### Stocks Moving Toward Higher Ground; Steel Prices Mixed

New York—(UPI)—Stocks were moving toward higher ground today.

Steels were mixed. Chrysler moved ahead nearly a point in a firm motors section and Virginia Carolina Chemical continued to meet demand in its group.

International oils were narrowly mixed. Philip Morris jumped close to 2 points in a generally firm tobacco group. Electronics showed several good gains including IBM up 1 1/2 and Naveg and Texas Instruments up around 1 apiece.

Colgate jumped nearly a point on news the directors had approved a 5 for 4 stock split and voted an extra dividend. Merck and Bristol-Myers picked up 1 each in the drugs while 20th Century Fox lost 1.

### Foreign Briefs

#### GREEK LEADERS CONFER ON NEW GOVERNMENT

Athens, Greece—(UPI)—Greek political leaders consulted today on the formation of a new government that would end the crisis caused by the resignation of Premier Constantine Caramanlis.

Caramanlis quit Tuesday in a dispute with King Paul, who rejected his premier's advice to call off a scheduled royal visit to Britain next month.

#### KOHLER LEAVES FOR EUROPEAN VACATION

Moscow—(UPI)—U.S. Ambassador Foy D. Kohler left for a European vacation Wednesday night and was expected to consult with President Kennedy when he visits Western Europe later this month.

Kohler departed for Wiesbaden, Germany, via Copenhagen in his special plane.

#### SOUTH AFRICAN SHOUTED DOWN BY DELEGATES

Geneva—(UPI)—A South African delegate was shouted down at the 47th International Labor Organization conference Wednesday by angry African and Asian delegations.

The Africans and Asians, who seek South Africa's ouster from the organization because of its racial policies, threatened to walk out when South African Delegate William Findley took the rostrum. Heckling caused adjournment of the meeting, and Findley was unable to speak.

#### TSHOMBE SWINDLERS BEGIN SENTENCES

Brussels, Belgium—(UPI)—Two Belgians began prison sentences today for swindling Katanga President Moïse Tshombe out of \$95,000 by forging his name.

The Brussels correctional court also ordered them to pay \$23,000 compensation to Tshombe.

### Prime Minister Again in Cabinet Crisis Meeting

London—(UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan fought for his political life at a crisis meeting of his cabinet for the second time in two days today and political observers said the next 24 hours might determine the fate of his government.

The 69-year-old Conservative party leader made it clear to his ministers including three or four reported to be considering resigning — that no matter what they did he would seek to lead his regime through the crisis caused by the Profumo sex scandal.

#### 'No Comments'

Cabinet members filed grimly out of the meetings, most of them returning curt "no comments" to questions. Minister of Health Enoch Powell, reported in both national afternoon newspapers to be "on the brink" of resignation, hurried away his face set and unsmiling.

Political observers said one major resignation — such as Powell's — might make it impossible for Macmillan to hold together an administration already under fire not only from his opponents but from "the establishment," a term which covers the church, professional class and aristocracy from which it drew much of its strength.

#### Gives Curt Reply

Asked whether the government would remain together, Minister of Science Lord Hailsham snapped "You find out."

Minister of Housing Sir Keith Joseph, who earlier had denied that he planned to resign, said "Every minister is concerned by the moral issues," a comment echoed by Deputy Prime Minister R. A. Butler.

#### Debate Forced

Although the Labor party has forced a parliamentary debate Monday on the security aspects of the Profumo case, it appeared many political figures and the public at large were more concerned with what the bishop of Southwark called "the smel of corruption in high places."

Patrick Gordon Walker, who would become foreign secretary in a Labor government, returned from Moscow saying, "It is time to clean things up in Britain." He called for Macmillan's resignation.

### Hilton Heard As Delegation Requests Funds

Washington—Oregon's Congressional delegation has urged House and Senate appropriations subcommittees to approve about \$6 million more for Oregon water projects in the next fiscal year than President Kennedy has budgeted.

Ben Hilton, Grants Pass, president of the Rogue River Flood Control and Water Resources association, also testified in support of several projects in southern Oregon.

Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) presented the requests to a Senate committee, headed by Sen. Allen J. Ellender (D-La.) for himself and Sen. Maurice Neuberger, a nd Representatives Edith Green, Al Ulman and Robert B. Duncan, Democrats.

The group suggested that the committee approve \$61 million to continue construction of the John Day lock and dam in the year to start July 1, compared with the budget recommendation of \$57 million.

Other projects where the group asked above budget amounts include:

- Planning: Lower Columbia River, S e a p o o s e drainage district, \$10,000 (nothing in budget); Willamette river basin, Shelton Ditch \$10,000 (nothing); and Bear creek \$26,000 (nothing); Lost Creek reservoir \$230,000 (\$100,000 in budget); Elk Creek reservoir \$150,000 (nothing); Applegate reservoir \$150,000 (nothing); Cascadia reservoir \$150,000 (nothing); Columbia Slough \$19,000 (nothing); Coos and Millicoma rivers \$545,000 (nothing); Siuslaw river and bar \$21,000 (nothing); Willamette river above Portland \$46,000 (nothing); Willamette river at Willamette Falls \$85,000 (nothing).

Investigations and studies: Beaver creek \$5,000 (nothing); Nestucca river \$5,000 (nothing); Tillamook Bay streams \$5,000 (nothing); Coos Bay, Charleston \$3,000 (nothing); Herman creek \$2,000 (nothing); Columbia river \$200,000 (nothing).

Hatfield's Requests  
Thomas J. Murray, representing Gov. Mark O. Hatfield of Oregon, said the governor asked the committee to approve budget recommendations for Oregon and also the addition of funds which Army Engineers would be able to use during the year.

Hilton testified in support of funds for Lost creek reservoir, Elk creek reservoir and Applegate reservoir, which are a part of the Rogue river basin flood control project.

Ulman, Green and Duncan testified or submitted statements at a House committee hearing.

### California Senate Republicans Split On Budget; Approval Seen

Sacramento—(UPI)—Democratic leaders, encouraged by a last-minute Republican split, predicted confidently today the GOP would fail to delay passage of Gov. Edmund G. Brown's budget.

The spending program, trimmed by \$43.8 million, cleared the Senate late Wednesday, 27-10.

Two Republicans, Sens. Howard Way of Exeter and Donald Grunsky of Watsonville, voted with 25 Democrats to send the \$3,207,010,000 spending program to the assembly.

As usual, the assembly, which passed a larger version of the budget earlier in the week, was expected to refuse to accept the senate measure. This will force the budget bill into a free conference committee of three assembly-

men and three senators. Republicans had threatened to hold firm against passage of the spending bill until the governor's proposal for a state withholding tax is defeated. The withholding bill comes before Senate revenue and taxation Monday.
