Forest Grove - Dr. William R. Baldwin of Indiana university, Bloomington, has been named dean of the Pacific university College of Optometry. President M. A. F. Ritchie has announced.

A graduate of Pacific university and the Pacific university College of Optometry, Dr. Baldwin returns to Pacific and Forest Grove from a post as assistant professor of optometry at Indiana university. He is presently completing work on his doctor of philosophy degree.

He will assume the post upon the retirement of Dr. James Wahl, who has been dean at the college since 1955.

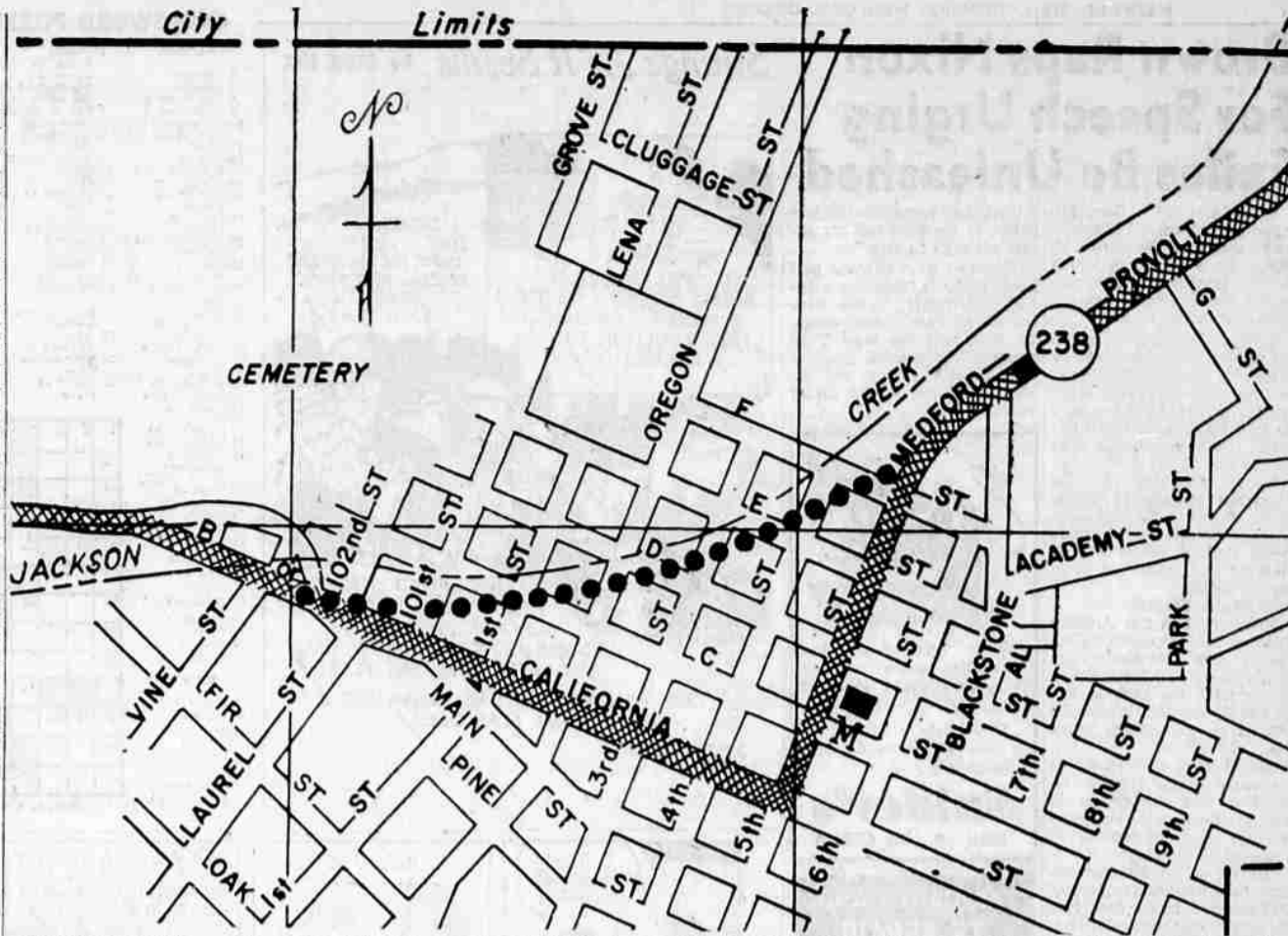
French Playwright Said Out of Danger

Cocteau suffered a heart attack at his Paris home at the beginning of this week.

The petition was filed by the Oregon Board of Aeronautics, the public utility commissioner, the cities of Klamath Falls, Lakeview, Eugene, Medford, North Bend, and Redmond, and the Chambers of Commerce of Klamath and Lake counties.

