

Need for Federal Help in Oregon Civil Defense Stressed

Boys Succumb To Poison Taken To Avoid Capture

Reading, Pa. — (UP) — Two teen-agers, flushed from a home where they had held a woman hostage, died Tuesday night apparently after swallowing potassium cyanide tablets to avoid capture.

Police said the youths, one of them described as a "model boy," had just been taken into custody near Fleetwood, 17 miles from here, when they collapsed. They were pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's hospital here.

The teen-agers were identified tentatively as Charles E. Montagna, 16, and Edgar Barrone, 18, both of Phillipsburg, N.J.

State police said the search for the boys started Monday after they fled in their car following a "relatively minor" auto accident in Fleetwood. They were reported to be armed at the time, and Fleetwood police sought assistance from state police who combed the nearby countryside.

Two Women Plead Guilty To Charge

Ellen Elyse Prince, 25, of 2785 Howard ave., and Myrna Louise Prince, 20, of 2545 Table Rock rd., were lodged in the Jackson county jail Tuesday evening on charges of shoplifting.

They were arrested by Medford police after they were called to the J. C. Penney company. The women admitted to police taking articles from the store, and other downtown stores.

They both pleaded guilty to the charges in Jackson county district court this morning and bail was set at \$10 each. Their cases were continued until June 7 at 9 a.m.

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Detective Sgt. Leroy Lilly and Trooper Donald Holloway were in the area near the summer home of Dr. William Hamilton, a dentist, and stopped at the house to check on Mrs. Hamilton. The woman told them she was all right and had not seen anyone.

Police said later the youths had guns trained on both her and the state policemen at the time.

EAST GERMAN BORDER GUARDS ESCAPE TO WEST
Berlin — (UP) — Two East German border guards, in full uniform and armed, fled through barbed wire border barriers to West Berlin today.

West Berlin police said other East German sentries did not see the escape of the men, aged 20 and 23.

CUBA, SOVIETS SIGN SCIENTIFIC AGREEMENT
Moscow — (UP) — Cuba and the Soviet Union Tuesday signed an agreement on scientific cooperation providing for joint studies in physics, geography, geology, oceanology, history, anthropology and ethnography, according to the Soviet news agency Tass.

RUSSIAN DIAMOND EXPORTS SAID INCREASING

Dollar Matching Said Needed for Basic Functions

Salem — (UP) — State civil defense leaders told the federal government today that if it wants a functioning civil defense program in Oregon after July 1 it will have to step in and help.

Long-faced members of the Governor's Advisory Council on Civil Defense looked at a two-year budget that would slash the 18-member state agency to three persons and agreed there was nothing else to do.

The council told State CD Director Robert Sandstrom to inform the federal government that if it was able to match dollar-for-dollar the \$4,000 allotted by the legislature that it probably would be able to carry out its three basic functions — the fallout shelter program, radiological monitoring and the attack warning and communication system.

But members said even with those matching funds — for which Assistant Defense Secretary S. L. Pittman has warned Oregon will not qualify — the other functions of civil defense will have to be dropped.

GETS EQUAL PAY BILL
Washington — (UP) — Only President Kennedy's signature is required to enact into law a bill to give women equal pay with men for equal work. The Senate accepted the House-passed measure Tuesday night and sent it to the White House.

Notes One-Sided
Votes in both houses of the legislature to cut the agency were overwhelming.

Apparently included in the slash were Oregon's 36 civil defense field hospitals and the surplus property program. Sandstrom said it probably would be up to the federal office to decide what to do about field hospital units.

Gov. Mark Hatfield originally asked the legislature for \$195,000. This, with federal matching funds, would have expanded the agency to 20 persons. With proposed state funds the agency would be left after June 30 with three persons.

Hatfield charged the legislature was guilty of "failure to uphold public responsibility."

He charged: "The peace-alternative plan will rejoice at this decision. Those who support strong military preparedness have failed to come forth. I think this is a tragic day in Oregon."

Effects Studied
What effect the cutback will have on county CD organizations remained to be seen.

The Portland City Council has voted to eliminate its city organization.

Sandstrom said at least three counties — Clatsop, Deschutes and Multnomah, are deleting funds for civil defense.

Hi Jackson, Clackamas county director, pleaded with the council to retain as many CD functions as possible.

In Washington, meanwhile, Sen. Wayne Morse lashed out Tuesday at the national CD program.

In answer to a plea from the Defense Department for aid in getting the slashed Oregon CD funds restored, Morse said the action was evidence of "increasing suspicion in our country that much of the civil defense program is unrealistic, wasteful, and tends to create a false security in case of nuclear war."

Kentucky Voters Soundly Defeat Happy Chandler

Louisville, Ky. — (UP) — Edward T. Breathitt Jr. left even his most ardent supporters a bit stunned today with the magnitude of his victory over A. B. (Happy) Chandler for the Democratic nomination for governor of Kentucky.

Facing in his first try for political office the man many Kentuckians thought was unbeatable, the 38-year-old Hopkinsville attorney racked up a plurality that approached 60,000 votes.

Returns from 2,512 of 3,017 precincts showed Breathitt with 284,749 votes to 228,156 for Chandler. Two other candidates polled 19,410 votes between them.

Victory Apparent Early
Breathitt's victory was apparent within one hour and one-half after the last polling places closed. In counties which traditionally had been Chandler strongholds, he either won or narrowed Chandler's margin considerably. And in areas where it was thought Breathitt would win, he built up even larger pluralities than expected.

Making the victory even more surprising was that only a year ago Breathitt was a virtual unknown. Although had served two terms in the state legislature and had served as personnel commissioner, his name was not fa-

Common Aspirin Tablet Claimed To Bring on Internal Bleeding

San Francisco — (UP) — The common aspirin tablet, long a household remedy for an assortment of ailments, causes internal bleeding and may lead to ulcers and anemia, a Pennsylvania medical educator said Tuesday.

studies had shown that 60 to 70 per cent of the population will lose as much as a teaspoonful of blood in the stomach after taking two aspirin tablets.

He described experiments with human beings and animals which revealed that aspirin caused a high incidence of ulceration of sensitive body tissues and a significant degree of internal bleeding.

"Although a teaspoonful isn't very much, it indicates that discrimination should be used in taking aspirin," Roth said.

He added that bufferin or other compounds make little difference in the harmful effects of aspirin tablets.

Roth said the blood loss was not dangerous unless a person suffered from anemia. But, he continued, some individuals will occasionally lose as much as three ounces of

blood internally without knowing it.

Roth recommended against the use of aspirin by persons with such ailments as peptic ulcers, gastritis or any inflammation of the stomach or gastrointestinal tract.
