Gold Hill Library Lists Summer Reading Plan

Gold Hill — Mrs. Frances Brown, librarian at Gold Hill Public Library, announced that a summer reading club will be held. She also reported new books that are now available for youngsters and adults.

The summer reading club will be about Space Adventure. Children between the ages of 6 and 14 may enroll and are required to read ten books, three of them about space, in order to receive a certificate. Blanks for entering are at the library.

Each child participating in the reading club will have a card with their name on it. As they finish a book, the librarian will enter the name of the book and author on the card. When the child has read ten books he will receive a reading certificate.

Begner; "Brave Men," by Ernie Pyle; "Moses—How to Make and Use 'Moses,'" by Sunset magazine; "In and Out of Character," autobiography of Basil Rathbone; "Harvest of Hope" by Faith Baldwin.

The librarian said the second grades from Patrick Elementary school visited the library recently on a field trip. About 50 pupils were accompanied by their teachers.

Library hours will continue to be the same during summer months as they have been — Monday through Friday from 2 to 5 p.m. and from 7 to 9 p.m. on Tuesdays and Fridays.

Education Center For 4-H Youth To Be Established

Corvallis — Plans are under way by the Oregon 4-H Foundation to establish a state-wide 4-H educational center for youth and adult training programs. The planned facilities would be valued at close to \$1,000,000.

For three years, the foundation has been studying possible sites for a center that could be used for youth and adult training meetings and camping facilities. Main requirements are that the site be located close to the center of population, be equipped for year around use, and be fairly close to Oregon State university and other cooperating agencies.

Last week, foundation members toured the Shellberg falls area 20 miles east of Salem, two miles north of the North Santiam highway near Mehama. Eighty acres of this area are now under lease from the state department of forestry by the foundation. Other areas they have considered are along the North Umpqua in Douglas county, Willamette National forest, sites in the South Santiam area, and an area in Kings valley, Benton county.

In 1961, more than 1,800 youngsters from 25 counties attended camps in Oregon. Yet in some counties more than 200 youngsters were turned down because available facilities couldn't accommodate them. Improved facilities would be helpful in training 350 youngsters who'll be working with youth in the 1963 camping program, said agents.

President Marion Weatherford, Arlington, said that the 4-H training center is only one of the projects the foundation has in mind for the future. Others include continuation of scholarships for college youths, an annual grant of \$3,000 or more for a county extension agent to do further study, funds to develop a geology project, and to share the cost of sending 4-H delegates and leaders to national meetings.

Last year, Oregon 4-H enrollment showed an all time high with 33,976 youths enrolled in clubs that were led by 5500 adult volunteers.

Children Needed For Festival Roles

Ashland — A casting call for children was issued today by directors of the Oregon Shakespearean festival.

Producing Director Angus L. Bowmer said the youngsters are being sought for varied roles in the 1963 productions of "Merry Wives of Windsor," "Romeo and Juliet," "Love's Labour's Lost" and "Henry V."

Director Robert Loper, for his production of "Romeo and Juliet," requires one boy, aged 7 to 12, and three other children, also aged 7 to 12.

The "Henry V" cast, according to Director Jerry Turner, will need one boy 9 or 10 years of age, of light or medium build.

Edward Brubaker, director of "Merry Wives of Windsor," has asked for two boys, aged 6 to 12, and four girls, also aged 6 to 12.

The roles are open to any Rogue valley child, and they may confer with directors at the festival theater in Ashland from 10 a.m. to noon on Thursday, June 13. The brief interviews will require no preparation.

Educators Leave for West Germany Tour

Salem—Dr. Leon P. Minear, state superintendent of public instruction, along with nine other chief state school officers, left Sunday for a four weeks' tour through the Federal Republic of Germany (West Germany) at the invitation of His Excellency Heinrich Knapstein, the ambassador of the Federal Republic of Germany.

The all-expense paid tour, to extend from June 10 to July 7, will provide an opportunity for the American school superintendents to become acquainted with present-day Germany and to familiarize themselves with the educational system and the current educational trends in West Germany.

Dr. Minear plans to visit the Berlin technical schools. He has been asked to consult with the school on its development program. Visits will also be made to schools in Frankfurt, Cologne, Hanover, Berlin, and Munich.

Lane County Jail Escapee Captured

Eugene—UPI—A larceny suspect who escaped, handcuffed, through a small window in the Lane county courthouse Sunday was recaptured by police south of Cottage Grove early today.

Larry Miller, 23, of Creswell, was re-arrested in a car near the Douglas county line about 5:45 a.m.

Miller was left alone briefly Sunday morning in an interrogation room in the county courthouse after his arrest on a grand larceny charge. He apparently squinted through a small transom window and dropped 5 1/2 feet to the ground, even though his hands were secured behind his back.

Officers said the car which the woman was driving was registered to Paul William Garren Jr., 19, of 1575 Grand ave. According to reports, Garren was a passenger in the vehicle at the time of the accident. He received a slight injury, officers said, but did not require hospitalization. Police reports stated the woman fled the scene of the accident on foot.

Montague — Simon Koppes, 90, one of Montague's oldest citizens, died June 1 in the Siskiyou County hospital where he had been a patient for ten days.
