

Koufax Blanks Giants Again; Skowron Breaks Out Of Slump

The sensational pitching of Sandy Koufax and indications that Bill Skowron is breaking out of a season-long slump made the Los Angeles Dodgers look more than ever today like a hot pennant contender.

Dandy Sandy—who also is known as "Koofoo"—pitched a four-hit, 2-0 shutout against the San Francisco Giants Monday night and Skowron brought across the winning runs for the second straight night.

While Koufax was rolling to his sixth shutout and a season mark that now stands at 10-3, Skowron produced the only two rallies of the night with a third inning double. The former Yankee also delivered Sunday to help the Dodgers split a twin bill with Chicago.

In other National League games, the Cardinals romped over the New York Mets, 8-1, the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Cincinnati Reds, 4-2 and the Pittsburgh Pirates topped the Milwaukee Braves, 9-3 in other NL games.

In the American league, the Cleveland Indians shaded the Washington Senators, 1-0, and the Baltimore Orioles beat the Boston Red Sox, 7-2.

Throw Five-Hitter
Ernie Broglio pitched a five-hitter for his eighth win behind a Cardinal attack that was concentrated in the first four innings during which Bill White homered, Curt Flood had two doubles and Ken Boyer had three straight singles. It was Broglio's third straight win of the season over the Mets and the unearned run they scored against him in the seventh inning was their first against his pitching.

Roy Sievers' three-run homer, following a deliberate walk to Wes Covington, and Don Demeter's homer, both in the sixth inning, gave the Phillies their seventh win in 10 games with the Reds. Ryne Duren went six innings to win his second game with Jack Baldschun spinning three scoreless innings to clinch the triumph. John Taitouris suffered his second loss for the Reds.

Rookie Willie Stargell hit

two homers and knocked in six runs and Bill Mazeroski and Bob Bailey also homered to lead the Pirates' 12-hit attack. Don Cardwell pitched an eight-hitter to win his third game. Hank Aaron, the major league leader, hit his 19th homer of the season for the Braves.

The second place Angelinos and third place Giants resume their series tonight when Bob Miller 4-3 faces San Francisco's Jack Sanford 8-5 in a righthanded duel.

Miller has lost all three of his lifetime decisions to the Giants and is 0-0 against them this year. He sustained all three setbacks last season while toiling for the New York Mets. Sanford has a 14-8 lifetime mark against L.A.

Koufax, who hurled a no-hitter at the Giants on May 11, avenged a first inning blasting which they handed him 13 games later. Last night's crowd of 36,878 watched him hold San Francisco to four singles and strike out nine to edge ahead of teammate Don Drysdale in their race for the league's strikeout crown. Sandy now leads 111-110.

"I've usually done pretty good in this park," Koufax said after Monday night's tidy job. "The Giants took me apart here that last time but I'm entitled to beat them again the next time if I can."

Skowron, who the Dodgers obtained last November from New York in a straight trade for Stan Williams, entered the contest with only six runs batted in for the season.

He stepped in during the third inning with men on first and third and hit what looked to be a sharp single to right which brought home Maury Wills from third. Then the ball skipped through right fielder Felipe Alou's legs and Skowron tugged the blow into a double while Ron Fairly scored all the way from first.

The Giants mounted their biggest threat in the second inning when they loaded the bases on a walk to Jim Davenport, Joe Amalfitano's single and an error by second baseman Jim Gilliam on Billy O'Dell's grounder. But Jose Pagan whiffed on a high fast ball to end the frame.

The Giants tried again the ninth when Jim Davenport led off by singling then Ed Bailey, who had struck out twice, rapped into a double play and Amalfitano looked at a third strike.

O'Dell was tagged for eight hits and his third loss in 12 decisions.

Haystack Calhoun Due in Seven-Man Battle Royal At Armory on June 27

A seven-man battle royal, featuring Haystack Calhoun, the world's biggest wrestler, will headline the all-star professional wrestling card at Medford armory on Thursday, June 27.

Soldat Gorky, who was suspended when he failed to appear here on the last card, has appealed to the Medford state athletic commission for reinstatement so that he may appear on the card.

