Central Point - Good pitching with good fielding support, timely hits and Medford errors.

Those were the ingredients that the Crater high Comets employed here yesterday to manufacture a 4 to 0 Southern Oregon conference baseball triumph over the Medford Black Tornado.

Wayne Clay chucked three-hit, eight-strikeout, one-walk in whitewashing the Brezels. His teammates backed him with an errorless performance. And, a single by Darryl Summerfield and a double by Pat Pepper each contributed to the scoring which came two runs each in the fourth and fifth innings.

The two hits were the only ones yielded by Medford twirler Bill Enyart, who walked three batters and hit one and struck out two. Medford was charged with five miscues and Crater took advantage of three of them along with two of the walks and the hit batter.

Game Tonight at WC
This loss was the first one suffered by Tornado this season in league play and gave Medford a 10-1 standing in the circuit. Crater has completed regular conference play with a 10-6 and is still in the running for a deadlock for the crown. Medford won its three previous trysts with the Comets.

Crater entertains Corvallis in a twilight-night non-league twinbill at Memorial field, White City, this evening. First game is at 6 p.m. Medford is host to Ashland on Thursday at 4 p.m. in a conference skirmish.

In other Southern Oregon conference action yesterday Klamath Falls tripped Grants Pass 9 to 7 and 11 to 4 to fortify its hold on second place.

Summerfield Drills
For Crater's runs in the

fourth inning, Pat Pepper led off with a base on balls and Darryl Summerfield drilled a single to left field. Medford catcher Mike Barnes, attempting to pick Pepper off first base, heaved the ball into the outfield. The ball momentarily was juggled by centerfielder Mike Neathamer. Pepper raced home and Summerfield got to third base. Then, Summerfield scored on Howard Tomlinson's groundout.

With two out in the fifth Mike Gilnes walked and Lou Alvarez was hit by a pitch. The runners advanced when another Barnes throw went into the outfield. Pepper rapped a double to right field, driving in both runners.

Medford's best opportunity was in the fourth inning when Miles opened with a school-roof double and Dick Deffley drag-bunt singled and swiped second base. However, Clay struck out the next three Medford batters in order. Miles walked and reached third base for Medford in the first inning. In the second Barnes singled but Neathamer hit into a double play. No Tornado runners got on base in four of the innings.

Put One Together
Crater had runners as far as third in both the first and second frames.

Said Crater Coach Bill Piche, "We finally put a good one together. I'm real proud of Wayne Clay's effort on the mound and the defensive play of the infield and outfield. I also feel our team had the potential this year but at various times throughout conference games errors hurt us at crucial points."

In the first fracas at Grants Pass yesterday Klamath committed six errors and Grants Pass went into the first of the seventh inning leading 5 to 3. Then KF came through with six runs in the seventh. The Cavenem of GP played errorless ball. A 10-hit attack helped the KF Pelicans in the second game.

Medford high pounded out 12 hits and chuckers Mike Bickler and Gary Frohreich teamed for a one-hitter here yesterday in a 7 to 1 junior varsity baseball verdict over Crater high.

Medford collected enough runs to win in the first in-

ning. Three markers crossed home on singles by Jim Brennan and Larry Godley, a triple by Jim Cox and an error. Jerry Godley also singled in the panel.

Crater's lone marker was in the second stanza on Blanche's hit, two walks and John Bush's sacrifice flyout.

Three Doubles in Inning
Another Medford run came in the third chucker on a Jerry Godley double, a groundout and a Herb Pierson single. In the fourth there were two more Medford scores on doubles by Brennan, Cox and Larry Godley.

In the sixth stanza for one more Tornado tally Cox singled and there were two errors and a passed ball.

Bickler pitched five innings for Medford. He allowed the one run and one hit while fanning six and walking seven. Frohreich fanned two.

Brennan had three hits for Medford, including two doubles. Cox walked four for four, one a triple and one a two-bagger. The Godley twins each singled and doubled.

Report Claims Russian Victory

New York - (UPI) - A report by the Institute for the Study of the USSR calculated today that Russia should outscore the United States in the 1964 Olympics, 712 to 518, despite U.S. improvement in gymnastics, marksmanship and sailing.

The figures, based on worldwide performances in Olympic sports during the last two years, were contained in a report written by Yuri V. Marin.

Although the report claimed victory for the Russians by an overwhelming point margin, it said that Russian experts were concerned about U.S. improvement in certain sports and that intensive preparations are being made to ensure a Soviet victory at Tokyo.

Marin's report said Soviet athletes are aiming for the "liquidation of the lag" shown in certain sports. He specifically referred to track races from 100 meters to 10,000 meters, swimming events, man's gymnastics and certain weight categories in boxing and wrestling.

