Listening Device Detects 'Silence'

Palo Alto, Calif. (AP)—A super-sensitive listening device developed by a Palo Alto electronics firm is helping to make life in space safer.

The device, called an ultrasonic translator, is able to pick up the "silent" sound of oxygen escaping from holes smaller in diameter than a human hair.

Delcon also markets the battery-operated device to private firms for finding leaks in pressurized telephone cables and industrial air pressure or steam systems.

A bill requiring state licensing of psychologists was signed into law Wednesday by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

Portlander Rejects Green Invitation

Portland (AP)—Portland City Commissioner Stanley Earl Wednesday turned down an invitation to testify before the House Armed Services Committee in Washington, D.C. on Civil Defense.

Earl said the invitation came from Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore.).

Earl said he declined the invitation because it would conflict with City Council work next week.

Earl said Mrs. Green told him the hearing would be held next Thursday and would take up the matter of Portland and Oregon dropping the CD program.

Earl is to appear Sunday in New York on a television show with Harry Reasoner to discuss the City Council action in abolishing the local agency.

Hatfield Apology Asked by Bircher

Eugene (AP)—The Oregon coordinator of the John Birch Society, Leslie Fleming of Eugene, Wednesday demanded that Gov. Mark Hatfield apologize for remarks he made at the Western Governors' conference about the society.

Fleming said Hatfield was quoted as saying at the conference that the John Birch Society is not a fascist organization but "has some individuals equally dangerous."

Fleming said various members of the organization have tried to find out from the governor who these individuals are.

But he said Hatfield has refused to disclose names.

Fleming said the governor should either name the persons of whom he spoke at Phoenix, Ariz. at the governor's conference or apologize to the society.

Placid Poultry Places Pink Pastel Produce

Dallas, Ore. (AP)—Matilda, an Arqueana hen, lays Easter eggs all year around, according to her owner, Mrs. Frank Weins, Dallas, Ore.

She says the hen lays eggs that range in color from greenish-blue to brownish-pink.

Zip stands for Zone Improvement Plan, the project of the United States post office department, which will go into effect July 1.

But it also signifies just what the dictionary definition states: "To move or act with speed." Acting Postmaster Al Bradford, Chester Silliman, superintendent of mails, and Bryce Kellogg, assistant superintendent of mails, have explained in announcing the Medford post office's participation in the new program.

After July 1, anyone living in the Medford area will be living in "975." That's the Zip code number for the section to be served by the Medford post office.

Adoption of this code number will speed up movement of the mails in all parts of the nation and the first thing for local individuals to remember, Bradford emphasized, is to put the code number on return addresses. Those living within Medford will add an "01," those under Central Point delivery an "02." Other zone digits, as the latter numbers are called, will be announced in the near future.

The Zip code is designed to speed delivery of out-of-town mail, lessening the chances for letters to go astray and eliminating the necessity of reworking a great volume of mail, the Medford staff related.

The new designation number consists of five digits. The first digit, or "9," stands for the Pacific Coast. The second number, in this case the "7," signifies Oregon; the third, the "5," identifies the sectional center, the city of Medford, and adjacent areas.

In addressing mail the Zip Code number (complete) should be placed on the same line and one space after the name of the state to which the letter is being sent, Bradford said. For example:

Mr. John Doe
626 State st.
Medford, Oregon 97501

Or if writing to someone under Central Point delivery:

Mr. John Doe
626 State st.
Central Point, Oregon 97502

Using the Zip code in return addresses will speed delivery throughout the nation, Bradford advised, particularly in dealing with firms or agencies handling a large volume of mail.

"The company to which you are writing can oftentimes presort electronically all future mailings directly to you, by-passing a number of mail-handlings," he explained.

Other large volume mailers, Bradford said.

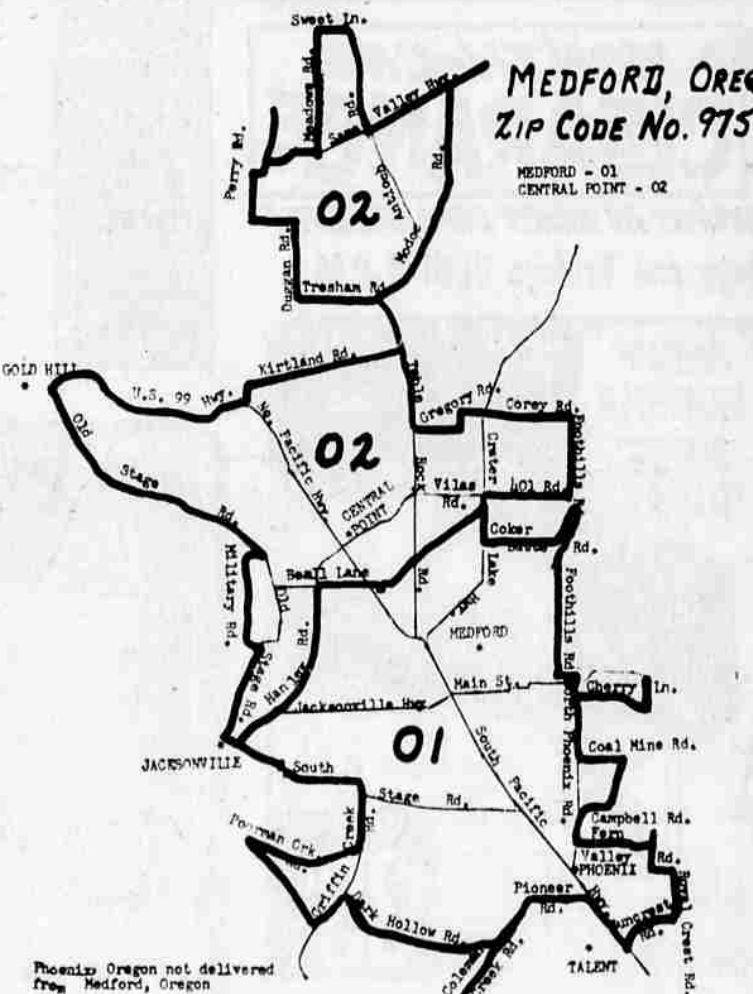
There are seven sectional centers in Oregon, of which Medford is one. The others are Portland 970, Salem 973, Eugene 974, Klamath Falls 976, Bend 977, and Pendleton 978.

Jackson and Josephine counties are both included in the Medford center. Parts of Eastern Oregon will be served through the Boise, Idaho, sectional center which is 970.

Introduced as a reminder of the new post office code is a cartoon figure, identified as "Mr. Zip," which Bradford predicts will become as well known as "Smoky the Bear" and "Reddy Kilowatt" in the southern Oregon area.
