Auto Races At Portland

Portland — Four big auto racing events have been set over the Memorial Day weekend at Jantzen arena, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoon.

On Thursday afternoon and Saturday evening, late model stock cars, featuring the 1961 through 1963 models, hold their first one quarter mile racing events of the season, with six big racing events including a marathon feature each day plus a big jalopy destruction derby event. Thursday events get underway at 1:30 p.m. with time trials with the first racing event set for 2:30 o'clock while Saturday's night stock car affair beginning with trials at 7:30 o'clock

and the first racing event set for 8:30 o'clock.

The stock cars will have all of their 1963 models competing in the event with Art Watts' new Ford Fastback ready for action; Carl Joiner, Dick Geity and Jack McCoy driving new Chevys; Bill Amick, Dodge and Royce Hagerty, Mercury.

Hal Beal in a '62 Dodge and current point leader will be in action with Johnny Smythe in a '62 Ford; Ernie Shirley and Bob Gregg in '62 Mercs plus all of the top 1961 and 1960 models also competing.

Friday night and Sunday afternoon's racing events will see over 100 junkers competing in jalopy destruction derbies with eight smashup events set for each performance.

Friday's events will get underway at 7:30 p.m. with the first smashup starting at 8:30 o'clock. Sunday's events will start with trials at 1 p.m., smashup racing at 2:30 o'clock.

Klamath Falls — Gary Benson hurled a no-hitter for the Klamath Falls Falcons here Sunday when they split a twinbill with the Central Point Cheney Studs in the opening action of the Southern division of American Legion Junior baseball Area 4.

Benson's verdict was in the 4 to 1 first game of seven innings. Central Point won the non-counting five-inning second game 7 to 4. He struck out six batters and walked four. The lone CP run was in the seventh inning on a base on balls, a hit batter, an error and a wild pitch.

The Falcons picked up all their runs in the third inning on a double by Joe Parisotto, singles by John Gray and John Paxton, a walk and an error. Parisotto had two hits for the Falcons and Benson tripled.

Walker Golf Must Not Be Abolished, Yank Captain Says

Turnberry, Scotland — (UPI) — The non-playing captain of the victorious United States team today insisted the Walker Cup matches "must never be abolished," even though the Yanks have won 18 of the 19 meetings.

"I know there has been a lot of talk about winding up the cup matches because of runaway American successes but this competition must be continued," said Richard Tufts of Pinehurst, N. C.

"It is one of the few golf championships for the amateurs of the U. S. and Britain to meet in international competition," the American leader added. "The championships between the two nations narrows each year."

"This year, for instance, we received an almighty fright. We thought after the first day we had lost the cup but our boys fought back magnificently to retain it."

The Yanks fell behind, 6-3, on opening day Friday but bounced back Saturday to win all four foursomes and five of the remaining eight singles matches. That gave the U. S. a 12-8 triumph, with four matches halved.

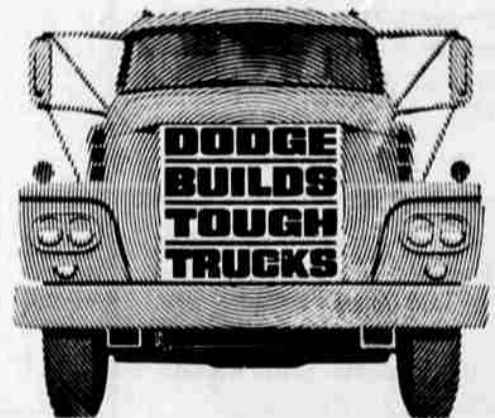
