

# Certificates Given Students of Aquatic Course at Emigrant

Students of the Jackson County Red Cross Youth Aquatic Course finished up a busy week with a graduation ceremony on the Southern Oregon college campus last week.

Dr. Elmo Stevenson, college president and chairman of the Jackson county chapter of the Red Cross, presented certificates and insignias to the 44 students who had participated in the week-long training session.

A total of 35 first aid certificates were awarded, 25 senior lifesaving certificates, 7 junior lifesaving certificates and 33 basic canoeing certificates.

Five students received their water safety instructor certificates with three additional instructors receiving certification for having reviewed the training. Six new water safety aides were also certified during the ceremony.

**Save Life**

The week-long program this year proved to be an exciting one, according to Mrs. Roy Wilkes, director of the school. On Tuesday the students performed a rescue on Emigrant lake and were responsible for saving the life of Gerald Chambers of Junction City.

Thursday noon, members of the Red Cross board of directors, conducted their regular monthly meeting on the shore of the lake in order to observe the students in training.

Lifesaving students demonstrated the methods of entering the water, approaches, the various releases used in breaking holds, a number of carries and the methods of artificial respiration.

Of special interest to the

board was the demonstration of a mass bottom search which was done by a line of swimmers doing repeated surface dives and groping along the bottom with their hands. This is used in areas where it is impossible to see the bottom and when the exact location of a drowning victim is unknown. This is the method that these same students used when they recovered Gerald Chambers from the lake.

**Demonstrate Boat Rescue**

Robert Dionne, Red Cross area representative, had students demonstrate boat rescue, how to hand paddle a submerged craft to shore and a group of the more advanced students participated in an unusual race.

On the starting signal, the one-man crews mounted the gunwales, near the stern, and propelled the canoes toward the finish by alternately bending and straightening their knees to bounce the canoe along. This is a sport that should not be attempted by the unskilled, it requires exceptional agility and coordination and competency in swimming as well as canoeing, according to Dionne.

Mrs. Wilkes said the program has proven so successful during the past two years that plans are already under way for a session next year.

Corvallis—World record holder C. K. Yang of UCLA and 15 other hopefuls had joined the field through Wednesday for the National

AAU Decathlon Championships June 28-29, but there was some doubt about Yang's physical condition.

The husky Formosan has been bothered by torn rib cartilage and was forced to pass up the pole vault event in the National Collegiate championships at Albuquerque, N.M., last week end.

Other entries so far include those of Pvt. Paul Herman, former Westmont college standout who collected more than 8,000 points in the meet in which Yang set his world record of 9,121, and Steve Pauly of Oregon State.

Dave Edstrom, former Oregon athlete now at Oxnard Air Force base, also is entered.

## Federation Cup Finals Played

London—The United States team of California's Darlene Hard, Billie Jean Moffitt and Carole Caldwell met Australia's Margaret Smith, Jan Lehane and Lesley Turner today for the title in the first Federation cup, the women's version of the Davis Cup.

The U. S. trio whipped Britain 3-0 in the semi-finals Wednesday, while the Aussie girls scored a similar victory over South Africa. The United States, Australia and South Africa were the favorites when the tourney got underway on Monday with 16 nations in the field.

Miss Hard, the No. 1 U.S. player who is seeded fourth at the Wimbledon championships beginning Monday, crushed Ann Haydon Jones, 6-2, 6-4. Miss Moffitt followed with a 6-3, 3-6, 6-4 win over Christine Truman, and Miss Hard later teamed with Miss Cardwell to score a 2-6, 9-7, 6-3 doubles win over the Truman-Jones tandem.

## 17-Year-Old Paces Lefties

Pebble Beach—Although little Joseph Lopez, a slight 17-year-old from Socorro, N.M., was the nominal leader going into today's third round of the 28th National Left-Handed Amateur golf championship, the two-time New Mexico high school champion won't have a chance to win the national title.

Tournament rules call for the younger set to play in a flight of their own and bat off the ladies' teas the final two rounds.

However, the 5-foot, 7-inch, 130-pounder didn't need any help in posting his "leading" 75-73-148 for the first two days of play. He played the Monterey Peninsula club's shore and dunes courses in order, just like the men did.

Actually husky Bob Wilson, a Lyle, Wash., lumberjack who was runner-up for the title in 1960, held a two-stroke edge on the field after 36 holes of play. He shot a 75-75-150 for the two rounds.

In the second place was the first day leader Harvey Rascoe, Inglewood, Calif. The Southern California champ had 74-78-152.

## Boating Accidents Should Be Reported

Seattle—The Coast Guard reminded boat owners today that most boating accidents must be reported.

In Oregon all boating accidents resulting in death or injury to any persons or property damage in excess of \$100 must be reported to R. G. Ritzenhouse, director, Oregon State Marine board, room 311, State Capitol building, Salem. If loss of life results from the accident, a report must be made within 48 hours. All other accidents must be reported within five days.

Motorboats which have been inspected and certificated by the Coast Guard to carry more than six passengers for hire or to carry freight for hire, and those large motorboats which have been documented by U.S. Customs are required to report directly to the Coast Guard in addition to any report required by the state of Oregon.

