

# Jose Azcue Cog As Indians Maintain Sizzling AL Pace

Somebody goofed on Jose Azcue, who might have wound up his career in the minors had he not been given one more chance by the Cleveland Indians a month ago.

Azcue had previous trials with the Cincinnati Reds and Kansas City A's, both of whom had written him off as weak hitter with only triple-A potential.

But the Indians acquired him from Portland of the Pacific Coast league in a trade with Kansas City a month ago and have been congratulating themselves ever since.

Taking over as Cleveland's No. 1 catcher when receiver Johnny Romano broke a finger in late May, the 23-year-old Azcue has fashioned a solid .303 batting mark that has helped make the Indians the hottest club in the majors for the month of June.

Azcue helped the Indians to their 18th victory in their last 21 games Thursday night when he drove in four runs with a pair of homers in an 11-8 decision over the Baltimore Orioles.

Gain Five Places  
With Azcue behind the plate in practically all their games the last three weeks, the Indians have spurred from ninth place to fourth, only 3 1/2 games off the pace.

Even with Azcue's two homers Thursday night, however, the Indians still needed another grand slam homer by Max Alvis during a six-run seventh inning to overcome the Orioles. Woodie Held of the Indians and losing pitcher Dick Hall also hit homers during the contest.

Jerry Walker, who relieved starter Dick Donovan in the

seventh inning, was credited with his sixth victory against one loss.

The Yankees rolled to their seventh win in a row by whipping Washington 5-4, the Minnesota Twins beat the Chicago White Sox 9-4, and the Boston Red Sox handed the Detroit Tigers their 10th straight defeat 8-3 in the only other American league games played.

Bobby Richardson's two-run double in the ninth inning off ex-teammate Jim Costas enabled the Yankees to overcome a 4-3 deficit against the Senators, who lost their eighth in a row.

Homers by Harmon Killebrew and Earl Battey plus Zoilo Versalles' triple with the bases full were the key blows in Minnesota's victory over Chicago.

The Red Sox capitalized on home runs by Dick Stuart and Chuck Schilling to score five

runs in the fourth inning and deal the Tigers their third straight defeat under new manager Chuck Dressen.

## Woods, Water, Wildlife

The bureau of reclamation has just come out with its regulations for the Rogue River Recreation area. The regulations pertain to that portion of the Rogue river canyon from the Alameda Bridge to Marial. Lands within approximately one-half mile on each side of the river throughout a distance of 23 miles are included.

**NO VEHICLES**  
The regulations are the usual variety except for the last, which states that "unless otherwise authorized, motorized, wheeled vehicles, pack animals and horses are strictly prohibited except in cases of emergency (such as transport of injured persons from the area, fire suppression, etc.)." Closely translated it means that if you're going into that area you go on foot on the trail or by boat down the river.

**OUCH!**  
Undoubtedly there will be an agonized outcry from the motorized set, and one can expect them to raise quite a bit of noise over the loss of their so-called freedom to ride their peace-breakers wherever they wish. The grass is so poor in this area that the horses probably won't complain much.

**REASONS FOR**  
The bureau has some very good reasons to back the stand it has taken in this regard, and they relate directly to the problems caused. Aside from the fact that the bureau has been requested by many citizens to close the trail to vehicles is the stronger evidence of the damage done to the trail and to the camping areas by motorbikes and horses. The terrain is such that it doesn't take a great deal of "hill climbing" with the bikes, or foraging by the animals to ruin the small camping areas with ruts and piles of manure. It is recognized that there are a number of relatively mature adults with motorbikes who are primarily interested in fishing or camping, but there also are many younger boys who own vehicles with which they search for new and interesting things to do. The fact that the vandalism of camp trails is growing in proportion to the number of vehicles using these trails seems to be an indication of what "new and interesting things" are being found.

**FIRE HAZARD**  
The fact that these motors use gasoline and are extremely hot is good reason to fear the additional fire hazard presented by smokers who ride the vehicles. And again, if those using the vehicles indicated that they were responsible persons, there would not be any felt need for the regulation.

The trail is going to get more and more used by fishermen trying to get to the fish first. The distance to Whiskey creek is not so far and the fishing along it not so poor that an argument for the use of vehicles would carry much weight.

**THRILL FOR THRILL**  
Many of the motorbike riders are interested in finding new thrills for themselves with their new toys. Most of the users of the Rogue River Recreation area who are willing to walk in are more interested in the thrill of experiencing the scenery, or the fishing, or both. It would seem that the former type thrill can be had in some other way than at the expense of the latter type.

**SNAGGERS AGAIN**  
Reports from the river indicate that the snaggers are at it again. One can figure that as the number of salmon in the upper river becomes larger, and the fishing gets poorer, that there are certain so-called fishermen who can't stand the frustration and soon revert to snagging as a means of getting a fish. These frustrates are using legal gear, consisting of a heavy spoon and the largest treble hook the law allows, and jerk their gear through the holes where the salmon lie. It is a well-known fact that they maim and cause a slow death to nine out of every 10 fish they snag. They can be arrested only when they land a snagged fish and are caught at it. We need help in order to stop them.

**WHERE AND HOW**  
Two of the favorite snagging holes at this time are between Casey park and Trail. These spots are marked by many cars and people who do not like interested watchers who ask why they are fishing the way they are. Continued questions usually causes them to leave because you are a witness to what they are doing. Take some time to observe this expression of human behavior. They need it. **THE ANGLER'S LOG**  
The weatherman is calling for cooler climate, and this can lead to a very quiet week end on the fishing front. It's been fairly quiet already, so there really won't be much change.

