Election Petitions Would Be Safe in Secretary's Vault

Salem—Elections supervisor Jack Thompson says he's not worried about anyone stealing petitions from the Oregon Secretary of State's safe.

Thompson said his office has long been security conscious.

Petitions carrying 82,955 signatures were stolen June 21 from the Washington State Capitol building in Olympia. The theft wasn't discovered until June 24.

Thompson said rigid security provisions were enacted when Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. took office in 1959.

"Strangers just don't go poking around the capitol building at night," Thompson said.

"People who are authorized to work in the building at night carry special passes. 'Why, there've been times when I have been challenged by the security force,'" he commented.

To get into the secretary of state's vault, you first have to get into his offices. These are locked at night and on week ends.

In addition, the capitol building is locked at night, and only authorized personnel have keys. Others have to ask a building superintendent for admission.

During the legislative session the building was left unlocked at night and on week ends, but there were always security personnel on hand, and the non-legislative offices were locked.

There aren't any petitions in the Secretary of State's office at present.

But a petition to refer the 1963 legislature's \$80 million tax increase measure has been filed.

If petitions are circulated - which seems certain - the

signature-jammed pieces of paper will be occupying the secretary of state's vault later this summer.

Thompson doesn't expect anyone to be able to steal them.
