Ashland - Southern Oregon college's Red Raiders split with the Portland State college Vikings Saturday, giving the Vikings the week end baseball series by two games to one.

Portland State won a single game Friday 4-2. On Saturday SOC won the first game 3-2 and Portland State the second 4-3.

In the opening game Friday afternoon Portland State took an early lead which it maintained throughout the game. In the first inning Terry Yamauchi of Portland scored on a fielder's choice and a smoothly executed squeeze bunt by Bob Stamos.

In the fourth inning the Vikings went on their final scoring spree as they brought three runs home to score. Southern Oregon's pitcher Dave Hughes had difficulty finding the strike zone as he walked two men and hit one with a man on base, forcing in a run. Jim Hollingsworth brought the final two runs in as he sent the ball down to the shortstop who bobbled it.

In the opener of Saturday's double header both Portland runs came in the first and second innings. In the first Terry Yamauchi tagged a short single and came in on Bob Stamos' single that followed. The second run came as Gary Linn smashed a long double into the left field fence. Linn came home as Bill Heckaman sent another double out.

Southern Oregon's runs came in the third, sixth, and ninth innings. Damien Rossetto opened the scoring for SOC as he went to first on a fielder's choice and scored on Harley Dickerson's drive in the center field. The second and tying run of the morning came as Dickerson tagged a single and was brought home by Paul Blinks's two base hit.

After two innings of extra play Don Johnson, the Raiders' pitcher, went to first on a PSC error. The second batter grounded out to first leaving a man on second and one out. Damien Rossetto singled, bringing Johnson to third. Harley Dickerson brought Franks in on a single and Rossetto scored on a PSC error.

Americans Boost Pan-Am Games Medal Haul To 44

Sao Paulo, Brazil - 476 - American athletes won three events in the opening track and field competition of the Pan American Games Saturday and Roy Saari and Robyn Ann Johnson set swimming records to help boost the United States gold medal haul to 44.

Willey White of Chicago also set a Pan American Games women's broad jump record with a winning leap of 20 feet, 2 inches. Dave Davis of Canoga Park, Calif., won the shot put with a toss of 60 feet, 9 inches and Gene Johnson of Fresno, Calif., took the high jump with a 6-foot, 11-inch performance.

Other American representatives also fared well. The U. S. baseball team kept its championship hopes alive by beating Mexico, 4-3; the Yank water polo team drubbed Canada, 9-0; Americans finished second in the shot put, 5,000-meter run and the women's



javelin finals, and platform divers Bobby Webster and Linda Lee Cooper led their respective men's and women's competition at the half-way mark.

The 23-year-old Miss White's broad jump broke the old Pan American mark of 18 feet, 9 1/2 inches set by America's Anne Smith in the 1959 games at Chicago. Edith McGuire of Atlanta placed third in this event with a leap of 17 feet, 11 1/4 inches. Miss White and Miss McGuire also qualified for the 100-meter dash final.

The other American track and field medal winners were: Billy Joe Coatsville, Pa., who was runnerup to Davis in the shot put with a toss of 58 feet, 3 1/4 inches; Charles Clark of Santa Ana, Calif., and Bob Schul of Los Angeles, who finished second and third in the 5,000-meter race; and Frances Davenport of Ft. Sam Houston, Tex., second in the women's javelin throw.

Ralph Boston of Laurel, Miss., the U. S. broad jump champion, missed out in a quest for a medal placed fourth in the high jump.

Giants Blow 5-0 Lead, Lose To Milwaukee In 12 Innings

United Press International Relief pitcher Claude Raymond made his first major league hit a smashing double down the third base line Saturday that brought home Frank Bolling in the 12th inning to give the Milwaukee Braves a 6-5 victory over the San Francisco Giants.

However, the win wasn't cinched until after pitcher Tony Cloninger, who committed two wild pitches in the Giant's half of the 12th, finally got pinchhitter Matty Alou to foul out to catcher Del Crandall with the bases loaded.

A total of 40 players, including 13 hurlers, were used in the contest. Bolling put the winning run on base when he led off the 12th by cracking a single off Gaylord Perry. Two infield outs advanced the Braves' second baseman to third and he tallied when Raymond sent a hard shot into left field.

The Milwaukee pitcher had been hitless for the Braves ever since he started pitching for them in 1961.

Larry Jackson pitched a seven-hitter and drove in the winning runs with a fourth-inning double as the Chicago Cubs downed the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-2. Back-to-back doubles by Clay Dalrymple and Bobby Wine produced both Philadelphia runs in the fifth inning.

Mantle Returns To Lineup But Others Hit The Homers

United Press International Mickey Mantle returned to the New York Yankees' lineup for the first time in more than two weeks Saturday, but Joe Pepitone, Tom Tresh and Cleo Boyer supplied the home runs that enabled Ralph Terry to defeat the Cleveland Indians, 8-1.

Pepitone and Tresh hit their homers off loser Dick Donovan with bases empty while Boyer connected with the bases full off southpaw Ron Nischwitz in the eighth inning.

It was the second grand slam homer of Boyer's major league career, his first one coming a year ago today off Pete Burnside, then with Washington.

Terry stopped the Indians on six hits for his third victory against one defeat. He struck out six, did not walk a batter and yielded Cleveland only one run.

Two of the markers were on a Mullen three-baser and Bottger and Mark Kinney singles in the second inning. An error helped the scoring.

Singles by Andy Maurer and Hall and an error recorded the Cougar run in the fourth panel.

Jim Brennan tripled for Medford and Sid Hemphill got the other hit for Prospect.

Umps Told To Relax Balk Rule

Cincinnati, Ohio - (UPI) - President Warren Giles of the National league today ordered his umpires to relax the rigid enforcement of the balk rule.

After polling National league managers, Giles issued a statement that henceforth: "I am instructing our umpires to require the pitcher, in a set position, to come to a 'stop' but disregard the requirement of 'at least one second'."

That brought the National league interpretation of the rule in strict conformity with the manner in which it is enforced in the American league.

Rigid enforcement of the balk rule this spring has created a furor among pitchers and managers. More than 70 balks had been called in National league games, compared to only two in the American league.
