

### Southwest Game Units Revised

Big game hunters are advised that several big game management units in the southwest region of the state were either revised or eliminated and new units established in an effort by the game commission to more effectively manage the big game resources in this area.

Management units effected include the Temmie, Coquille, Umpqua, Douglas, Butte Falls and Green Springs, all of which have been abolished and the areas included into existing units or into new units.

The Siuslaw unit as re-established will include only that portion north of the Lane county line to highway 36. The south half of highway 36 and the entire Temmie unit will be incorporated into a new unit called the Elkton unit.

Umpqua Split The Umpqua unit will be split north and south, with the western portion and the entire Coquille unit incorporated into the new Tigra unit. The east half of the old Umpqua unit, plus the northeast corner of the Powers unit and a strip of the Douglas unit taking in all agricultural areas to the east of highway 99, will be incorporated into the new Melrose unit.

### Rodriguez 7-5 Choice Over Emile

New York—(UPI)—Luis Rodriguez of Cuba and Miami, Fla., is a 7-5 favorite to defeat Emile Griffith of the Virgin Islands and New York City at Madison Square Garden next Saturday night and retain the welterweight championship of the world.

The 15-round, nationally televised title bout—scheduled to begin at 10 p.m. (edt)—will be the feature bout of the week's boxing schedule.

Rodriguez will be seeking to repeat his March 21 victory over Griffith at Los Angeles, Calif., and thus gain the stature which he feels has been withheld him as champion. The rugged Rodriguez has won 50 of his 52 professional bouts and has scored 21 knockouts.

Griffith Twice Champ Griffith, who has held the title twice, could become the first man to hold the welterweight championship three times. Griffith won the crown the two previous times with victories over Benny (Kid) Paret—the second of which resulted in injuries that cost Paret his life.

Emile, who fights in furious flurries, has won 35 of 39 pro bouts and scored 12 kayoes. The rules calling for eight-ounce gloves, a compulsory eight-count on knockdowns and the three-knockdown rule will be in effect despite the fact that it is a championship match. Griffith is assured of \$37,500 while Rodriguez is guaranteed \$40,000.

Laud your big guns, on the mound the likes of ageless Warren Spahn and in the batter's box such as Mickey Mantle or whoever your personal favorite might be.

But don't forget the one-time "whiz kid," the six-foot, two-inch guy from Illinois with the bland baby face and the iron will which you need to reach a spot among the greats.

He was whipped on the big week end but there were extenuating circumstances. He throws for a light-hitting ball club and he was sent out against a group which murders you with muscle.

So Roberts lost and his record dropped below par, now being one of four victories against five defeats. But for a guy living out there in the middle of the diamond on "borrowed time" he's doing a magnificent job at 36.

Name, if you will, some of the great ones who climbed the pitcher's hill.

Chief Bender, Mordecai Brown and Joe McGinnity if you remember back then to the immortals or another day. Well, the "Chief" piled up 212 victories in the age of the dead ball and McGinnity surpassed him with 248. "Three-Fingered" Brown had only 239.

Passes Two Roberts, who has been overlooked in the confusion which attends the never-ending efforts of the fabulous Spahn and his current total of 334 triumphs, has driven well past Brown and the Chief and at the moment is on a par with McGinnity.

Can you guess some of the others he is within striking distance of at this moment?

Urban Faber won only five more than Roberts has as of now. Ted Lyons a mere 12. Bob Feller hit 18 and the rugged Red Ruffing but 25.

The adulation of the rubber-arm Spahn, who defies the calendar even now with his current mark of seven wins against three defeats, is well deserved. The sharp-featured Brave must eventually go into the record books as probably the greatest left-hander of them all on 12 seasons in which he won 20 or more games.

Sold to Yankees But there is a preponderance of right-handers over left-handers and you have to consider that last spring the one-time fireball ace of the Phillies was considered washed up.

Roberts was sold to the Yankees at the end of the 1961 campaign and, when he re-

### ported to spring training last year, he was highly hopeful. He never pitched a game for the world champions because, they decided, it was time to go with pitching youth instead of age and experience no matter how fat the headlines of the past were filed.

In May, when even the aging ballplayer's heart is full of hope, he was released. Thirteen days later he was signed by the Baltimore Orioles. He told them he still felt he could be a winner.

"I gave his a chance because I respected the man and his word," said General Manager Lee MacPhail.

It produced a payoff on veracity. Roberts in the second half of the season had a 10-9 record and received an award from the UPI for the comeback of the year.

He was beaten Sunday. But this happens to all of them, even the Spahns. The real fact is that for a man on borrowed time he still is a menace on the mound, and rising rapidly among the all-time winners.

### Famed Pitcher's Nephew Signs Major League Contract
