This could be the year when church people finally succeed in doing something for migrant farm workers. The migrants are America's poorest people. There are about one million of them—men, women and children—who eke out a living by "following the crops." With every one working, including very young children, a migrant family may earn about \$1,000 a year. Many migrants live in squalid shacks towns. They are subject to exploitation by "crew leaders" who serve as brokers of their labor. Their children get little schooling and grow up illiterate, unable to break out of the migrant way of life. They have very high disease and death rates. They are not covered by any of the federal labor laws, they are not represented by a union, and their political influence is nil. United in Appeal
Relieving their desperate plight has been a concern of America's major religious bodies for 40 years. It is one of the few public issues on which Protestants, Catholics and Jews have consistently spoken with one voice. In the conviction that the migrants' problem can be solved only by federal legislation, the major faiths have joined forces in what is referred to in Washington—usually with a patronizing smile—"the church lobby." Year after year, the church lobby has charged forth into legislative battle. Always, until now, it has gone down to ignominious defeat at the hands of the large and powerful farm lobby. A few weeks ago, the House of Representatives took up a bill, backed by the big farm interests, to extend for two years public law 78—the so-called "bracero law"—under which Mexican farm workers are imported into this country to fill the same kind of jobs that domestic migrants seek. The migrant ministry of the National Council of Churches and the National Catholic Rural Life Conference sent letters to all members of Congress urging that Public Law 78 be allowed to expire on schedule at the end of the present year. They said the importation of braceros deprived domestic migrants of jobs, and drove down their already pitiable wages. To the utter amazement of virtually everyone in Washington, the House rejected the two-year extension bill by a roll-call vote of 174 to 158. After the surprise vote, a prominent farm lobbyist stormed out of the Capitol and muttered to reporters: "Those damn do-gooders have put one over on us." It was the first clean-cut victory the church lobby had ever won over the farm lobby, and it was a heady experience. But as Fr. James Vizard of the Catholic Rural Life Conference emphasized, "that was just one battle . . . we haven't won the war yet by a long shot." The farm lobby will try again before the congressional

Guard School Being Conducted in Forest
Grants Pass—Approximately 50 smokejumpers, lookouts and fire guards are undergoing training this week at the Siskiyou National forest's annual guard school now in session at the forest service's aerial project center near Cave Junction.
The school, which ends today, stressed fire detection and suppression techniques. Instructors included men from the five ranger districts in the forest, the Galice, Illinois Valley, Chetko, Gold Beach and Powers Districts, plus supervisory personnel from forest headquarters in Grants Pass.
