

Young GOP Convention Seen as Gigantic Goldwater Rally

San Francisco - (AP) - The 1963 Young Republican National convention, with all the appearances of a gigantic Goldwater - for - President rally, got down to business today.

All Republican presidential candidates were invited to address the convention, but only Goldwater accepted. He will speak Thursday night.

Michael Phillips, chairman of the San Francisco Young

Republicans, who organized the convention, predicted there would be "minor riots" if New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller were to appear.

The demonstrations, Phillips said, would have been sparked by the ultra - conservative group led by Robert Gaston of Los Angeles, which seized control of the host state organization last February.

Local leaders said Rockefeller was warned privately that his appearance here might cause nationally publicized incidents that would embarrass him.

The four - day gathering opened officially Tuesday, but the day's events were dominated by the registering of the more than 1,000 delegates in attendance.

Len Nadassy, the national chairman from Minneapolis, Minn., estimated that at least 75 per cent of the delegates favored Goldwater as the GOP standard bearer.

Goldwater admirers paraded through the Sheraton-Palace hotel lobby and corridors in numerous impromptu rallies. Delegates said it was difficult to find anyone willing to state any other presidential preference.

The convention is forbidden in its by-laws to endorse a candidate for the presidential primaries. But many delegates said they hoped the convention could follow the lead of the California Young Republican Executive Board, which last week passed a resolution urging Goldwater to run.

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Visits To Berlin by Kennedy, Khrushchev Offer Different Views

Berlin - (AP) - President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev are coming closer to meeting this week than at any time since their chilling Vienna conference of June, 1961.

The two leaders are making Berlin trips within two days of each other.

The coincidence, if that's what it is, emphasized that things have changed radically in the two years since the Russian leader tried to frighten the new President into fatal concessions on Berlin and other critical issues.

Receiving Homage

Kennedy today was receiving the homage of hundreds of thousands of West Berliners for his consistently firm stand in their behalf and his determination to bolster Allied military might.

Khrushchev comes into East Berlin Friday for reasons not yet entirely clear.

He and Kennedy, two days apart, will be getting vastly different views of the Berlin situation as each peers across the grim wall from his own side of the barrier which the Communists built to stem the heavy flow of refugees from their zone.

The Soviet leader, facing a bitter ideological argument in Moscow next week with the Communist Chinese, may be drumming up support among the satellites for his peaceful coexistence policy as opposed to Peking's militant stand.

Or he could feel that Kennedy's morale - building visit

to West Berlin called for a similar trip to the East zone by the Russian leader to let the Red - controlled sector know that he has not been frightened.

Administration officials, obviously elated by the warm West German reception for Kennedy during his Bonn, Cologne, Hanau, Frankfurt and Wiesbaden visits, believe Khrushchev may be worried about the impact the President has made.

Whatever Khrushchev's reasons are for going to Berlin just after Kennedy, U.S. officials are convinced the Soviet leader will lose more than he gains from the trip.

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But they also agreed that only the State Supreme Court could decide if the measure legally could be placed before the voters.

O'Connell said he would file a suit soon asking the court to authorize the vote.

"The Supreme Court will have to write some new law on this," O'Connell said, "but unless the measure is on the ballot, the wishes of the people will have been thwarted."

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Chemicals, Rails Pace Downward Drift by Stocks

Norfolk & Western, Great Northern, Chesapeake & Ohio, and Atlantic Coast line lost fractions to a point.

Among the chemicals, Union Carbide shed nearly 1 1/2, off Du Pont and Eastman Kodak lost about 3/4 apiece.

Litton and Texas Instruments weakened in the electronics. Some tobaccos, stores, oils and metals also softened.

Merck and Sterling Drug dropped about 1/2 and 1, respectively, in the drug section.