QUALIFYING STANDARDS
When the District 8 A-1 track meet is conducted here Saturday, athletes who place first and second will earn berths in the state meet. In addition, those who meet certain qualifying standards also will get to make the trip.

These standards must be met in the meet finals. However, no school may have more than two state meet entries in any one event. Standards also apply to A-2 district meets.

The standards are:
High hurdles - 15.0; 100 hurdles - 20.1; 100-200 - 22.5; 440 - 51.5; 880 - 2:00; mile - 4:30; relay - 1:31; shot put - 53 feet; discus - 150 feet; javelin - 190 feet; broad jump - 22 feet; high jump - 6 feet; pole vault - 12-4.

Baltimore, Md. - (UPI) - Kentucky Derby winner Chateaugay heads the list of seven likely candidates for Saturday's 87th running of the Preakness Stakes, Middle jewel of racing's big triple crown.

Also ready for the mile and three-sixteenth run at Pimlico are Cain Hoy Stable's Never Bend, second to Chateaugay at Churchill Downs, and Rex C. Ellsworth's Candy Spots, the third place finisher.

There has been mounting support for Candy Spots in the last few days. The handsome chestnut son of Nigromante went into the Derby unbeaten in six lifetime starts and was sent off an odds-on favorite. Despite his failure in the run for the roses, Candy Spots may wind up the bettor's choice in the Preakness.

Reason for this has been the intensive training Candy Spots has received since arriving at Pimlico.

The other probable starters are Ambush Stable's On My Honor, T. D. Buhl's Lemon Twist, Jacnet Stable's Country Square and Mrs. C. D. Morgan's Sky Wonder.

If seven go, the Preakness will gross \$178,000 with the winner earning \$125,000.

Detroit - (UPI) - A crowd of more than 500 was expected to attend the funeral today of football star Gene (Big Daddy) Lipscomb.

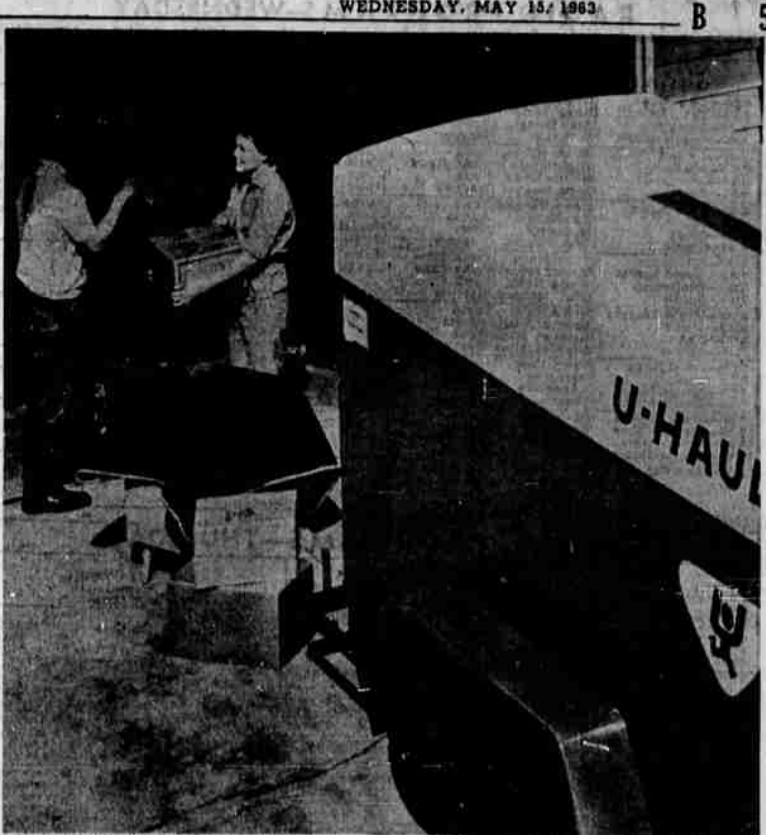

Rio de Janeiro - (UPI) - The United States remained a strong favorite to gallop unbeaten today, just as it did in winning the recent Pan-American Games championship.

Only the Soviet Union and France among the other six elimination round survivors are given a chance of upsetting the Yanks when the finals open here Thursday. No games were scheduled today.

The Russians matched the Yanks' 3-0 record in the preliminary round. France won two of three games and looked particularly impressive Tuesday night in whipping Canada 79-57.

Vinnie Ernst and Jerry Shipp teamed to lead the United States to an 87-77 victory over Italy and Russia overpowered Uruguay 94-75 in Tuesday night's other major games.
