

# Utah Firm Receives Big Oregon Project

Salem—UP—A Salt Lake City firm was low bidder on a big Oregon highway project Tuesday at \$5,896,356.

Gibbons and Reed of the Utah city bid that amount for work on the Cello-Biggs section of the Columbia River highway in Wasco and Sherman counties, including grading and structures.

## Portland State to Train Peace Corps People for Turkey

Portland — A Peace Corps program to train 47 Americans for service in Turkey will be established at Portland State college this summer.

The \$125,000 federally supported program has received final approval from Peace Corps headquarters in Washington, D. C., according to project officer Dr. John Dart, professor of geography at PSC. Another Turkish training project also is scheduled at Georgetown university this summer.

Portland State was selected for the Turkish project because of the college's growing reputation in the field of Middle East studies, Dr. Dart

said. PSC has the only federally supported undergraduate program in Middle East studies in the nation.

Volunteers are expected to arrive in Portland Aug. 18 and begin training Aug. 19. The group will fly in from Puerto Rico where they have been enrolled in a physical conditioning program, Dr. Dart said. The group will leave Portland Nov. 2 for two weeks home leave and additional training in Turkey.

Peace Corps trainees will undergo an intensive 11-week training program consisting of 300 hours of Turkish language training, 100 hours each of area and technical studies, 60 hours of American

studies, world affairs and communism, 55 hours of physical education, 30 hours of personal health and 15 hours of Peace Corps orientation.

PSC's graduate school of social work and home economists from Oregon State university also will assist in the program, Dr. Dart said.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Scott were elected to become members of the Grange.

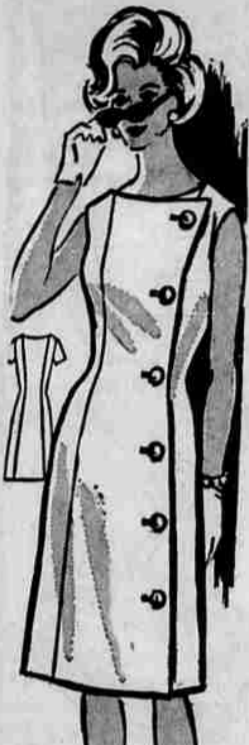
Mrs. Crouch told of various home economics contests planned for the near future, and the HEC scholarship fund.
