TROPICAL STORM MOVES THROUGH PACIFIC Tokyo—Tropical storm Polly, downgraded from a typhoon, moved rapidly through the northwestern Pacific today, according to U.S. Air Force weathermen here.

RED CHINA ISSUES 246TH 'SERIOUS WARNING' Tokyo—Communist China charged that two American warships intruded into territorial waters Tuesday and issued its 246th "serious warning" to the United States, the new China news agency said in a broadcast monitored here today.

STRAUSS TO BE GUEST AT ISRAELI RECEPTION Tel Aviv—Former West German Defense Minister Franz Josef Strauss will be guest of honor at a reception given by the Israeli Defense Ministry, it was learned Tuesday.

Strauss' visit to Israel has been protested by extremist groups here. His itinerary has been kept secret to avoid incidents and the date of the reception has not been announced, but it probably will be held shortly before his departure.

Stock List Shows Promise of Moving Into Higher Range

New York — Stocks showed promise of moving higher today.

Steels presented their best showing in recent sessions as Youngstown, Bethlehem and Lukens all moved around a point higher. Other issues in the group firmed.

Chrysler again was in the spotlight in the motors with a gain of 1 1/2 while American Motors and Ford inched fractions higher. General Motors lost a small fraction.

Du Pont worked back from an opening loss of around 2 to show a small gain, while Eastman Kodak and Union Carbide eased slightly. Amerada and Kerr McGee were standouts in a mixed oil section.

In estimating the value of a property, Vandagriff urged the association members to consider all expenses involved. 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Military Power Must Be Tied To Political Moves, JFK Says

Colorado Springs, Colo. — President Kennedy said today the Cuban crisis last fall demonstrated that military power must be tied closely to political and diplomatic decision in the future. "Whatever the military motives and implications of that reckless attempt to place offensive missiles on the island of Cuba may have been, the political and psychological motives and implications were equally important," Kennedy said.

Openings Available For Swim Classes

California Governor Appeals For Death Penalty Moratorium

Sacramento, Calif. — California Gov. Edmund G. Brown made an 11th hour appeal to the state legislature today for adoption of a limited 4-year moratorium on the death penalty.

"It would provide California for the first time with the means for settling the death penalty issue on the basis of meaningful experience instead of passion and prejudice," the governor said.

Brown, a devout Roman Catholic who staunchly opposes capital punishment, made his plea in a special statement issued only hours before the bill goes before an adverse state senate committee.

"Some of you will fly the fastest planes, reach the highest altitudes and lift the heaviest payloads of any aviator in history," he told the graduates. "Some of you will hold in your hands the most awesome destructive power that man has ever conceived."

"Some of you will work with the new leaders of new nations which were not even nations a few years ago. Some of you will support guerrilla and counter-guerrilla operations that combine the newest techniques of warfare with the oldest techniques of the jungle."

"And some of you will help to develop new planes that spread their wings in flight, detect other planes at unheard of distances, deliver new weapons with unprecedented accuracy and survey the ground from incredible heights."

Thus the President pictured what he called the "onrush of technology" which he predicted would lead to a constantly expanding role for the U.S. Air Force.

Importance Not Diminished Kennedy also said the greatest value of "these new weapons of massive retaliation" lay in their ability to deter the very war which would require their use.

But he pointed out that the deterrent factor did not diminish the importance of new devices as weapons. "Nor will national security in the years ahead be achieved simply by piling up bigger stocks of bombs or burying our missiles under bigger piles of concrete," the President added.

"For in an imperfect world—where human failures and follies have too often been the rule instead of the exception—the surest way to bring on the war that cannot happen is to sit back and assure ourselves that it cannot happen."

The President said the existence of mutual nuclear deterrents could not be shrugged off as a mere stalemate. Constant Reappraisal "For our national security, in a period of rapid change, will depend on constant reappraisal of accepted doctrine, on alertness to new developments, on imagination and resourcefulness and new ideas," he said.

After his speech the President toured the academy and then went to the North American Air Defense Command Headquarters for a classified briefing before leaving for the White Sands, N.M., missile range.

California Governor Appeals For Death Penalty Moratorium

The moratorium bill, authored by Assemblyman Lester A. McMillan (D-Los Angeles), already has passed the Assembly but is running into difficulty in the Senate governmental efficiency committee.

Designed as a compromise, the bill would outlaw the death penalty in California for the next four years except in the case of double-murders, kidnap-killers, persons who slay police officers and prisoners who kill while in prison.

The Senate committee, headed by Sen. Luther E. Gibson (D-Vallejo), scheduled an evening hearing on the bill. Public statements from Gibson and other committee members left little doubt it will be killed after the witnesses are heard.

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
