## State Employees' Pay Hike Approved Through Dec. 31

Salem — (UPI) — Salary increases for state employees were approved only through Dec. 31 by the emergency board today because of the threat of referral of the legislature's \$80 million tax increase measure.

More than \$3.8 million was requested for pay hikes for the biennium which begins Monday.

The emergency board, made up of legislators, said it did not want to approve increases for the full biennium because of the referral possibility.

**No Authority for Cuts**  
House Speaker Clarence Barton (D-Coquille) pointed out that if the full increase was approved at this time, the emergency board would not have the authority to make salary cuts at a later date.

Rep. Stafford Hansell (R-Hermiston) then suggested the \$3.8 million salary increase allotment be divided into 24 equal parts, and that only six parts be allotted at this time.

The move was unanimously approved by the board.

Finance and Administration Director Freeman Holmer pointed out that while the emergency board would not have the authority to cut back on any increases it approved, the governor did have that authority.

**Would Order Cutbacks**  
Holmer added, however, that the governor had indicated he wouldn't order salary cuts, but would instead order staff cutbacks in case of referral.

Barton asked, "If you can cut back on the number of employees if the tax bill is referred, why can't you cut back now?"

Holmer said "we can't reduce the number of employees and still get the work done. If the tax measure is defeated by the voters we will have to make cuts, and it has been decided to cut back on the number of employees, rather than reduce the pay scale."

Leo F. Corrigan of Dallas created plush Terrace house "set in nine acres of dignity and graciousness" to appeal primarily to wealthy couples who want luxury and exclusiveness and are willing to pay for it.

## Thornton Rules on City System Revenues

Salem — (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said today that net revenues of a city-owned water and sewer system must be used to service the system's bonded indebtedness rather than for general governmental expense.

In response to an inquiry from Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr., Thornton said that although the city had the power to levy property taxes to retire the system bonds, this power should not be used unless the system revenues are not sufficient, by themselves, for that purpose.

## Rains Cause Rise In Scab Problem

Present rains have caused an increase in scab on apples, County Horticultural Agent Clifford B. Cordy said today.

There was already considerable scab in local apple trees, he noted.

He advised growers to apply Cyprax at three pounds per acre or 3/4 pounds per 100 gallons of water. This spraying must be completed tomorrow so the effects of the spray can work backward and eliminate the infection, he advised.

Added to this should be codling moth spray with 12 pounds of DDT per acre for air blast sprayers or two pounds per 100 gallons.

In some cases mites are showing up in orchards. Twelve pounds of Kelthane should be applied per acre or two pounds per 100 gallons. Eight pounds of Tedion can be applied or 1 1/2 pounds per 100 gallons where rust mites are showing up.

Those orchards with aphids should apply 3/4 pint of 40 per

## Premier Tries To Save Italian Government

Rome — (UPI) — Premier Giovanni Leone today worked to steady his uncertain government before the arrival of President Kennedy.

Kennedy flies to Milan from Britain Sunday night and then on to Rome the next day for two days of meetings with the premier, President Antonio Segni and Pope Paul VI.

With Leone walking a political tightrope, Kennedy is not expected to get any specific commitments from Italian leaders on future Western defense plans.
