Denver, Oklahoma City and Tacoma Post PCL Victories

By RON SUPINSKI United Press International Ninth-inning rallies propelled Denver and Oklahoma City to Pacific Coast League victories Monday while Tacoma lengthened its Northern Division lead at the expense of Hawaii.

Thirty-five-year-old outfielder Al Heist, who played for Houston in the National League last year, socked a grand-slam homer in the ninth to pace Oklahoma City to a comeback 9-5 victory over the Seattle Rainiers. The win only 6 of 14 games.

However, since heading east the Giants won six in a row before bowing to the Mets in the finale of Sunday's doubleheader.

After concluding the three-game series here, the Giants head to Los Angeles for the first 1963 meeting with the Dodgers whom San Francisco beat in a playoff for the National league title last fall.

DeNucci To Take On Jose Gonzalez New York—Young Joe DeNucci, excellent boxer-puncher from Newton, Mass., makes his bid for recognition as a middleweight contender Saturday night in a nationally televised fight with Puerto Rican Jose Gonzalez at the Boston Arena.

Their 10-rounder stands out on the week's boxing schedule. Each is 23 years old and an aggressive fighter.

Because of his speed, skill and punch, DeNucci is favored at 2-1 to beat slugger Gonzalez although Jose is ranked 10th among world 160-pound contenders by the World Boxing association and DeNucci is unrated.

Giulio Rinaldi of Italy defends his European light heavyweight title against Germany's Erich Schoepner at Rome on Friday.

Also on Friday, light heavyweight Von Clay of Philadelphia fights Gustav Scholz of Germany at Berlin.

Yankees Come Alive, Garner Tie For First With Win Over Tigers

If you had paid strict attention, you would have known weeks ago everything was going to be okay with the Yanks.

When some alarmists suggested this could be one of their off-years, Manager Ralph Houk said not a chance.

When questions were raised about Whitey Ford's arm, the Yankee manager said don't worry. And when anyone asked when Mickey Mantle would start hitting, Houk always said soon.

It looks as if he was right on all counts. Technically, the Yankees are tied for first place in the American League today with the Kansas City Athletics but the A's had better hurry up and get a picture of that because that situation is subject to change on short notice.

Yanks Crush Tigers Baring their muscles for the first time in weeks, the Yankees rattled off 15 hits and ran up their highest run total of the season Monday night in crushing the Detroit Tigers, 10-3.

Mantle enjoyed a perfect night, driving in three runs on three hits in as many times at bat. With the Yanks leading 4-3, he smashed a two-run homer off loser Hank Aguirre (3-3) in the seventh to make the score 6-3.

Tom Tresh, who collected three hits, then unloaded a three-run homer off reliever Paul Foytack in the eighth to cap a four-run rally. Bobby Richardson also had three hits and drove in two runs.

In the only other American League game scheduled, the Chicago White Sox beat Kansas City 5-1, and the Los Angeles Angels snapped a four-game losing streak with a 3-4 victory over the Minnesota Twins.

Only one game was played in the National League, with the Pittsburgh Pirates downing the Los Angeles Dodgers, 7-4.

Gary Peters of the White Sox, given his first major league start, made the most of it by limiting the A's to four hits and belting a home run himself.

Peters tired after eight innings, however, and Jim Bronson, picked up 24 hours earlier from the Reds, relieved him in the ninth and set down the A's in order, striking out two of the three batters he faced.

Southpaw Ted Bowsfield suffered his fourth defeat against one victory, yielding 10 of the White Sox' 13 hits, including homers by Peters and Mike Hershberger.

Albie Pearson drove in four of the Angels' five runs against the Twins by connecting for a pair of doubles, both times with the bases loaded.

Pearson's second double came off Bill Pleis with one out in the ninth and broke up the ball game after Zoilo Versalles had singled home Bob Allison in the top of the inning to put Minnesota ahead, 4-3. Don Osinski was credited with his first victory and Ray Moore charged with his first defeat.

Johnny Logan's pinch single with the bases full climaxed a four-run rally in the sixth inning that gave the Pirates their come-from-behind victory over the Dodgers.

Logan's shot to right field came on a 3-2 pitch by Don Drysdale and snapped a 4-0 tie. Jim Gilliam's throwing error made three of the runs in the inning unearned.

Drysdale, a 25-game winner last year, now is 2-3. Joe Gibbon, who relieved Pirate starter Bob Friend and was relieved himself, posted his second victory without a defeat.

Frank Howard socked his fifth homer over Forbes Field's left field scoreboard in the third.