**Diamond Lake** - Is reported to be holding up fairly well to the stillfishermen with fireball to eggs. The hardware is taking the smaller fish.

**Fish Lake** - Fishing has been slow. Trolling with FFAW seems to find a few. Stillfishing with cheese eggs can do it too.

**Howard Prairie** - Trolling is picking up the smaller fish. Stillfishing with treball eggs will take big fish if you can find the channel.

**Hvatt Lake** - Fishing is fair. Stillfishing is best with cheese or eggs. Files trotted close to shore will find a few early or late.

**Willow Lake** - Fishing has been slow except for those willing to try it all day. Stillfishing for

## McDonald Named at Tennessee

Knoxville, Tenn. - (AP) - The once famed single wing formation, the sword of rugged university of Tennessee teams of the past, was partially sheathed Thursday with the installation of a new coach with new ideas.

Jim McDonald, 48, a former blocking back for Ohio State, promises Volunteer fans they will see their team line up in the T-formation at least part of the time in the coming season and more than half of the time next year.

McDonald Thursday was appointed head football coach to replace the ousted Bowden Wyatt. The university's board of trustees also appointed Bob Woodruff as athletic director, a position that had not been permanently filled since the death of Gen. Robert R. Neyland, the man credited with putting Tennessee on the football map.

Wyatt, 47, presently a patient in a Virginia hospital, was given a year's terminal pay of \$18,000.

The new Vol mentor, Wyatt's assistant at Tennessee for the past eight years, indicated he would begin immediately on plans to sprinkle T-formation plays into the Tennessee offense.

## Giants' Kuenn To Start in Right Field

Milwaukee - (AP) - Harvey Kuenn, whose bat sparked in the recent series with the Los Angeles Dodgers, will start in right field for San Francisco tonight against the Milwaukee Braves.

Giants manager Alvin Dark said he would give slumping rightfielder Felipe Alou a rest. Kuenn, hitting .248, will team with Willie McCovey in left field and Willie Mays in center.

This marks Mays' first return to the lineup since he bruised his left instep Tuesday night when he fouled off a pitch against the Dodgers. Another injured Giant, third baseman Jim Davenport, was expected to be ready for action tonight.

Davenport wrenched his wrist swinging at a pitch Tuesday night and missed Wednesday's game as did Mays. Alou, though hitting .278, has been in a leading slump since June 1. One year ago at this time Alou was leading the National league hitters with an average near .340.

Dark has named relief-turned starter Bobby Bolin (3-1) to open the three-game series against the Braves. Bolin, a righthander, will oppose Tony Cloninger (1-4).

## Dodgers To Go Against Cards

St. Louis - (AP) - The Los Angeles Dodgers open a three-game series tonight against St. Louis Cardinals.

Strikeout ace Sandy Koufax (10-3) was out to extend his win streak to four, while his opponent, Bob Gibson (5-3) of St. Louis, goes for his fifth straight victory.

The Cardinals hold a one-half game lead over the San Francisco Giants and lead the third-place Dodgers by two and a half. The Giants play the Braves in Milwaukee tonight.

## Americans Win Federation Cup

London - (AP) - American hopes for success in next week's Wimbledon championships got a big boost today because of Billie Jean Moffitt's plucky play in the Federation Cup.

The United States team of Darlene Hard of Los Angeles and Miss Moffitt of Long Beach, Calif., Thursday scored a 2-1 victory over Australia's Margaret Smith and Lesley Turner to win the first Federation cup - the women's version of the Davis Cup.

Miss Moffitt, ranked No. 3 in the United States, rallied to beat Miss Turner, 5-7, 6-0, 6-3 in singles after Miss Smith had defeated Miss Hard, the U.S. No. 1 player, 6-3, 6-0. Then Billie Jean and Miss Hard combined to beat the same two Aussie girls, 3-6, 13-11, 6-3, in doubles and win the cup.

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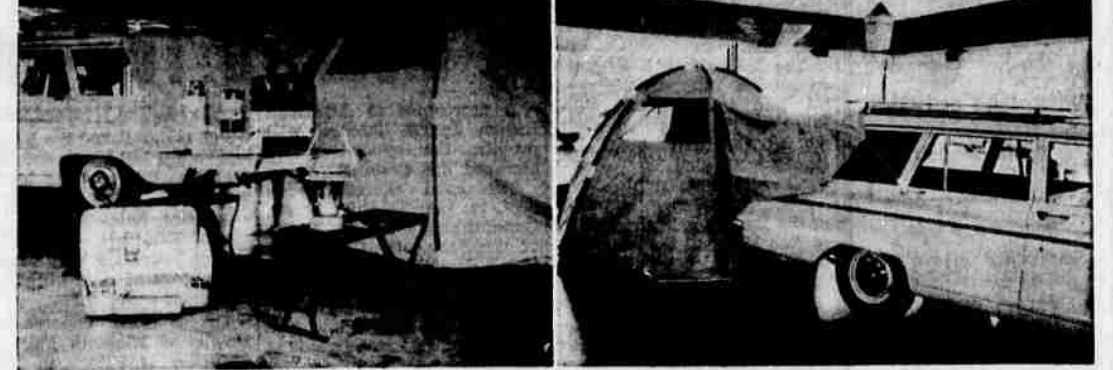
