of the Southern Oregon college humanities division, will instruct the course. Class sessions will be conducted July 29 through August 3 from 9 to 11 a.m. in the Trinity hall of the Ashland Episcopal church.

The course will concentrate on an examination of the concept of order in life and taught as it was understood and applied in Renaissance England, affecting not only religion and politics, but the arts and personal ethics.

Students will study specific Shakespearean plays in terms of the philosophical background developed throughout the course.

Registration for institute courses will begin July 13 under the direction of Dr. Marjorie Baily. They may be taken for college credit by contacting the registrar at the college for details concerning tuition and fees.

Other courses listed for the summer include such specialized areas as: "Shakespeare-Drama of Manners," "History-Sinews of War," "Renaissance Tudor Drama," "Renaissance Art-Portraiture," "Character Patterns-The Scholar," and several excursions into Elizabethan staging, acting, and music.

Opening of the area will culminate months of controversy over the need for additional off-street parking facilities in the downtown area, a question which at one time threatened to scuttle the newly-adopted city zoning ordinance.

City-Operated Lot In Grants Pass To Open on Monday

Grants Pass—A city-operated off-street parking lot with 81 metered stalls will be opened in downtown Grants Pass with ribbon-cutting ceremonies scheduled for 9 a.m. Monday.

Mayor Charles B. Gill, Jr., and local businessman Phillip Heydenburk will cut the ribbon, symbolizing the co-operation between city and business community which brought about establishment of the lot. Music for the dedication will be provided by the Grants Pass High school pep band.

Regulations set up by the city council provide that meter hours will extend from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., the same as provided for on-street parking. Parking will be five cents per hour with no maximum other than meter limitations. Meters will take nickels, dimes and quarters, giving one, two or five hours in parking time.

Eagle Point—A pre-school clinic will be held at the Eagle Point Primary school April 24 from 10 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 3:30 p.m.

The clinic is primarily for children not under regular health supervision by a family physician, but who will need a physical examination before entering first grade next fall.