Others slated for action in the free-for-all are Ivan "Killer" Kameroff, Andre Drappe, Catalina George Drake, Abe Jacobs and Judo Jack Terry.

The battle royal will be an over-the-top affair in which a participant must be thrown, pinned or rolled over the top rope and his feet must touch the floor in order to be eliminated. The last man left in the ring will receive a purse of \$300.

Three supporting matches will complete the card, by far the biggest attraction Promoter Elton Owen has ever presented here. The top preliminary will send Gorky against Drappe for 30 minutes

or two out of three falls. If Gorky is not reinstated, his place will be taken by another top heavyweight. Two one-fall matches, for 20 minutes, will see Jacobs clash with Terry and Drake go against Kameroff.

To the idle go the spoils—or so it seemed in the Pacific Coast league Monday night.

Take Spokane, for example, while the Indians enjoyed a leisurely day off they jumped into second place in the Northern Division when second place Portland dropped a 5-1 decision to Seattle.

And in the Southern Division, the idle San Diego Padres moved to within a half game of pace-setting Dallas-Fort Worth which lost 5-2 at Hawaii, only the Denver Bears, who suffered a 9-4 setback at the hands of Salt Lake City, failed to capitalize on the Rangers' defeat.

Southpaw Bill Spatswick turned in one of his best pitching performances of the season in Seattle's victory. He pitched no-hit ball in all but one inning and that tainted frame was the seventh when Portland put together three consecutive singles for its only run.

Dave Hall provided Seattle's offensive punch with three hits and three runs batted in.

Herb Plews' inside-the-park home run in the eighth with a runner on capped Hawaii's game-winning three-run rally. All three runs were unearned after the Rangers' first baseman, Ray Jablonski, committed a two-base error on a Tom Satriano hit.

Carlos Bernier accounted for Hawaii's first two runs with a home run that extended his consecutive game hitting streak to 15. George Banks had a two-run homer for Dallas-Fort Worth's tallies.

The best news of the night for Hawaii came at the turnstiles of Honolulu Stadium which admitted 2,850 fans to push the season's attendance above the 100,000 mark.

Bill Cowan and Bob Will who each slammed home runs to pace Salt Lake City's 12-hit attack against Denver. The Bees erupted for five runs in the first inning and were never in serious trouble.

Catcher Phil Roof hit two home runs to account for three of Denver's four runs.

Dupas Gets Nod Over Denny Moyer

Baltimore—(UPI)—Ralph Dupas, the little buzz-saw from New Orleans, doesn't care how he wins 'em, so long as he does, and today he still is the world junior middle-weight champion.

The 27-year-old Dupas kept his title Monday night by beating former champion Denny Moyer of Portland, Ore., for the second time within seven weeks, again on a 15-round decision that was close.

Ralph out-speeded and out-danced the ex-champion, from whom he took the title last April 27, and his stronger punching at close range was enough to earn him the decision which was booed by a small crowd of 2,544 in the new, 13,000 seat Civic Center.

"I knew I had him all the way," Dupas said. "It may have looked as though he hurt me a couple of times, but he didn't. I was in good shape — better than the last time when I had been idle for more than three months."

The decision was unanimous in favor of Dupas, who scored the 101st victory of his career against only 17 losses and two draws. For Moyer, who was the 6-5 favorite at fight time, it was his 10th loss against 37 victories.

Moyer originally won the newly created division title by outpointing Joey Giambra at Portland, Ore., on Oct. 20, 1962. He defended against Dupas last April and lost the title on a close decision in New Orleans, which many called a "home town decision" in favor of Ralph.

Dupas circled the baby-faced Moyer consistently with fast foot-work and kept throwing leather at the 23-year-old Denny as he circled — sometimes hitting from a crouch and other times leaping in with long jabs and straight rights. There was no knock-downs in the bout.

The three ring officials favored Dupas on a five-point basis as follows: Referee Benny Goldstein, 70-66; Judge Eddie Leonard, 69-68; and Judge Jimmy Jones, 69-68.
