

Duncan To Send Out Radio, TV Programs

Washington - Congressman Robert B. Duncan (D-Ore.) this week started sending out his first radio and television programs designed to keep the people of the Fourth District informed of his activities in Congress.

"I feel that my constituents should know what I am doing, and should also know as much as possible about other activities of the Federal Government," Duncan said. "Today, more than ever before, Americans are showing a greater interest in national affairs. It is certainly part of a Congressman's job to help give them a clearer picture of the national scene."

The programs will be sent out periodically to about 30 radio stations and five television stations in Oregon. They will be five minutes long and will be scheduled by the individual stations. Duncan pointed out that the films and tapes are not being produced at government expense.

"I will certainly appreciate any comments or suggestions from viewers and listeners," Duncan said. "I hope the programs will help my constituents to better understand the workings of the Federal Government and the job of their Congressman."

Old Boll Weevil Still Bites Those Cotton Fields

On the very best authority, it was conservatively estimated that the depredations of the boll weevil cost American cotton growers 200 million dollars a year. That's a great deal of money, and equivalent to the loss of one bale of cotton out of every seven. The little bug with the long snout just about wrecked the industry.

The first boll weevil immigrants snaked into the U.S. about 60 years ago. They came up from Mexico, probably entered through Texas in a cotton shipment, and liked it so well they remained and began a boll-weevil-population-explosion.

Once under full steam, they extended their range north and east, at the remarkable rate of about 60 miles a year. They ate and destroyed cotton bolls and plants as they progressed. Always, too, they left astronomical numbers along the way. Like water seeping into a boiler, the insects flowed out in a silent, destructive flood.

Small Bug

The individual cotton boll weevil really doesn't amount to much. It is less than a half inch long, is gray or brown, hardshelled and has a very long, downward curved snout. This snout, or beak, whose end is the mouth, may be twice as long as the body. The down curved snout is the lance the insect uses in her attack on the boll of the cotton. She plunges the snout into the boll, and therein deposits an egg, which hatches into a small, grayish-white grub.

The weevil grub eats and grows. It finally cuts an exit in the boll and enters the outer world, leaving the boll severely damaged. If the boll doesn't fall, it later rots; either way it is ruined. The fibers are severed and the entering water works the tissues into worthless pulp. The birth of the boll weevil exacts a terrible toll.

The boll weevil society is sort of a one-sided affair, as there is always an unbalanced number of males in a field. In fact, scientific experiments and observations have revealed the amazing fact that Mrs. Boll Weevil can, and does, continue to lay fertile eggs, having had no assistance from Papa Boll Weevil. Such a situation is called parthenogenesis - development of an egg without fertilization.

Hard To Dislodge

Many methods of boll weevil control have been attempted but "drop-snout," once established, is hard to dislodge. "If we could kill, or at least control the boll weevil, we could pay off the mortgage on the old cotton patch," has been the cotton grower's lament.

Not as common is another and probably as great an "enemy" of the cotton patch in an off-side manner: The invention, perfection and manufacture of various synthetic materials. The multitudes of women who since owned only cotton dresses, are not so great today. Artificial fabrics have taken another wallop at what the boll weevil missed.

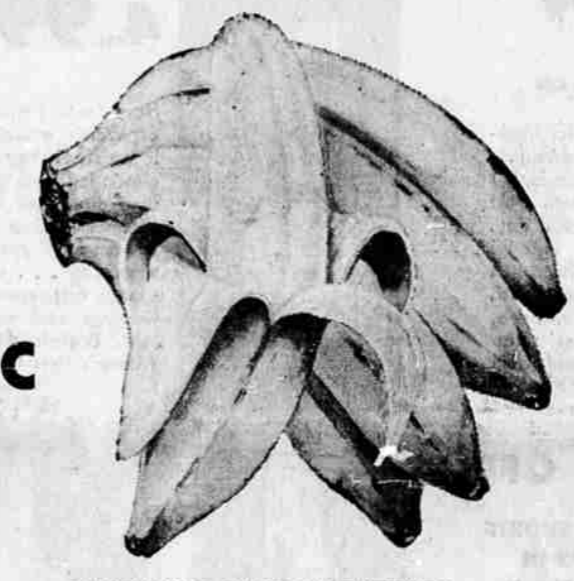
