**Allowing Children To Try Things Said Part of Growing Up**

It often is difficult for parents to recognize that a child is growing up. Their enthusiasm for taking care of their children may interfere with allowing the children to mature normally.  
It often is difficult to decide how much you should do and how much you should allow your child to do. Perhaps the child is a better judge, in some cases, than you are. He wants to try things. This is the way he learns. Assuming the activities are not dangerous, why not let him attempt them? He may make a mistake or be unsuccessful but it won't hurt him. Learning by experience is usually more effective than being told the answers.  
Surely you have faced the problem of your child not listening to your suggestions. When reasonable let him try his way. If he is successful, fine. If he fails, perhaps your

suggestions will become more acceptable.  
**Need More Responsibility**  
As children grow older, they need increasing amounts of responsibility. Don't judge them by adult standards. Their success may be inadequate for an adult but they will gain a feeling of usefulness and belonging when they are allowed to participate in family duties.  
Naturally a parent finds it difficult to allow a child to go off on his own for the first time. You will be worried and nervous. But your child needs your confidence as well as his own. Holding him back will increase his dependency. He may develop apprehensions over being on

his own. It is best to allow your child to develop independence.  
On the other hand, don't overdo it. Some parents by starting too early are flirting with danger. Use good common sense. The answer depends on your neighborhood, and where and with whom the child is going. Start off slowly. Allow him a short time and not too far. As he shows his ability to do this

safely you can extend the time and distance.  
**Sure of Love**  
It is important for him to know that you care and are available if needed. A child who is sure that he is loved is usually more relaxed and

willing to be independent. The child who refuses to leave his mother's side may be afraid he will lose her.  
Of course, the growth of independence should increase with age. The teen-ager appears to want complete independence. Actually research shows that this is not so. He appreciates standards and responsibilities. What he does want is a feeling that he is trusted and respected.  
Give this area of growing up some thought. It is most important.

**Fake Detective Killed in Holdup**

Portland - (UPI) - A young man posing as a detective was shot and fatally wounded after striking a bakery proprietor over the head with a blackjack in an apparent hold-up attempt Thursday night, police reported.  
David Arthur Seney, 22, Clackamas, died about two hours after he was shot.  
Edward Visnaw, 53, proprietor of the Butter Crust Bakery on Southeast 92nd ave., told police he was putting away the day's receipts when Seney entered.  
Visnaw said Seney had a badge and said he wanted to "stake out" the bakery because of recent holdups in the area. Visnaw said he became suspicious when the youth went outside and that he got his gun from his living quarters.  
He said the youth returned and asked him to lock all the doors and then struck him on the head with a blackjack. Visnaw said he lost his glasses, but pulled his gun and fired from close range.

The farm is owned by Mrs. Kennedy's stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh D. Auchincloss.  
Mrs. Kennedy and her children were expected to remain here until Tuesday when they will move to Squaw Island off Hyannis Port, Mass., for a long summer stay.  
The President's wife, expecting her third child in late August, planned to return to Washington for a caesarean delivery at Walter Reed Army Hospital.  
President Kennedy planned to join his family at Squaw Island late Wednesday or early Thursday for a long Fourth of July week end.

**Oregon To End Biennium With \$897,000 Balance**

Salem - (UPI) - Oregon will end 1961-63 biennium Sunday with a general fund balance of about \$897,000, Finance and Administration Director Freeman Holmer predicted Thursday.  
General fund revenues for the biennium totaled about \$233 million, Holmer said, about \$22.5 million less than expected.  
The legislature two years ago anticipated general fund revenues of \$255,850,000, Holmer said.

