### No Count-Downs Used in Early Rocket Firing

Roswell, N. M. — The intricate count-down in launching modern missiles was unheard of on New Year's eve of 1930 when Dr. Robert H. Goddard fired a missile in his first success.

It went up less than a mile but helped earn for the scientist recognition as the father of modern rocketry.

Charles W. Mansur, now an aerospace engineer for the U.S. Army at White Sands Missile Range, N.M., was an assistant to Goddard.

"There was no such thing as a count-down in those days," Mansur said. "When we were ready to fire, we fired."

During firings, there was an observation point about 50 feet from the launching tower where they really got a "close" look at the launching behind a cellar door dugout, Mansur said.

For two years, Goddard and four assistants developed, and well. They worked in a shop 35 by 50 feet located about four miles north of the city.

Their 60-foot launching tower was put up seven miles away at Eden valley. Enthusiastic

"We were really enthusiastic and the fact that we had to start from scratch even to helping build our own machine shop did not dampen our spirits a bit," Mansur said in an interview in his modern laboratory at White Sands.

Mansur first met Goddard, who died in 1945, at Worcester, Mass. In the early 1920s Mansur attended a grammar school there, across the street from Clark university, where Goddard was head of the sciences department.

While in high school, Mansur worked as a laboratory assistant at the university under Goddard. And in 1929 Mansur went to work full-time for Goddard, whose work in experimental rocketry dated back to the beginning of the century.

"We tried to launch rockets in Massachusetts but the public protested," Mansur recalled.

But the publicity aroused the attention of Col. Charles E. Lindbergh, who became interested in Goddard's work. For his solo flight over the Atlantic Ocean, helped obtain money for Goddard's

### Valley Residents Respond To Test Ban Treaty Appeal

Medford and other Rogue valley residents are responding to the Easter Appeal for a nuclear test ban treaty with a steady flow of petitions to the local chapter of the United Nations Association, Mrs. Wallace Robinson, secretary of the Jackson county chapter, has reported.

"The response was slow in the beginning, but since citizens have given more study to the appeal they have chosen to send in their petitions, which are being forwarded to President Kennedy, she said.

Individual letters are considered even more effective, Mrs. Robinson stated, urging people to make their beliefs known. Anyone wishing more information is asked to call her at 773-1717.

"The facts about fallout have not changed," Mrs. Robinson emphasized. "The United Nations scientific committee on the effects of atomic radiation has concluded that the bomb tests produce a definite hazard and that they claim a significant number of victims in present and following generations. The committee warned of the danger of further increase in radiation and said that the ending of nuclear testing would benefit present and future generations of mankind."

The test-ban issue, Mrs. Robinson believes, has become "a political issue." For this reason she urges people to make their opinions known to Washington.

Quoting Dr. Ernest Pollard in the Atlantic Monthly, she said: "The partisan issue has arisen though it need not arise as those within the Eisenhower and the Kennedy administrations, who have studied these questions and the alternatives thoroughly, have concluded that every effort to bring the arms race under control, of which nuclear testing is a part, must be pursued diligently."
