Judge Miller Speaks at Meeting of Committee

The steadily decreasing revenue with which to meet regular services and the ever-increasing demands for additional and new services are the two basic developments responsible for the problems now plaguing Jackson county, Judge Earl Miller told a meeting of the governmental operations committee of the Medford Chamber of Commerce last week.

Miller stressed particularly the importance of O and C funds to the county economy and voiced regret that this source is steadily being reduced.

He warned that there are strong interests working to change the formula for distributing these funds in such a way as to reduce the funds or remove them entirely. The revenue from O and C funds is now down \$140,000 from 1962, Miller stated.

Urges Listeners

The county judge urged his listeners to be on guard against raids on O and C funds and to keep in mind that to replace the O and C funds allocated to Jackson county last year would have required a levy of at least 21 mills.

With real property already carrying an excessive tax load, a county levy of this nature would be a very serious matter, Miller maintained.

Attending the meeting with Miller were Otto Bohnert of the county budget committee and former county commissioner, Chester Wendt. Committee Chairman Robert D. Heffernan, Jr., thanked the guests for bringing a first hand report to the meeting.

Don McNeil spoke in opposition to Senate Joint Resolution No. 27, which would set up an interim committee of 11 to study the adequacy of existing tourist facilities in Oregon. He said the resolution would give the committee the power to employ personnel, to submit expenses to the Secretary of state and to spend up to \$50,000 for the study. McNeil maintained that the highway department is doing a good job in this area and that the expenditure would constitute a further raid on highway funds.

The committee unanimously voted to oppose the resolution.

Gilkey Attends Denver Convention

Denver — Richard W. Gilkey, director of the Curriculum Materials Center in Jackson county, was a key figure in the 40th anniversary convention of Audiovisual Instruction in Denver, concluding Friday.

About 3,000 educators from schools and colleges of the United States and foreign visitors participated in the convention at which equipment valued at more than half million dollars was displayed.

Demonstrations of team teaching, documentary reports of developments in foreign language teaching and talks by school superintendents about the introduction of communications technology in school systems were included.

Also attending the convention was James McDonald, former director of the Jackson County Curriculum and Materials Center. McDonald moved to Eugene to become director of the Lane county center.

Fraud Detection Among Topics for Bankers of Area

"Fraud Detection, Embezzlement and Robbery of Banks" was the subject of the last in a series of seminars heard last week at the Hedrick Junior High school given by the Rogue Valley chapter, American Institute of Banking.

C. R. Walker, assistant auditor of the United States National Bank from Portland, and James Mulaney, from the local office of the federal bureau of investigation, were the featured speakers.

Walker explained the authority of an auditor, the scope of an examination and the purposes and objectives of an audit. "The auditors prime goal is to prevent," he said. He explained that a crime occurs when there is temptation, duress, and opportunity.

It is the auditors duty to take away the temptation and the opportunity. This is done by regular audits to establish good internal control. A few of the methods to accomplish this are dual control of records, several personnel completing one transaction, a well defined policy of screening employees, and compulsory bad checks. He explained that most robbery cases are committed by one man who is not disguised.
