'Sorry Record' of Kennedy Hidden, Eisenhower Says

Hershey, Pa.—UPI—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower said Thursday night that only a "cunningly manipulated veneer of imagery" hides President Kennedy's "sorry record."

Eisenhower said many persons are upset by the administration's "non-action and headlong retreat on matters of national survival and domestic well-being, on which were promised firm, unequivocal decision and action."

Catch Phrases
"The roll call—a long record of glowing promises and anemic deliveries—would include such campaigning catch phrases as 'missile gap,' 'stroke of the pen,' 'strong presidency,' 'get the country moving again,' and so on," he said.

The former President spoke at a dinner meeting of about 75 Republican leaders attending a two-day workshop sponsored by the National Republican Citizens committee.

Besides heaping scorn on Kennedy, Eisenhower, still the nation's No. 1 Republican, stoutly defended the committee.

The committee itself was veering into the field of policy-making at the risk of offending the congressional GOP bloc.

Eisenhower said the citizens' organization was in business to stay despite "eyebrow raising" from Republican old timers who "are allergic to citizen movements."

Separate Groups
The committee began a two-day workshop session Thursday, meeting in three separate groups with some non-partisan advisers present. Eisenhower presided over a group dealing with "critical issues," while the others discussed big city political or-

Lower Elevation Forest Roads and Trails Are Open

Roads, trails and campgrounds in the lower elevations of the Rogue River National forest are open this week end, according to the weekly recreation report from the supervisor's office in Medford.

Snow was reported in the Applegate district at the 7,500 foot level. Trails are open, except for Butte Fork which is closed due to a washout.

Roads that are closed include Glade creek, closed by mud; Yale creek, washout; Ashland loop, snow, and Carberry, slide. Logging traffic is reported heavy on Middle Fork, Sturgis and Thompson Creek rds.

All campgrounds are open except for Wrangle.

In the Butte Falls district snow pack is reported in the Seven Lakes basin and crews are opening lower elevation trails. The trails in the higher elevations will not be open for three or four weeks, according to Forest service officials.

Travel is not advised on Parker Meadows rd., and heavy logging traffic will be encountered on the Lodgepole rd.

Prospect district reports snow at the 6,000 foot level. Maintenance has begun on the Anderson Mountain trail.

Main Roads Open
Both Buzzard Mine and Halls Point rds. have been graded and all main roads are open. The motorist will encounter logging traffic week days on Woodruff creek, Abbott creek, and Woodruff Access rds.

The Union Creek Recreation trail is open in that ranger district, according to the Forest service, with snow at 6,500 feet. This trail in the higher elevations will be worked on later.

The road to Hershberger is blocked by snow and felled timber, with the majority of the other roads open, including the road to Huckleberry mountain.

All campgrounds are open except the south side of Union Creek campground, which will be closed most of the summer due to the Oct. 12 storm.

Tax Extension Approved by House

Washington—UPI—The House has agreed to extend for another year federal taxes on corporations and such consumer items as new cars, liquor, beer and cigarettes.

The legislation, requested by President Kennedy, now goes to the Senate which undoubtedly will enact it before the July deadline. It must be signed into law within 17 days to avoid loss of revenue when the present law expires.

The bill would extend for another year "temporary" tax increases levied in 1951 to help finance the Korean War. These taxes have been extended on a year-to-year basis ever since and presently earn \$4.2 billion in federal revenues.
