



HONORED POSTHUMOUSLY - Robert Lee Owens, 9, an Enid, Okla., schoolboy who died in the icy waters of Government Springs lake last January was saving the life of his best friend, has been posthumously awarded a Carnegie Hero Fund Commission bronze medal. Witnesses said Owens drowned in four feet of water while holding his companion's head above water. The swimming pool located on a hill above the lake has been named the Robert Lee Owens Memorial pool. The award provides \$750 in death benefits for Robert's mother, Mrs. Geneva M. Owens. The youngster whose life he saved is Julius Lennox Franklin, 7, of Enid. (UPI)

Oregon Supreme Court Decisions

Salem—UP—Assessing a one cent per acre forest fire protection tax is a legal exercise of the state's police power, the Oregon Supreme Court ruled Wednesday.

The decision came as the high court reversed a ruling of the Grant County Circuit Court of Judge E. H. Howell, which voided the assessment on the grounds the tax had been levied on realty not assessed on true cash value as required by the constitution.

The high court said "The constitutional provision requiring uniformity of taxation does not restrict the state in

its exercise of the police power as distinguished from the taxing power, because the primary purpose of the money exaction is not to raise revenue but to directly promote the public welfare.

"The one cent per acre levy was solely for fire protection and suppression."

The high court said "If the state is required to exercise its police power because certain properties present a special threat to the safety of the state, those lands can be charged for the costs of this exercise of the police power. The lands against which the

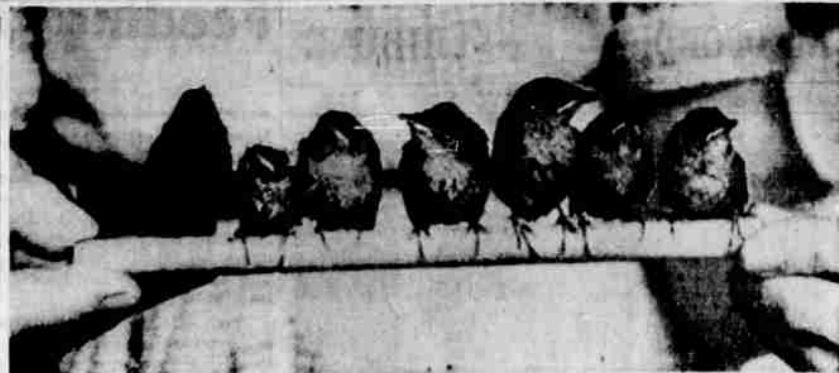
assessment was imposed in this case are those constituting a fire hazard and so present a special threat."

In other decisions the State Supreme Court:

Weight Fear Keeps Many Young Girls Poorly Nourished

Washington—UP—An Agriculture department nutritionist says the fear of being overweight is keeping many teen-age girls from eating adequate diets.

"Whether they are fat or not, most teen-age girls are afraid they are or might be," said Dr. Evelyn Spindler. "That is one reason why a good many of them are not eating adequately."

Dr. Spindler, who works in the department's Federal Extension Service, said there are other reasons why some teen-age girls are poorly nourished. **Not Enough Milk**

"They skip breakfast," she said, "they eat poor snacks (one-fourth of a day's calories may come from snacks), and the drink no milk - or not enough."

Dr. Spindler said the problem is to erase the fear of being overweight from the teen-age mind by showing the girls how they can have normal weight and still eat good, nutritious meals.

She said it is important that youngsters understand how a good diet contributes to correct weight as well as shiny hair, clear skin, and good posture.

Dr. Spindler said teen-age girls are going to do what their friends do - snack, party, and even skip a meal from time to time.

'Empty Calories'

"This need not be especially bad," she said, "if the youngster does it sensibly. She can snack on nourishing foods as well as on 'empty calories.'"

Dr. Spindler's comments were made in the wake of a cooperative study of the diets of 274 teen-agers in three Idaho communities which showed that 30 per cent of the youngsters did not eat enough proper foods.

The study by the Idaho Agriculture Experiment Station, the Agricultural Research Service, and the Idaho Department of Public Health included the seven-day diet records of 150 girls and 124 boys.
