Kiwanians Are Told More Heaters May Be Brought to Area

As a result of this year's freezes, more heaters are going to be brought into the Rogue valley, Clifford B. Cordy, Jackson county horticultural agent, ventured Wednesday in a talk at the noon luncheon of Medford Kiwanis club.

He indicated that, with the fruit price structure the way it is, the fruit industry cannot stand a situation like this year's freezes and survive. Cordy reported that there are now 6,000 heaters in the valley.

Using a chart and showing a sample, Cordy reviewed stages of bud, blossom and young fruit development and told of the effects of freezes at various stages. He reported that some orchards lost quite a few buds in the early stage and that quite a few were lost again at a later stage.

In Tender Stage Last Saturday, with buds in tender stage and temperatures down to 22 degrees in some places, considerable damage was suffered. Most of the orchards heated came through with a minimum of damage and still have a crop, Cordy said. He called the freeze a "real tough" one.

Cordy spoke of the cold and wet weather during the bloom season hurting pollination by holding down bee activity. After the first drop of fruit, a fair preliminary estimate

300 Million Board Feet of Logs Sold

The bureau of land management has sold 300,436,000 board feet of storm damaged timber in western Oregon, according to Travis M. Tyrrell, chief of forest management in Oregon and Washington.

The Medford district by April 15 had sold 8,259,000 board feet of the total, and a total of 17,867,000 board feet had been prepared for sale.

The volume reported by Tyrrell includes concentrated as well as scattered patches of down timber resulting from the Columbus Day windstorm. In addition, BLM has another 978,489,000 board feet of salvage and intermingled green timber cruised, appraised and ready for sale.

The permanent county court quickly followed this action with their own resolution setting the public hearing.

All matters considered by the acting county court were routine: recommendation on liquor licenses, the road vacation and consideration of a jet boat purchase for the sheriff's marine patrol.