## Boat Owners Being Cited for Violation

Seattle—One-third of the boats boarded by Coast Guard boarding teams in the Pacific Northwest during April and May, 1963, were cited for violations of motorboat regulations.

According to the Commander, 13th Coast Guard District, 2,616 boats were boarded during this period in Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. Of these, 872 were found without proper equipment or in some other violation of the motorboat regulations.

The figure shows a marked increase in the percentage of violations. Citations are now being issued to boat owners with improperly displayed numbers.

Boat owners desiring information on the proper display of numbers should contact the nearest Coast Guard unit.

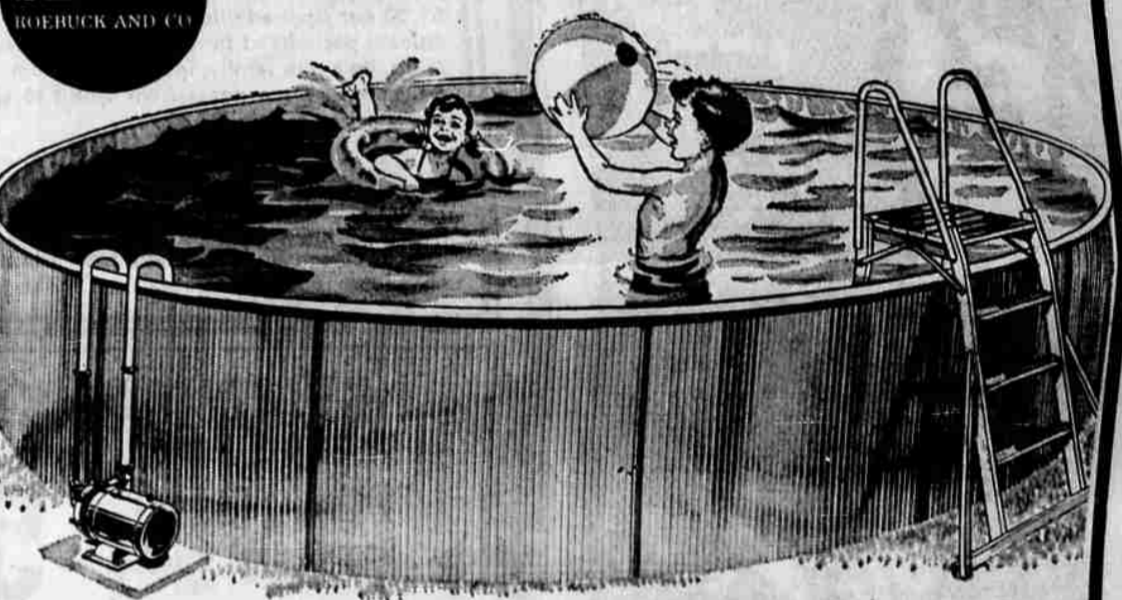
Of the 872 citations issued, 531 were for improper numbers or method of display. Boarding by states shows: Washington, 1,739 boardings, 617 violations; Oregon, 750 boardings, 215 violations; Idaho, 127 boardings, 40 violations.

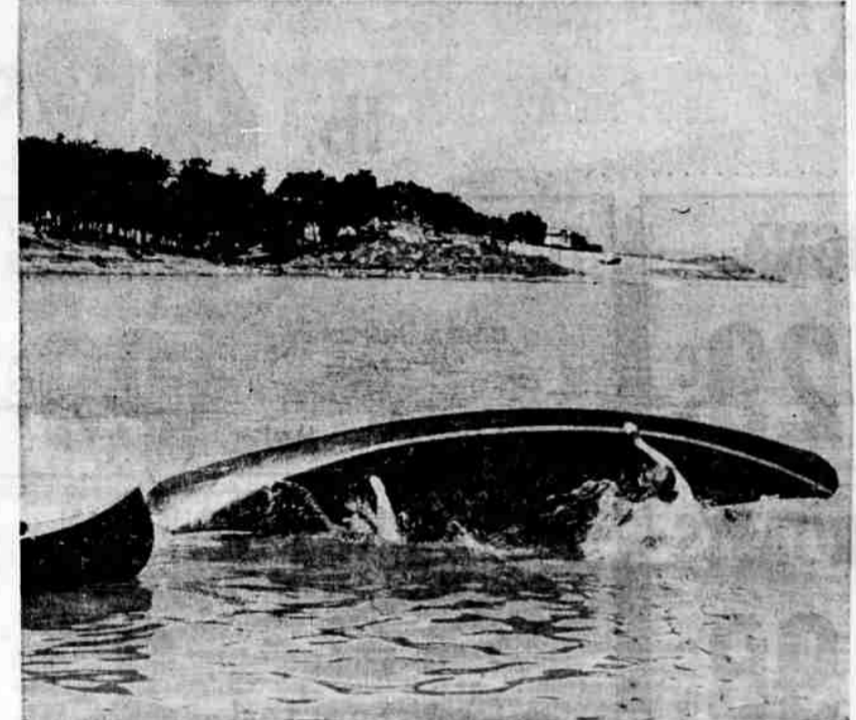