**Tax Refunds Paid**

The bulk of state personal income tax refunds were paid out during June, and Holmer said the refunds would total about \$700,000 more than tax collections for the month.  
To keep the state's general fund from skidding into the red, \$5.5 million was transferred to the general fund this

**More Than Double**

The \$987,000 balance is more than double the \$473,000 forecast by Gov. Mark Hatfield when he announced his proposed budget for the 1963-65 biennium last Dec. 1.  
Some of the state's increased revenue at the end of the biennium resulted because the legislature did not eliminate the liquor purchasers' permit as requested by Hatfield.  
The 1963 legislature approved a \$404 million general fund budget for the coming biennium - the largest in the state's history.  
To finance the budget, a \$80 million revenue increase

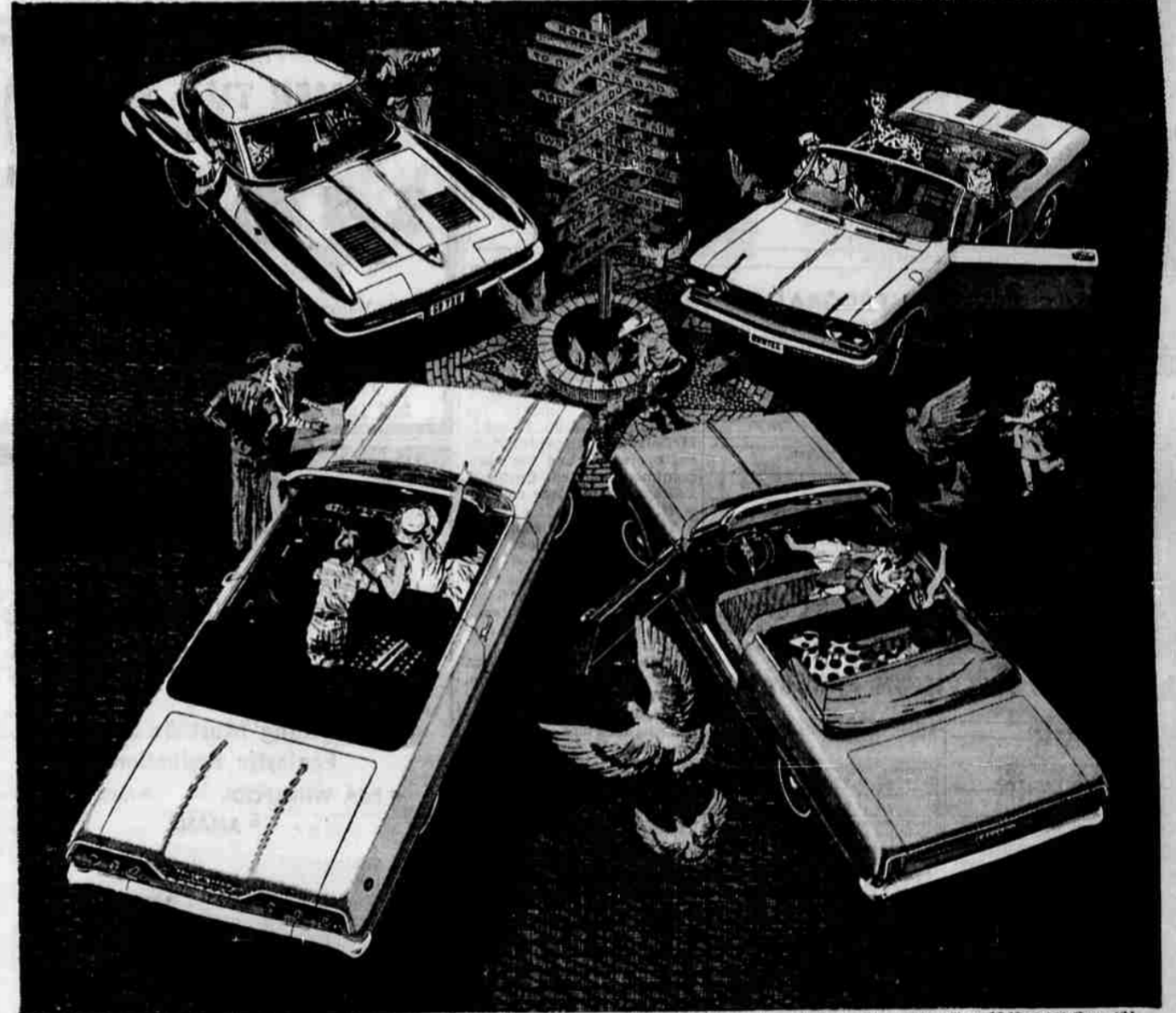
