Whereabouts of Nikita Khrushchev Basis for Rumors

Moscow—UPI—The big question making the rounds in Moscow's diplomatic circles today was "where is the wandering Nikita Khrushchev?" in the wake of unconfirmed and denied rumors the Soviet leader had paid a surprise visit to Bucharest.

The formula may be literally true since except for rare occasions of diplomatic receptions when reporters can approach a high Soviet leader, their normal access is only to lower ranking officials of the press department.

**Rumors Spread**  
The rumors spread rapidly Tuesday among foreigners but not among Russians at the Kremlin Palace of Congresses here the International Women's Congress was being held.

Such rumors often originate with one person but promptly become the common domain of foreign reporters and diplomats.

Sometimes they turn out to be founded on fact but more often they are not. There is no foolproof way of checking.

**Plausible Version**  
A more plausible version circulated today in foreign circles, mainly that Khrushchev left by train for East Berlin where he is scheduled to arrive Friday to participate in celebrations of Walter Ulbricht's 70th birthday.

According to this account, the two and a half day trip by train to Berlin would give Khrushchev time to stop over somewhere en route, probably in Poland for talks with Warsaw leaders. President Kennedy visited West Berlin today.

**WARS ON PIGEONS**
