Ida Hamilton Dies In Jacksonville; Funeral May 15

Mrs. Ida Rachel Hamilton, 86, of Central Point, widow of the late Cyrus T. Hamilton, died Sunday night in Mitchell's Sanitarium at Jacksonville just two weeks after the death of her husband.

Born in Yorkshire, England, Feb. 27, 1877, Mrs. Hamilton came to the United States at the age of five with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Skelton. The family settled near Long Island, Kan., where she made her home until coming to southern Oregon with her husband more than 50 years ago. They were married March 16, 1898, in Long Island.

A member of the Church of England, which was not represented at that time on the Kansas Plains, Mrs. Hamilton became affiliated with the Presbyterian church.

The Hamiltons lived in Medford for a few years then purchased an orchard near Central Point, where they made their home at 4824 Gebhard rd. until entering the sanitarium a few months ago.

Mrs. Hamilton, one of a family of 13 children, is survived by one brother, Fred Skelton, Boise, Ida., two sisters, Mrs. Emily Parsons, Klute, Tex., and Mrs. Maude Dietrich, Meridian, Calif., one son, Cyrus Scott Hamilton, Central Point; nine grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. Her eldest son, A. Moore Hamilton, preceded his parents in death last August.

Funeral services will be held at the Peril Funeral home at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday with the Rev. George R. V. Bolster of St. Mark's Episcopal church officiating.

Interment will be in the IOOF cemetery in Medford. Acting as pallbearers will be Franklin Gebhard, Edwin Gebhard, Kenneth Ray Beebe, Donald Faber, D. R. Hendrickson and Jack Hendrickson.

Reporters Caught Short by Kennedy

Washington — (UPI) — Romping dogs, casual dress and a scribbled text gave an air of informality to the White House Sunday night when President Kennedy read his statement on the Birmingham situation.

Many reporters, suddenly called to the White House, arrived in clothes they had been wearing while enjoying a cool, sunny Sunday afternoon.

Several were in sport clothes without ties. One newsman appeared in slacks. Another had been called away from a champagne party.

Waiting for the President to appear reporters were joined by Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy's famed Newfoundland dog, Brumus, who leaped through the press room. Later, Pushinka, the small white dog Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev gave Caroline Kennedy, wandered in.

When Kennedy read his statement, reporters noticed it was partially typewritten while other parts were in his handwriting.

Graham Crusade Reaction Varied
Paris — (UPI) — Frenchmen had mixed reaction today to a religious crusade opened here by American evangelist Billy Graham in a big tent pitched in Paris' famous "Flea Market."

Graham inaugurated the crusade Sunday night with a sermon touching on infidelity of husbands, atomic bombs and Alabama race problems.

Graham's appearance filled only three-quarters of the tent auditorium on a vacant lot to the tourists' and antique-hunters' paradise. Of 8,000 seats an estimated 6,000 to 6,000 were filled.

At the end of the 90 minute service, approximately 400 persons stepped forward to answer Graham's appeal to "declare yourself for Christ."

Comments afterward ranged from "a grand spectacle" by one young Frenchman to "very good, very moving," by two middle-aged women.

Portlander Hurt In Boat Explosion
Portland — (UPI) — Dr. Dan Garza, Portland dentist, suffered minor cuts and abrasions Sunday when an explosion ripped his 27-foot fishing boat as he was cruising alone on the Columbia river.

Garza said he had no idea what caused the explosion. The boat was heavily damaged from a resulting fire with loss estimated at \$8,000.

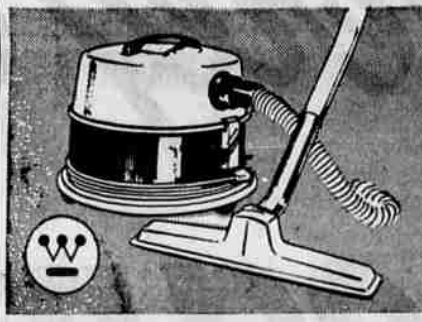

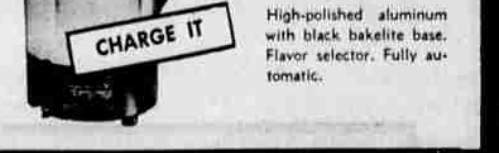
