Some teachers, of course, never should have been allowed in a classroom, but they were few and far between. The rest had a special empathy with eager mind.

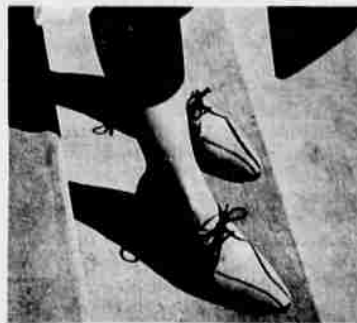
