

Balk Helps Mets Beat Dodgers; Giants Win, End Losing Streak

Who says they've eased the balk rule?

National League President Warren Giles tried, but apparently he didn't get through to his umpires.

They set a National League record Monday night by calling the 77th and 78th balks of the season and also set Casey Stengel to doing cartwheels because one of those balks gave the New York Mets a 4-2 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Dodger reliever Ed Roebuck balked home the winning run during a three-run rally in the seventh inning after winner Roger Craig had erased the old mark of 76 in a single season by balking home a run in the second inning.

"I thought they had eased the rule," said a dejected Roebuck after the game. "I still don't know what the interpretation is."

Craig Perplexed Too
Craig, who beat his former teammates for the first time, was perplexed too, although happier than Roebuck because he won.

"I didn't think I balked," said the lanky Met right-hander. "I was sure I stopped before I delivered the ball. But the umpire Al Barlick said I didn't."

Dodger Manager Walt Alton said both Roebuck and Craig had balked.

"Neither of them stopped," he said. "Even under the revised interpretation of the rule, both were guilty of balks."

According to Giles' newest directive, pitchers still are required to come to a stop in their delivery when there is a runner on base, but they need not stop "at least one second" as was the case previously.

Stengel, against the rule from the start, said he understood it perfectly "but so explain it to my pitchers."

Anyway, Roebuck's seventh

inning balk allowed Charley Neal to trot home with the winning run from third base and ended the Mets' three-game losing streak.

Rookie Ed Kranepool started the winning rally with a double to open the seventh and after Neal bunted safely, loser Bob Miller uncorked a wild pitch that tied the score. Neal advanced to third on Al Moran's single and came home after Roebuck relieved Miller and committed a balk.

The San Francisco Giants snapped a three-game losing streak with a 4-3 victory over the Philadelphia Phillies in the only other NL game played. Rain washed out scheduled games between the Houston Colts and Pittsburgh Pirates and Chicago Cubs and Cincinnati Reds.

In the American League, the Washington Senators beat the Los Angeles Angels, 9-3, in the first game of a twilighter but lost the second game, 13-8.

The only other scheduled games between the Chicago White Sox and New York Yankees, and Baltimore Orioles and Minnesota Twins were rained out.

Mays Belts 100th Triple
Willie Mays belted the 100th triple of his career in the third inning and came home with the winning run on Orlando Cepeda's single off loser Cal McLish. Former Oriole Jack Fisher was picked for 10 hits by the Phillies, who dropped their third straight, but went the distance for his first NL victory.

Chuck Hinton drove in three runs with a homer and a single to pace the Senators to their victory in the opener over the Angels. Bob Turley suffered his third straight loss to Los Angeles, although a two-base throwing error by reliever Julio Navarro opened the gates for a four-run Washington rally in the fifth. Don Rudolph hurled an eight-hitter for his first victory.

The Angels came from behind with six runs in the seventh to salvage the nightcap. Albie Pearson collected three hits to pace the winner's 14-hit attack. Mel Nelson was the winning pitcher and Jim Hannan the loser.

Howard Scroggin won the medalist playoff with 81-873 to Leo Villarino's 104-19-85. Other flight finals completed during the past week had the following results:

Ralph Dupas Gets Split Decision Over Denny Moyer

New Orleans—(UPI)—Ralph Dupas showed his appreciation by kneeling in the ring and praying after the split decision was announced.

A crowd of 5,028 paid \$29-112.50 to see the championship bout, the second title match to be fought in New Orleans in 46 years.

"I knew it was now or never," Dupas said after the fight. "After two previous losses in championship matches, a third defeat would have been like a third strike in baseball."

Particularly gratifying to Dupas was the fact that he was able to sew up the crown in his hometown, where he began fighting as a 14-year-old Golden Glover in 1950.

It was the 99th professional victory for Dupas, compared with 18 defeats and six draws. Moyer entered the match with 35-1 record.

Dupas' previous lost title matches to Joe Brown and welterweight Emil Grifflin. Moyer had defended his title, once, defeating Stan Harrington earlier this year in Honolulu.

Although the fight contract contained no provisions for a return match, Moyer said he understood Dupas had agreed to give him a rematch if he won. Moyer was guaranteed 35 per cent of the gate, or \$7,500, and Dupas was guaranteed 20 per cent.

Moyer outweighed Dupas 154 to 151.

Moments before, Marilyn, an attractive 36-year-old blonde from Tequesta, Fla., just outside West Palm Beach, had climaxed a dramatic come-from-behind drive to beat Mickey in a playoff by one stroke, 72-73.

The tears were from joy and tension. Just 24 hours earlier, Marilyn, who had never won one of the "major" tournaments in 13 years as a professional, had thrown away a seemingly safe lead and ended the regulation 72 holes of the Titleholders in a 292 tie with Mickey.

Some of the finals will be held on Wednesday and the remainder on Friday.

Track and field, fencing, yachting and modern pentathlon dominate today's program. Only one final is on tap in track and field—the 3,000 meter steeplechase—and the United States is not expected to grab the gold medal in this event because of illness to George Young of Leo Cruces, N.M.
