The May issue of Sunset magazine carries an article on Crater Lake National park, which is illustrated with snow pictures, depicting the striking panorama, which is characteristic of every spring at the rim of Crater Lake.

One large photo, with Wizard island the central interest, was taken last May and shows the light snow on the island and rim, but trees free of snow.
