Young New York Women Arrange Unusual Trips

New York — UPI — Two young New York women have built a business helping vacationers to get away from it all in an unusual way. Maryellen A. Stevenson and Jane Ellenbogen will see that you get where you want to go if you MUST follow the well-trodden tracks of the guide books. But their specialty is planning trips for the individual or family seeking anything from an inexpensive off-beat trip in Europe to a world tour including a few weeks on a chartered yacht cruising the Mediterranean.

For advice on planning some unusual itinerary such as a wine tour of France the two will make all reservations. If advice alone is what the traveler wants, the fee for the written research is a nominal one.

But for something like that world trip, with Australia the farthest point, they've handled every detail right down to who is captain on the chartered yacht.

In this case, they estimate the trip will cost about \$25,000 for a family of five. The women's take is a flat fee, and they didn't want to name it.

"We can plan vacations for people who want to shoot Kodiak bear, climb the Himalayas, do a castle tour of Europe, play the worlds most challenging golf courses, make a tour to photograph the sights. . . . We planned one for a man going to India just for that," said Mrs. Stevenson, wife of a bank executive.

The two have found family trips on the increase, so have researched things for children to do. A pony trip through England, for instance, or a sailboat excursion in Holland. Or day camps for the children, while "their parents visit museums."

Miss Ellenbogen said they'd had no customers wanting a bear hunt or Himalayan climb arranged. But some requests are challenging.

A doctor of philosophy working on a history of civilization asked them to map a tour of Italy, the subject of his current research, so that he could meet people of all walks of life, including the stevedores of Genoa.

Clients, rich and not so rich, are from all parts of the United States, they said. And

New Frozen Foods Give Varied Menu

New York — UPI — Production of cooked and prepared frozen foods has increased 700 per cent since 1952, to an annual total exceeding 130 million pounds, says an industry executive.

Gordon D. Murphy, president of the Eastern Frozen Foods association, made this statement at the organization's annual new products lunch.

New items included: Pre-cooked Canadian fresh water smelts, lightly breaded South African whiting fish sticks, frozen apple dumplings with cinnamon sauce, and shoe-string potatoes.

Continental hot and cold hors d'oeuvres on white and rye breads, pre-baked broche and croissants, pre-baked canape shells, and apple blintzes.

Orange punch concentrate containing banana puree and orange, pineapple, coconut, lemon, papaya, lime and passion fruit juices. The concentrate is packed in cans with pull-tab openers.
