

O'Toole Chalks Up 11th Victory Of Season for Cincinnati Reds

United Press International Cincinnati's Jim O'Toole, who a year ago was just emerging from an early season slump that doomed his 20-victory chances, is setting a pace this year that may make him the National League's most successful lefty in 28 years.

The 27-year-old southpaw scored his 11th victory and fifth shutout of the season Wednesday night as he pitched the Reds to a 3-0 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

With a start like that O'Toole is in position to reach the 25-win mark for the season—a total no National League left-hander has achieved since Carl Hubbell won 26 games for the Giants in 1936.

Only a year ago O'Toole was bogged down at 4-7 and even a strong finish earned him no more than a 16-13 mark for the season. O'Toole and Jim Maloney (9-2) have kept the Reds "alive" and still hopeful that they can improve their current fifth-place stand-

ing if Joey Jay and Bob Purkey round into form.

The hatching night were Vada Pinson and Frank Robinson, who have been making mincemeat of Pirate pitching all season. Each had two hits, scored a run and drove in a run. Pinson is hitting .405 in 10 games against Pittsburgh, pitching this season while Robinson's average is .486 with six homers and 13 runs batted in.

beat the Chicago Cubs 3-1, the Los Angeles Dodgers routed the Houston Colts 9-1, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 6-2, and the Milwaukee Braves romped over the New York Mets 9-0 in other NL activity.

Strikes Out 14

Bob Bolin pitched a four-hitter and struck out 14 batters to win his third game for the Giants. Willie McCovey drove in all San Francisco's runs for the second straight game when he clouted a pair of homers off Bob Buhl, whose record was squared at 3-5.

Johnny Podres scattered 10 hits to win his fourth game for the Dodgers behind a 13-hit attack that included four hits by Maury Wills and three by Tommy Davis. Wills also stole his 15th base of the season as the Dodgers defeat Don Nottebart his fourth defeat against five victories.

Art Mahaffey went 6 2/3 innings to win his third game as the Phillies knocked out Ron Taylor and Bobby Shantz with separate three-run rallies.

Hank Aaron hit his 18th homer of the season and drove in five runs to make it a breeze for Lew Burdette to win his sixth game. It was the 10th consecutive victory the Braves scored over the hapless Mets at Milwaukee.

Joe Adcock Stars As Tribe Surges into AL Contention

He's Joe Adcock, the gangling, drawing, free-swinging first baseman from Coushatta, La., who spent 13 years with the Braves before they decided he was unlucky and traded him last November to the Indians.

Big Joe said at the time that he couldn't understand the trade. Today it's quite likely that neither the Indians nor the Braves can fathom

what possessed the Braves to make it, either.

Adcock, 35, is one of the major reasons why the Indians are surging into American League contention with six straight victories and nine in their last 10 games. He's hitting a hefty .304, has collected eight homers and knocked in 24 runs.

Adcock drove in three runs with a homer and two singles and Jerry Kindall also had three hits Wednesday night as the Indians whipped the Detroit Tigers 12-6 to reach the .500-level at 26 wins and 26 losses.

