PTA Committee Heads, Awards Are Announced

Mrs. A. N. Bradford was installed chairman of the Medford Coordinating Committee of Parent-Teacher associations at a meeting of the group last week in Jefferson school. Mrs. M. O. Grove, regional vice president of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, was the installing officer.

Guidelines for PTA leaders was the topic presented by Mrs. Grove when she addressed the group. She explained that PTA basically is a group of parents and teachers in partnership for promotion of total welfare of all children and youth everywhere. It is not an entertainment group, not a fund-raising group, but an educational group that is non-commercial, non-sectarian and non-political, she stressed.

The speaker also explained that working as a group in membership with county, state and national Congress of PTA affords a continuity and a nation-wide significance, a power in numbers.

The Oregon Teacher Scholarship project was presented by Mrs. Owen Kunkel, who explained that scholarships are awarded to graduating high school seniors, who will enroll in teacher education in college and that they are continuing four-year tuition scholarships.

Twenty-five new scholarships have been awarded and 75 renewals made this year. However, she stated, 400 applications have been received.

Introduced were Miss Gail Scharfe, Phoenix High school, a new awardee; Miss Mary de Place, and Mrs. Aedene Heath Jensen, both Southern Oregon college juniors, who received renewal scholarships. Miss de Place is a Medford High school graduate and Mrs. Jensen was graduated from Eagle Point High school. Jackson county PTA units have contributed \$775 this year to the Oregon Teacher Scholarship program, an increase of \$286. However, she added this amount is not sufficient to maintain the Jackson county participants.

School administrators are working on a code of conduct for the students at Medford High school. Dr. Leonard Mayfield has requested that a committee be appointed from the Medford Coordinating committee to serve as advisers to the project.
