

# Diplomatic Opinion Split on Effect of Kennedy's Trip

 Dublin—President Kennedy's brief pilgrimage to revive the pastoral past of his Irish forebears provides a sharp contrast to the previous four days spent in Germany.

From the grim, grey Berlin wall to the green fields of Erin in one day is quite a jump—in both mood and motive.

The President's bell-ringing four-day visit to West Germany, climaxed Wednesday by an emotion-packed tour of Berlin, may or may not have a lasting effect on the course of Allied politics and policies in Europe. Diplomatic opinion is divided on this point.

The President's personal charm undoubtedly sparked much of the acclaim in Bonn, Cologne, Frankfurt and Berlin. In divided Berlin, where he reaffirmed in dramatic language the pledge to defend the free Western sector, the acclaim at times approached adoration.

However, Kennedy did not consider himself engaged in a popularity contest with French President Charles de Gaulle or any other European leader.

The President's strategy emerged more clearly each day in Germany and undoubtedly will be developed further when he visits Italy next week—after a somewhat awkward day in England with sorely beset Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

He seemed to be carrying on two simultaneous campaigns which he obviously believes may result to lessen the chance of nuclear disaster.

—To rally nervous Allies

against attempts by De Gaulle and some others to downgrade the Atlantic alliance, and eliminate suspicions that the United States may abandon West Europe when the chips are down.

—To convince West European leaders that the new Kennedy "strategy for peace" — seeking accommodations with the Kremlin — does not mean that Washington will make deals with Russia at the expense of its Allies.

a European "third force." Kennedy and German leaders already agree on nuclear defense cooperation, including creation of a NATO multilateral nuclear force of Polaris-bearing ships manned by mixed nationality crews. But they decided a final Allied decision must await the end of political uncertainties in Britain and Italy.

A multilateral nuclear force comprising only Germany and the U.S. would be a sitting propaganda duck for Washington's arguments that Kennedy himself acknowledges that Europe at present is beset by too many political uncertainties to make it possible to expect decision on many major issues.

But he hopes he has built a backfire against trends which could wreck the West-

However, most groups held up better than Wednesday. Electronics showed the worst losses with IBM, General Precision, Texas Instruments and Minneapolis-Honeywell off a point or more. Motors were narrowly mixed.

National lost close to a point in a weak steel section. Du Pont and Allied shed around 1 apiece in the chemicals but Virginia-Caroline picked up more than 1.

Some drugs, oils, stores, airlines and cosmetics softened. U. S. Smelting rose more than 1 in the metals. Link Belt and Electronic Associates were among the few point-sized gainers.



**Glenn Archer Will Arrive in Medford**  
 Glenn L. Archer, Washington, D. C., executive director for Protestants and Other Americans United for the Separation of Church and State, will arrive in Medford at 7:45 o'clock tonight.

## Deputies Trained To Handle Cases

Los Angeles — (UPI) — The Los Angeles district attorney's office has begun training some of its deputies in the medical sciences to improve their ability to handle certain types of criminal cases.

District Atty. William B. McKesson said the establishment of a medicolegal section of his office was made after complete studies both in this country and in Europe.

"This is a totally new function for a prosecutor in the United States," McKesson said. "In many European countries lawyers specializing in legal medicine are effectively contributing to the judicial processes in the administration of criminal justice."

McKesson said that only recently has the American legal system begun to produce attorneys trained in the medical sciences.

**Difficult Cases**  
 The district attorney said the medicolegal section will handle, either directly or through assisting other deputies, difficult cases involving medical sciences. He said these specialists would work from the investigative stages of a case through the trials.

The experts also will maintain liaison with hospitals, crime laboratories of police agencies and the coroner's office.

County Chief Medical Examiner-Coroner Theodore J. Curphey said his office was more than happy to have the district attorney enter the medicolegal field.

"The establishment of this section by the district attorney is the culmination of a desire expressed by the medical staff of this office to establish a bridge between the forensic pathologist and the prosecuting attorney aiming at a reciprocal understanding of their respective problems and... more prompt and deliberate handling of the increasing load of criminal cases," Curphey said.

McKesson said the value of the medicolegal section probably would not immediately be understood by the public.

"It is common knowledge that 75 per cent of the civil cases which are tried in Los Angeles county involve medical evidence," he said.

"But people do not realize that some crimes may go unrecognized and offenders escape punishment unless such cases are handled by a lawyer who is an expert in legal medicine and scientific evidence."
