

Rosewall, Buchholz Triumph In Pro Tennis Matches Here

Ken Rosewall, acknowledged king of pro tennis competition, fattened his margin here last night in the battle for first place in the World Series of Professional Tennis. Earl Buchholz narrowed his deficit in the playoff for third money.

Rosewall thumped fellow Australian Rod Laver, 6-1, 6-3, before an enthusiastic and receptive but disappointingly small audience at Hedrock Junior high gymnasium. Buchholz, United States participant on the tour, downed Andres Gimeno, of Spain, 11-9, in a nip and tuck encounter.

Victory here before some 300 spectators gave Rosewall

a 10 to 4 edge in the playoff for the \$35,000 top prize. It assured him of no less than a tie in the scheduled 20-match series. He needs only one more match to clinch the playoff.

Doubles Played

Buchholz' verdict last night cut Gimeno's third place runoff gap to just two games, 8 to 6.

In the doubles match in which no prize was at stake Rosewall and Buchholz downed Gimeno and Laver, 8-5.

Rosewall had almost complete command against Laver, who appeared tired from his first tour as a professional.

The veteran pro broke Laver's service three times in each of the sets. Laver could not consistently match Rosewall's well-placed chops and slices. He controlled the action with steady, sure play.

Laver perked up and was a bit sharper in the second set in which he started right by busting Rosewall's service. But the pro king fought back to take the second game of the set on Laver's service. In the middle part of the second set, Rocket Rod, with his left-handed shots, seemed to get at Rosewall's backhand a bit. There were three deuce games and a good recovery and fine kill by Laver before victory was tucked away for the series leader.

Several good rallies pleased the crowd.

Only Service Break

The only service break of the entire 20-game Buchholz-Gimeno set won the engagement for the Yank. The two battled back and forth through 18 games each winning his service. Buchholz then went on top 10 to 9. With the count 30-40 and Gimeno serving in the 20th game, a Gimeno shot went into the net to end the match.

Despite his set loss Gimeno won two love games.

The Spaniard displayed a sizzling first serve which gained him points when it was good. But double faults hurt him. Buchholz came up with some spectacular returns, was able to place his shots better and was a bit stronger at the net.

The doubles saw a number of blazing rallies which brought exuberant applause. Calm demeanor displayed by the Australians was in contrast to the temper flashes of the American and Spaniard.

The world series is sponsored by the International Professional Players association. It was brought here by Jose Corona, pro at Rogue Valley Country club.

The series moves to Eugene tonight for the last of four appearances in Oregon.

Portland - Oregon anglers are reminded that on Saturday, May 25, the high lakes in the Cascade and Paulina mountains will open to general trout angling. Also opening on that date will be all streams in the coastal zone from St. Helens on the Columbia to the California border (including Rogue River).

Popular areas opening up for anglers include productive East and Paulina lakes in the Paulina mountains; Diamond lake in the Umpqua headwaters; South and North Twin lakes, Big Lava, Sparks and Elk lakes, all in the Deschutes basin; Timothy lake at the head of the Clackamas; and Clear lake to the east of Mt. Hood.

All of the lakes in the high mountain lake basins will be open to anglers, but undoubtedly many of these will require a trek over trails still covered with snow. Popular and productive lake basins include the Mountain Lakes Wild Area in the Klamath country; the Rogue headwaters including the Seven lakes basin, the Sky lakes and the Cloud lake group; the Taylor Burn country to the north of Waldo lake; the Mink lake basin with closest access over trails out of Elk lake; the Marion lakes in the Mt. A partial answer calls for bumping for qualifying faster than the slowest cars to make the field last week end. While mechanics work to get a few miles an hour more out of their cars, drivers were keeping one eye open for another ride if their car is bumped or falls to qualify.

The fast boys including pole sitter Parnelli Jones who qualified at a record 151.153 m.p.h., can run fuel and tire tests at their leisure.

Eighteen cars have qualified but high winds both days kept the speeds for the 10-mile springs down at least two or three miles an hour from the expected 152-plus speeds.

Low man on the chart is Mexico's Pedro Rodriguez, a rookie who turned in 146.687.

With good weather the slowest car to make the field should have to turn over 147.

Orioles Blank Tigers; Colts Get 2-0 Win Over Pirates

They've taken the "kid prodigy" label off pitcher Milt Pappas of the Baltimore Orioles because this year he's become a man.

Immaturity of outlook has been the only rap against the 6-foot-3, 200-pound right-hander from Detroit, Mich., since he startled American league hitters with his pitching savvy as a 19-year-old rookie in 1958. Pappas compiled a 65-49 record from 1958 through 1962 but he still was regarded as a "problem child."

But so far this season all the problems are being encountered by rival hitters.

Pappas turned in his second shutout and his fourth straight victory of the season Monday night in a 6-0 win over the Detroit Tigers that enabled the Orioles to move into a first-place tie with the Chicago White Sox. Pappas allowed only one run in each of his other two victories, has struck out 26 batters while walking only nine and has a 1.17 earned run average.

Pleasingly Cockey

Known in the trade as "pleasingly c o c k e y," Pappas has been tabbed for stardom since he vaulted into the majors virtually direct from American Legion ball. Only four pitchers have won more big league games at his age and his shutout Monday night set a club record of 14 for a career.

The Orioles backed his five-hit pitching with a salvo of four home runs that produced all their runs and dealt Phil Regan his fifth loss against two victories, Jim Gentile and Jerry Adair hit solo homers and Jackie Brandt and John Powell each slammed one with a man on base.

The Orioles have won six of their last seven games during which Baltimore pitchers have allowed a total of 11 runs and 33 hits.

The White Sox nipped the Washington Senators, 5-4. The Minnesota Twins knocked the Boston Red Sox out of first place with a 6-5 triumph and the Cleveland Indians downed the Los Angeles Angels, 7-5, in other AL games.

Colts Beat Pirates

Dick Droit pitched a five-hitter as the Houston Colts defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 2-0, in the only National league action.

The White Sox overcame an early 3-1 lead held by Tom Cheney and snapped a 3-2 tie in the sixth inning when Floyd Robinson singled, Joe Cunningham doubled and both scored on sacrifice flies by Dave Nicholson and pinch-hitter Charlie Maxwell. Eddie Fisher went 5½ innings for his third victory although he needed the late-inning relief help of Frank Baumann and

Jim Brosnan. The loss was the fourth in a row for Cheney, the league's early-season pitching sensation.

A three-run homer by Earl Battey and solo homers by Bob Allison and Harmon Killebrew paced the Twins' 10-hit attack. Camilo Pascual was tagged for five runs and seven hits in 6½ innings but gained credit for his fifth win. Earl Wilson sufficed his third loss.

Wagner Batters Two

Leon Wagner drove in all five Los Angeles runs with his 12th and 13th homers of the season but homers by Willie Kirkland and Tito Francona plus a two-run double by Johnny Romano enabled Cleveland's Jack Kralick to win his second game. Fralick was kayoed by Wagner's three-run ninth inning homer - the 100th homer of his career - and Gary Bell closed out the game.

Droit pitched his first complete game since June 14, 1959, walking two, striking out seven and permitting only two Pirates to advance to third. Johnny Temple, who ran his hitting streak to eight games, tripled in the first Houston run and a sacrifice fly by John Bateman delivered the other. Don Cardwell dropped his sixth decision against one victory.
