

Stock Hurls Two Relief Wins For League-Leading Orioles

The league-leading Baltimore Orioles call Wes Stock "the All American out" and that applies not only to his abysmal hitting but also to his incredible pitching.

As a hitter, Stock is strictly an out man and formidable threat to Hank Aguirre's title as the worst in the American league.

Stock still is looking for his first major league hit even though this is his fifth season with the Orioles.

As a relief pitcher, the 29-year-old right-hander also is an out man, but of a completely different variety.

He won both ends of a dou-

bleheader in Sunday's 10-6 and 6-1 sweep over the Cleveland Indians and ran his season record to 5-0 as the Orioles increased their league lead to 2½ games by winning their seventh and eighth straight games.

Remarkable Form

Stock, who went nearly two full years without a defeat before Boston finally beat him last June 21, displayed the same remarkable form Sunday that enabled him to go unscathed upon in 40 of his 53 relief appearances last season.

In the opener he hurled two hitless innings and struck out two of the four Cleveland batters he faced after the Indians had hit starter Steve Barber for nine hits

and six runs in 3 1-3 innings. Summoned from the bullpen again in the nightcap, Stock shut out Cleveland on one hit over the last three innings as teammate Boog Powell broke a 1-1 tie with an eighth inning single off looper Jim Mudgett Grant. Jackie Brandt tripled home two more runs in the same frame.

Jim Gentile's two-run single capped a three-run seventh inning rally that decided the opener. Gentile also belted a two-run homer in the fourth that helped Dick Donovan suffer his third loss in five decisions. Brooks Robinson also homered for Baltimore.

Elsewhere in the American circuit, the Washington Senators won their first game under new manager Gil Hodges

and ended an eight-game losing streak with a 7-6 nightcap victory after the New York Yankees won their sixth in a row, 7-1, in the opener.

The Detroit Tigers beat the Boston Red Sox, 12-3, in the first of two, but dropped the nightcap, 6-3; the Minnesota Twins made it seven in a row with a 5-2 decision over the Chicago White Sox, and the Los Angeles Angels beat the Kansas City A's 6-4.

Errors Hurt Yanks

Errors by Bobby Richardson and Clete Boyer in the seventh inning of the nightcap enabled the Senators to score what was to be the winning run against the Yankees. Rookie Jim Duckworth held the Yanks to two runs on six hits over the last six innings to gain his first major league

win. Jim Bouton posted his sixth victory with a seventh-inning homer as Elston Howard and Mickey Mantle tagged looper Don Rudolph for home runs.

Bunning Victor

Although rapped for two homers by Russ Nixon and one by Gary Geiger, Jim Bunning registered his second victory for the Tigers with an eight-inning shutout in the opener. Bunning struck out 10 batters and was aided by Al Kaline's two-run homer and a three-run blast by Dick McAuliffe. Eight-inning homers by Ed Bresoud and Geiger powered the Red Sox to victory in the second game.

The Twins also employed home run muscle to beat the White Sox. Zolfo Versalles, Harmon Killebrew and Earl

Battey each connected as Jim Perry scored his third victory with help from Bill Dalley in the eighth.

Jim Fregosi and Billy Moran each singled home two runs in the sixth inning to break a 2-1 tie between the Angels and the Athletics.

Medford High school's Oregon Class A-1 baseball championship semifinal game with the Pendleton Buckaroos will be played at Pendleton on Tuesday evening starting around 8 o'clock.

In the Buckaroos the Black Tornado will encounter a veteran team which has won 22 games and lost nine. Medford sports an 18-4 record.

The Tornadoes reached the semi final by compiling a 13-1 standing in the Southern Oregon conference and by beating South Eugene last Friday 4 to 1 in a quarterfinal m.k. Pendleton took the Intermountain league play off with The Dalles then tripped North Salem on Friday 4 to 2.

Winner of Tuesday night's game will go against the Madison-Hillsboro winner in the third try of a championship triple bill on Thursday, Memorial Day, at Multnomah stadium in Portland. Madison and Hillsboro meet today.

Bunker held North to two hits and fanned 10 while issuing six bases on balls.

Medford Coach John Kovenz has indicated that either Jack Forde or Bill Enyart will be the Tornado chucker tomorrow with the one not getting the starting call being the first line backup man.

OSU 2-Mile Relay Team Sets Mark

Modesto, Calif. (UPB)—Oregon State's crack two-mile relay team ran off with the world's record with a 7:18.9 clocking in the California Relays Saturday night.

Half a mileers Jan Underwood, Jerry Brady, Norm Hoffman and Morgan Growth shattered the old record of 7:19.4 set by the U.S. National team in 1960.

Times were 1:50.2 for Underwood, 1:52.0 for Brady, 1:48.4 for Hoffman and 1:48.3 for Growth.

Oregon State's Gary Staveland captured the javelin event with a throw of 251.9. John Burns of Oregon was third in 244.9½.

Doug Parker and Gary Baker, freshmen at Oregon State, finished second and fourth in the 880-yard run in 1:30.2 and 1:31.1, respectively.

Ex-Oregon half miler Sig Ohlemann was fifth.

Oregon's Paul Stuber came in third in the high jump at 6-9¾ and Mel Renfro of Oregon was third in the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.2.

Lynn Eves of Oregon State ran sixth in the 220-yard dash.

Shot putter Dave Steen of Oregon failed to qualify for the finals. His best effort was 39-7.

Brazilians Take World Hoop Title

Rio de Janeiro (UPB)—The United States, which invented the game of basketball and never has lost an Olympic or Pan American cup championship, still is looking for its first world title.

Brazil won its second straight world crown Saturday night by beating the Yanks, 85-81, after Yugoslavia downed Russia, 89-67, in the fourth annual round-robin series.

The U. S. squad which appeared here was virtually the same team that swept unbeaten through the recent Pan-American games at Sao Paulo. However, it was not considered up to U. S. Olympic standards.

Some 25,000 fans went wild Saturday night after Brazil avenged a Pan-American loss to the Yanks. The United States and Brazil were tied 39-all at halftime but Wlamir Marques and Amaury Passos paced the South Americans to their sixth straight victory without a defeat in the tourney.

Marques had 24 points, but Passos led all scorers with 27. Jerry Shipp was tops for the U.S. with 22 points and Don Keils had 13. The Yanks finished with a 3-3 mark in the tourney.
