

Opponents of Northwest Power Preference Delaying Action

Washington - UPI - House opponents of a Senate bill giving the Pacific Northwest preference of power produced from Columbia river dams appeared set today to employ delaying tactics in an effort to kill the measure.

Rep. Craig Hosmer (R-Calif.), for example, succeeded Wednesday in delaying completion by the House reclamation subcommittee on the administration bill which would pave the way for construction of transmission lines to carry power from the Pacific Northwest to Los Angeles.

He failed, however, in an effort to turn the hearing into a wide-range probe of Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall's power policies.

An effort by Hosmer to question Udall on nuclear power plants was thwarted by objections from Rep. Jack Westland (R-Wash.), one of the sponsors of the bill to guarantee the Pacific Northwest first call on power generated at federal dams in the area.

Hosmer, who questioned Udall for about an hour, succeeded in prolonging the hearing beyond the time the committee could sit.

Committee Chairman Walter Rogers (D-Tex.) said he would seek unanimous consent for the committee to sit

while the House was in session, but Hosmer and Rep. John P. Saylor (R-Pa.) indicated they would object.

Hosmer repeated charges that Udall was seeking to gain control of the entire national power network.

After Hosmer had questioned Udall, Rep. Harold T. Johnson (D-Calif.) asked unanimous consent that each

member be limited to 15 minutes.

Hosmer demanded a vote, contending that he should be allowed to continue because it dealt with "the future of American power and who's going to control it."

After losing on a 7-4 vote, Hosmer protested that a quorum was not present. Rogers, who had not voted, rejected the protest because the required 12 members were present.

Rep. James A. Haley (D-Fla.) at one point threatened to turn the hearing into a table-pounding shouting match when he demanded that Udall tell how much a federal intertie would cost.

"You don't seem to have any regard for coming here to tell the truth," he shouted when Udall replied that he

would testify on the cost figures before the Appropriations Committee.

Udall insisted repeatedly that the Interior Department already had authority under existing law to build the 1,000-mile intertie. But he

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Glenn Visions Man On First Moon Trip

Tokyo - UPI - Marine Lt. Col. John H. Glenn Jr. predicted today that the first U.S. spaceship to reach the moon will carry men rather than experimental animals or automatic machinery.

America's first man in orbit told the Foreign Correspondents' Club that the flights made so far by U.S. spacemen proved that man can operate safely without overmuch automatic protection.

"The main thing we learned from Project Mercury is that we don't need all those automatic systems," he said. "Man is capable of operating in space. He suffers no vertigo, no unconsciousness, no body deficiencies that we know of. We will not have a completely automated trip to the moon before man goes. Man will go as an integrated part of the vehicle on the very first trip."

Increased Aid To Aged Envisioned

Salem - UPI - A broader program of medical assistance for the aged in Oregon is envisioned under a bill that passed the Senate Wednesday.

It returned to the House for concurrence in Senate amendments.

Oregon participates in the federal Kerr-Mills program of grants to the states for hospital and nursing home care for persons over 65 with limited incomes. Participation in the program during its first two years was slow.

The new bill relaxes eligibility requirements and brings welfare nursing home care under the program in order to win additional federal money.

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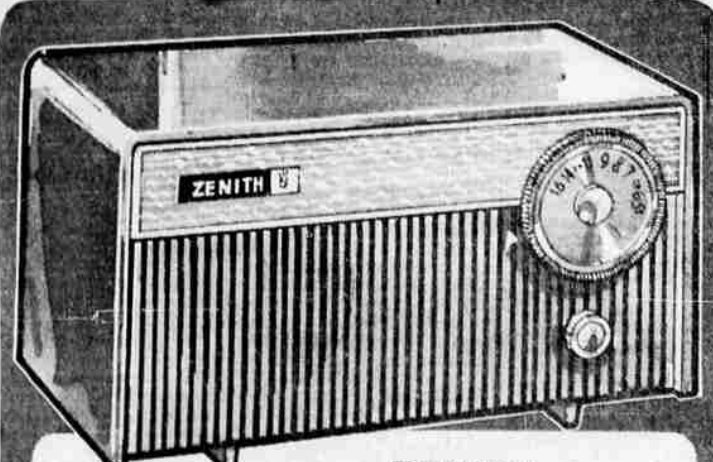
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
