Stretch fabrics are the big news in both ladies' and children's wear, according to many of the exhibitors. The handful of mills which produce stretch fabrics have placed clothing manufacturers on allocations for the remainder of 1963, so heavy is the trend in this direction.

The new fall colors include cranberry and bluegrass, with dark brown and eggplant (a deep purple) holding strong. Royal blue and olive will also be shown with fire-red among the preferable colors for ladies' coats.

"The muted shades will be played down, in favor of the bright reds, blues and browns," according to a spokesman for the exhibitors.

There appears to be a definite novelty trend in the sweater lines and knit garments are expected to take the lead in casual wear.

Indicative of the high interest in strong colors is the plan by one glove manufacturer to display 32 different color lines for the fall season.
