

Medford High Trips Axemen; Gains State Baseball Semis

Medford high's Black Tornado baseball aggregation broke away from a deadlock with three runs in the fifth inning to whip South Eugene 4 to 1 here Friday and swirl into the semifinals of the playoffs for the Oregon Class A-1 mantle.

A base on balls with bases loaded in the big fifth wiped out a 1-0 knot. Then, Darryl Stockton, entering as a pinch-hitter accomplished his purpose by rocketing a single. This drove in two runs to pad the margin and ease the pressure on the Medfordites. But, victory was made certain as Tornado chucker Stuart Young hurled a one-hitter, bore down with superlative pitching in the final innings.

Medford now will play Pendleton on Tuesday at Pendleton. The Buckaroos gained the semis also Friday by defeating North Salem at Salem. Score was 4 to 2.

World Broadjump Record Is Broken

Modesto, Calif. — Peter Snell of New Zealand won the so-called "miracle mile" in a blazing 3:54.9 last night but unheralded Phil Shinnick was the hero of the California Relays with a world record in the broad jump.

A half hour after Snell had vanquished the American record in a race in which four men broke the four-minute barrier, Shinnick, a slender University of Washington sophomore, leaped 27 feet 4 inches in the broad jump.

That cracked the 1962 world record of 27 feet 3 1/4 inches set by Igor Ter-Ovanesyan of Russia.

Until Saturday, Shinnick had never jumped farther than 25 feet, 5 inches. The sellout crowd of 10,000 happened to have their

Corvallis, Ore. — Oregon State scored two touchdowns in the final minute and a half to defeat its alumni 36-28 yesterday despite a brilliant performance by Terry Baker.

Baker, the Beavers' Heisman trophy winning quarterback of last season who has signed to play with the Los Angeles Rams of the National Football league, passed for 357 yards.

He hit 32 of 46 passes attempted, two for touchdowns. He also ran for a score.

Orioles Retain AL Lead With 6-4 Win

The Baltimore Orioles retained their 1 1/2 game lead in the American League Saturday when they won their sixth straight by beating the Cleveland Indians, 6-4, but the New York Yankees stayed close on their heels with a 5-1 win over the Washington Senators for their fifth straight.

Baltimore won its game with Cleveland by capitalizing on three misplays to score three runs in the ninth inning. Throwing errors by third baseman Max Alvis and relief pitcher Jerry Walker and a too-late throw by Pitcher Bob Allen all figured in the Oriole rally that snapped a 3-all tie.

Cleveland retaliated with a run in the bottom of the ninth on a walk and a triple by Vic Davalillo's triple. But winning pitcher Stu Miller struck out Al Luplow and got Joe Adeock on a grounder to end the game.

Ralph Terry of the Yankees and Tom Cheney of the Senators were locked in a scoreless duel until the seventh inning when the Yankees broke through for four runs, three of which were unearned due to an error by first baseman Bobo Osborne.

Clete Boyer's double, following a two-out walk in the seventh, gave the Yanks their first run and after Osborne muffed Terry's soft pop-up, allowing another run to score, successive doubles by Tony Kubek and Bobby Richardson added to more runs.

Terry held the Senators to seven hits in dealing them their sixth straight loss and registering his fifth victory of the year.
