Millions of Dollars Allocated By Legislature for Pay Boosts

Salem — Millions of dollars were allocated by the 1963 legislature for pay increases. State agency and department heads had their top pay upped from the \$120 a year increase received by the employment commissioner, to the \$2,100 a year hike received by the director of finance and administration. A total of \$4.2 million was set aside with the emergency board, made up of legislators, for increases in civil service and unclassified personnel pay rates. The state board of higher education received \$1,781,627 for pay raises for academic personnel. This money is in addition to automatic merit increases received by employees.

Governor Gets \$21,500
The governor was raised \$1,500 to \$21,500 a year. In addition, he receives \$600 a month for expenses. The secretary of state and state treasurer also received a \$1,500 pay increase, bringing their pay up to \$16,500 a year. The attorney general and labor commissioner were raised \$1,000 a year to \$16,000.

Pay for the newly-created position of state fire marshal was set in a range from \$8,200 to \$10,140. The pay for the secretary of the racing commission, who was given the additional duties of pari-mutuel supervisor, was increased \$6,840 to a top of \$12,840. The annual salary of the superintendent of public instruction was unchanged, and still ranges from \$14,800 to \$17,700.

Salaries of state policemen were increased. The top pay for recruits was upped \$120 to a top of \$4,800. Privates were upped \$180 to a top of \$5,820; privates first class up \$120 to \$6,600; corporals up \$120 to \$6,900; sergeants up \$300 to \$7,500; lieutenants up \$480 to \$8,560, and captains up \$900 to \$9,900.

State agency and department heads had the top of their salary ranges upped as follows: Adjutant General, up \$1,260 to a top of \$12,300; Director of Aeronautics, up \$800 to \$9,200; Director of Agriculture, up \$1,320 to \$13,320; Superintendent of Banks, up \$780 to \$11,880; Commission for the Blind Administrator, up \$600 to \$9,300; Superintendent of School of the Blind, up \$480 to \$11,880; Director of Civil Defense, up \$600 to \$9,300; Secretary of the Board of Control, up \$1,440 to \$12,840; Corporation Commissioner, up \$780 to \$11,880; Superintendent of Oregon State Correctional Institution, up \$600 to \$13,800; Superintendent of School for the Deaf, up \$440 to \$11,880; State Engineer, up \$840 to \$12,840; Executive Secretary of Oregon State Fair Commission, up \$420 to \$9,720; Superintendent of Fairview Home, up \$1,380 to \$19,880; Director of Department of Finance and Administration, up \$2,100 to \$16,500; State Fisheries Director, up \$960 to \$12,360; State Forester, up \$900 to \$13,800; State Game Director, up \$600 to \$13,800; Director of Department of Geology and Mineral Industries, up \$780 to \$11,880; State Health Officer, up \$1,380 to \$19,880; State Highway Engineer, up \$720 to \$19,020; Superintendent of Hillcrest School, up \$440 to \$11,880; Superintendent of Eastern Oregon State Hospital, up \$1,280 to \$19,680; Superintendent of Columbia Park State Home, up \$480 to \$11,880; Superintendent of Danmaach State Hospital, up \$1,280 to \$19,680; Superintendent of Oregon State hospital, up \$180 to \$19,680; Superintendent of Oregon State Tuberculosis hospital, up \$600 to \$17,100.

The three State Industrial Accident Commissioners, up \$600 to \$12,360; Insurance Commissioner, up \$780 to \$11,880; Clerk of State Land Board, up \$540 to \$10,140; State Librarian, up \$480 to \$11,880; Liquor Control Administrator, up \$540 to \$14,340; Superintendent of McLaren School for Boys, up \$1,200 to \$13,800; State Marine Director, up \$240 to \$8,540; Director of Department of Motor Vehicles, up \$1,140 to \$12,840; Director of Parole and Probation, up \$960 to \$12,360; Warden of Penitentiary, up \$420 to \$15,420; State Police Superintendent, up \$600 to \$13,800; Real Estate Commissioner, up \$780 to \$11,880; Executive Secretary of Public Employees Retirement Fund, up \$840 to \$12,840; Administrative Officer of State Soil Conservation Committee, up \$600 to \$9,300; Three State Tax Commissioners, up \$720 to \$13,320; Department of Employment Commissioner, up \$120 to \$13,320; Public Utility Commissioner, up \$480 to \$14,880; Director of Veterans' Affairs, up \$1,140 to \$12,840; Secretary of Water Resources Board, up \$780 to \$11,880; Public Welfare Administrator, up \$1,080 to \$14,880; Highest-paid state employee is the Legislative Counselor of Higher Education, who receives a \$26,000 salary, a house, car, and an expense allotment.

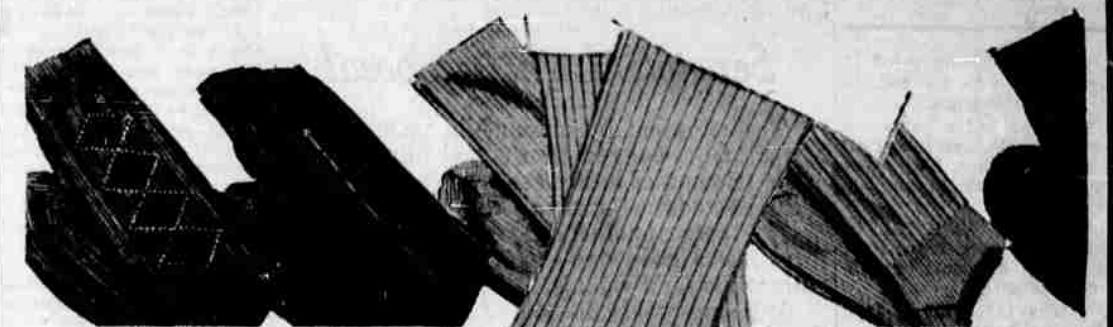

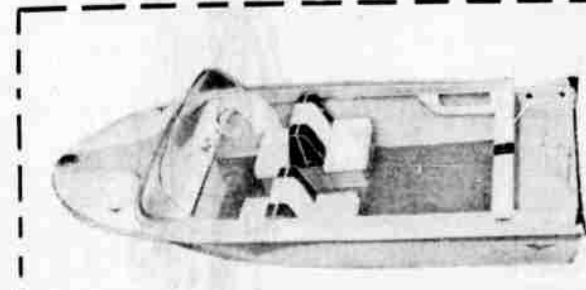
