

Forest Personnel Trains in Fire Fighting Roles

Grants Pass—Approximately 70 Siskiyou National Forest rangers and other forest personnel from Josephine and Curry counties are training this week for supervisory roles in controlling a potentially dangerous fire season this summer.

The men are attending a three-day fire over head school, which will end today at the U.S. forest service's aerial project at Cave Junction. They will be used as fire bosses, foremen and planners in suppression of large fires and critical fire situations.

Robert Mansfield, land staff

officer of Siskiyou National forest headquarters in Grants Pass, warned forest users this summer to be especially careful to avoid the possibility of any fire escaping control.

Add More Fuel
In addition to the extra amount of burnable material thrown on the ground by the Columbus Day storm, Mansfield said, the long wet spring has added further fuel to the fire hazard with an unusually heavy growth of grass, forming a highly flammable fuel to spread fire rapidly overground.

Instructors at the school, in addition to forest service personnel, included Jim Tyr-

rell, of the U.S. weather bureau, Medford, who discussed "Fire Weather;" Joe Dunn, FBI, Medford, and Larry Aschenbrenner, Josephine county district attorney, who discussed "Trespass-Law Enforcement."

A major part of the training course for experienced personnel centered on "plans" organization, operating the section which gathers and assembles all information on a fire and makes recommendations to the fire boss for control-force requirements and calculation of probabilities.

Inexperienced personnel received a three-day course in crew boss work.

'Youth, Incorporated' Starts Organizing to Provide Part-Time Jobs

Basic organization of "Youth, Incorporated" to provide spare time jobs for youngsters 13 to 18 years old was started this week at a meeting in Medford.