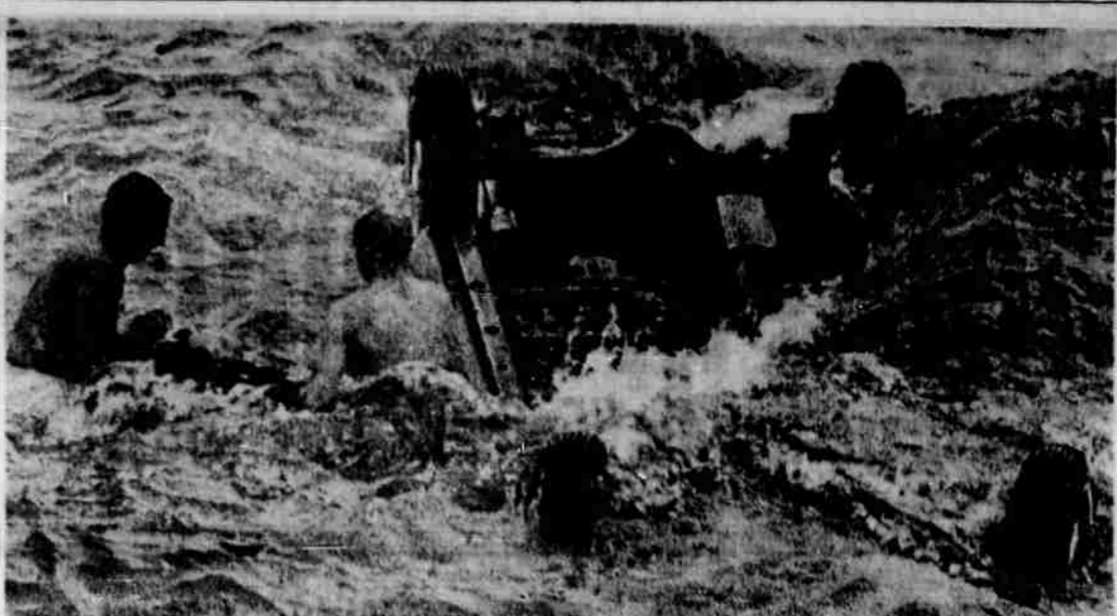

Goldwater Ahead, Nixon Believes

New York—(UP)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon believes that Sen. Barry M. Goldwater (R-Ariz.) has eclipsed New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller as the most likely candidate for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

Nixon's views were given Wednesday as he left Idlewild airport with his family for a six-week vacation in Europe. They arrived this morning in Lisbon.

Nixon refused to comment on the impact of Rockefeller's recent remarriage, but said he felt that "Goldwater has gained sharply over Rockefeller in the last two months." Rockefeller married Mrs. Margaretta Murphy May 18.

Goldwater now "has the lead," according to Nixon. The former vice president said this view was shared by "professional politicians" in the GOP.

Scouting Disaster Claims 13th Life

Escalante, Utah—(UP)—The 13th victim of the Escalante scouting expedition disaster died Wednesday night in a Panguitch, Utah, hospital, raising the toll to seven Boy Scouts and six adults.

Marvin Porchatis, 29, Salt Lake City, died after remaining in critical condition since the tragedy 35 miles southwest of here Monday afternoon.

Brake failure caused by an empty master cylinder was

blamed for the mishap. The open bed truck, carrying 46 persons, stalled on a steep hill as the driver attempted to shift into a lower gear. It rolled backward, then crashed down a 35-foot embankment, killing 13 persons and injuring 33.

Bolin Shaping As Starter for San Francisco

San Francisco—(UP)—Bob Bolin, who is paid primarily to be the San Francisco Giants' ace relief pitcher, shaped up today as the starter that the club needed to replace the faltering Jack Fisher.

"Johnny Reb," as the Giants call the fireballing South Carolinian, struck out 14 batters Wednesday night while hurling San Francisco to a 3-1 victory over the Chicago Cubs.

As a result, the Giants moved into a second-place tie with the St. Louis Cardinals. Bolin, now 3-0 was tabbed by manager Alvin Dark to start the first game of Sunday's doubleheader against the Houston Colts. Fisher is struggling with a 3-7 mark and seems to have been bypassed in recent games.

"We'll just see how everything goes along," Dark added when asked if Bolin had crashed the starting rotation on a permanent basis.

Halfield Signs 58 Bills Into Law

Salem—(UP)—Gov. Mark Halfield Wednesday signed 58 measures into law, the largest single day's group of bill signings this year.

Included were bills creating a metropolitan study commission, creating the office of state fire marshal, and establishing a new civil defense advisory board.

One of the package of traffic safety measures—one making it an offense to flee a traffic officer—was signed.

Also receiving the governor's signature were two of the sex-offender bills—one transferring juvenile cases in some counties to the Circuit Court, the other requiring offenses against children's cases to be tried in Circuit Court.

Also approved was a moratorium on state aid for new community colleges a truth in lending bill, and a change in the design of Oregon's auto license plates. The slogan "Pacific Wonderland" will be eliminated from the new plates.

Tulelake Refuge Approval Urged

Washington—(UP)—The Senate Interior Committee Wednesday recommended the passage of a bill introduced by Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.) for preservation of the Tulelake Wildlife Refuge on the Oregon-California border.

Approval of the Kuchel bill instead of a bill by Sen. Clair Engle (D-Calif.) was viewed as a victory for conservationists.

The bill was amended to include language specifying that the present pattern of land leasing for farming operations might be continued. But Kuchel said the amendment would not weaken administration of the land "for the major purpose of water-fowl management." He also said the bill would not open the way for homesteading on the land.

The bill would bring 6,891 acres of public lands in the Clear lake region of Modoc county under protection thus bringing the total to 133,000 acres.