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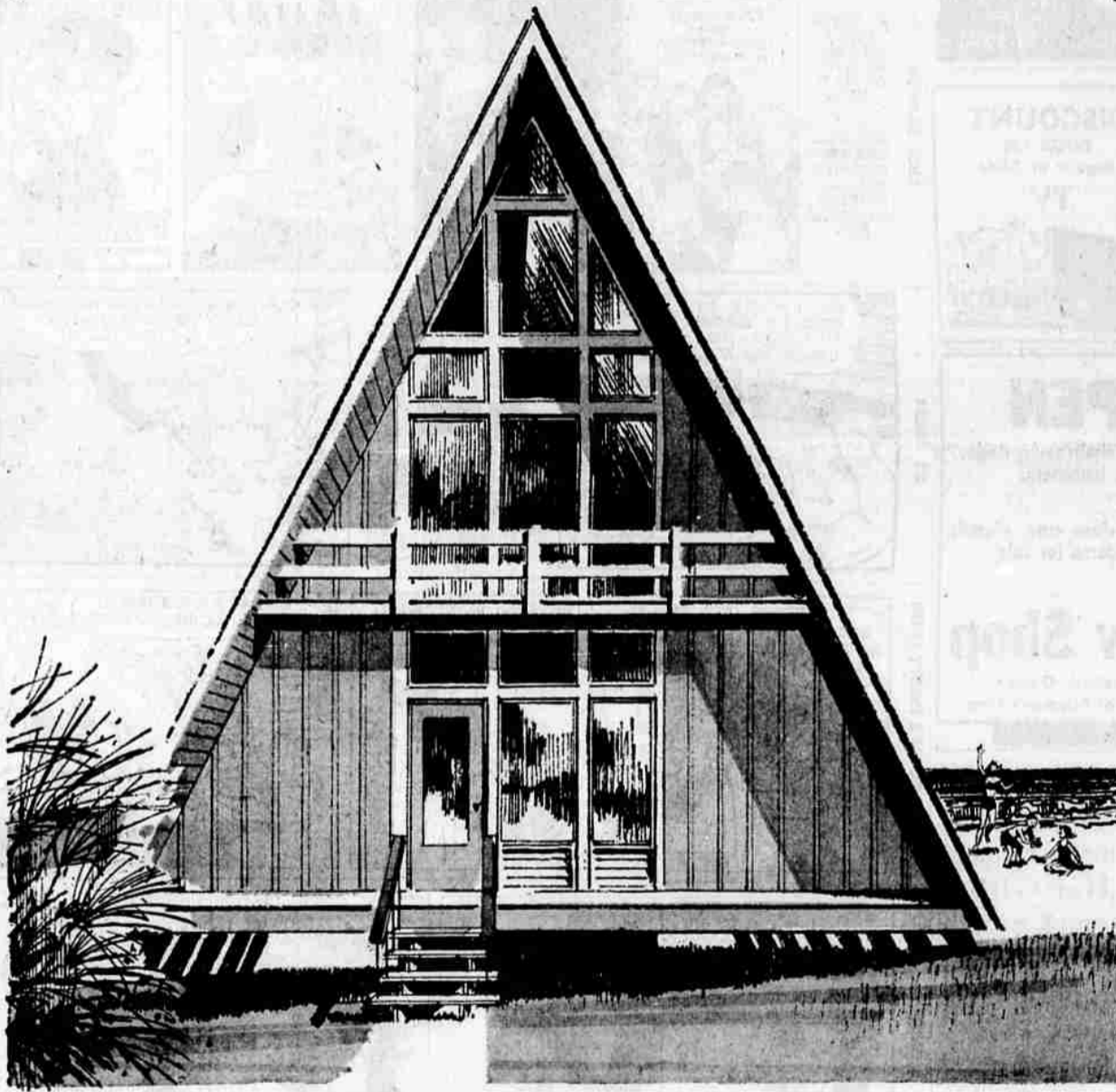

Memorial Dinner Set by Council

Portland - "Man conquers nature not by force but through understanding," is the theme of a banquet to be held Saturday, May 4, by the World Affairs Council and the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry in tribute to Max Lehmann, prominent businessman and board member of both organizations, who died recently.

The Max Lehmann Memorial dinner, which will take place at the Benson Hotel, features as guest speaker Gerard Piel, editor and publisher of "Scientific American," who will speak on "The Challenge of Science to Freedom," in the midst of a three-day conference on "Challenges to Americans" sponsored by World Affairs Week.

Formerly science editor of Life magazine, Piel is the author of "Science in the Cause of Man." He is a trustee of the American Museum of Natural History, president of the Salk Institute for Biological Studies, and a director of the American Civil Liberties union.

Following Piel's address, other guest conference members will join in comments and discussion. Dr. Peter Oregard, who speaks earlier in the day on "Challenges to American Freedoms," Dr. Chalmers Johnson, an authority on "The Challenge in Asia," and Dr. Dorothy Lee, cultural anthropologist at Iowa State college and San Fernando State college, will participate in this session. Dr. Frank Munk, World Affairs Week conference chairman, will moderate.
