

Couple Leaves Car Stalled on Crossing

An Ashland couple escaped injury Friday night by leaping from a car which stalled on the Southern Pacific railroad tracks at the Neil Creek road crossing beyond Ashland, state police reported Saturday.

Orion Lindon Wells, 66, operator of the auto, and his wife, Della May Wells, 64, of 4735 Highway 66, Ashland, were traveling east on Neil Creek rd. when they approached the railroad crossing about 8:45 p.m. Wells stopped the car at the stop sign, then proceeded to cross the tracks. He saw the train coming and his engine stalled. He and his wife jumped from the car and made a safe landing.

The diesel engine, with John Vern Jensen, 62, of 238 Branstetter st., Dunsmuir, Calif., as engineer, struck the car. It was not badly damaged, state police said, but had to be towed away.

On the Air

A year ago Telstar I, the first communication satellite, orbited the earth for the first time. On Wednesday CBS News will use Telstar II in trying for another first—the first use of instantaneous switching of live television transmission and reception facilities linking the United States and Europe.

Four leading world figures in separate American and European cities will appear together on "Town Meeting of the World" to be seen at 11:20 a.m. Wednesday on KBES-TV and broadcast again that evening.

Participating in the world television forum will be former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, in Denver; former British Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden, in London; Jean Monnet, "Father of the European Common Market," in Brussels; and Heinrich Von Brentano, former Foreign Minister for West Germany and present majority leader in the West German Bundestag, who will speak from Cologne. Walter Cronkite will be anchor man in New York City.

There will be audiences at KLZ-TV studios in Denver from which Mr. Eisenhower will be seen and at the BBC studios in London from which Sir Anthony will broadcast.

By using the "hot switching method," former President Eisenhower can be seen asking any one of the three gentlemen in Europe a ques-

tion. In a matter of seconds the person to whom the question is addressed can be brought in on American screens giving his answer. It works both ways, so that as soon as a question is asked in Europe of President Eisenhower, he will appear on European screens giving his answer.

Topics to be covered on "Town Meeting of the World" include the successes, problems and future of the European Common Market, the stability of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, the concept of a multilateral nuclear force, the question of German unity, and the prospects for any test-ban treaty coming out of negotiations beginning in Moscow during mid-July.

Ashland — Tourists and townspeople found the doors of the new Bard's Inn restaurant open for the first time last Wednesday, July 3. All-day service for the present and eventually 24-hour service is planned.

Owner of the ultra-modern restaurant is Cecil Halstead, formerly connected with the Denny Coffee Shop in Medford, and manager is Mrs. Pat Moultray, also of Medford.

A view of the city and surrounding mountains is afforded through the restaurant's slightly tinted windows. Booths and tables are in the main dining area, and a snack counter accommodates 66. In the adjoining private banquet room 35 to 38 persons can be served.

Pendant lights in amber and gold hang from the ceiling and upholstery is in deep turquoise. A triangular fireplace centers the room and walls are paneled in dark natural wood. The Shakespearean motif is used on menu covers and place mats.

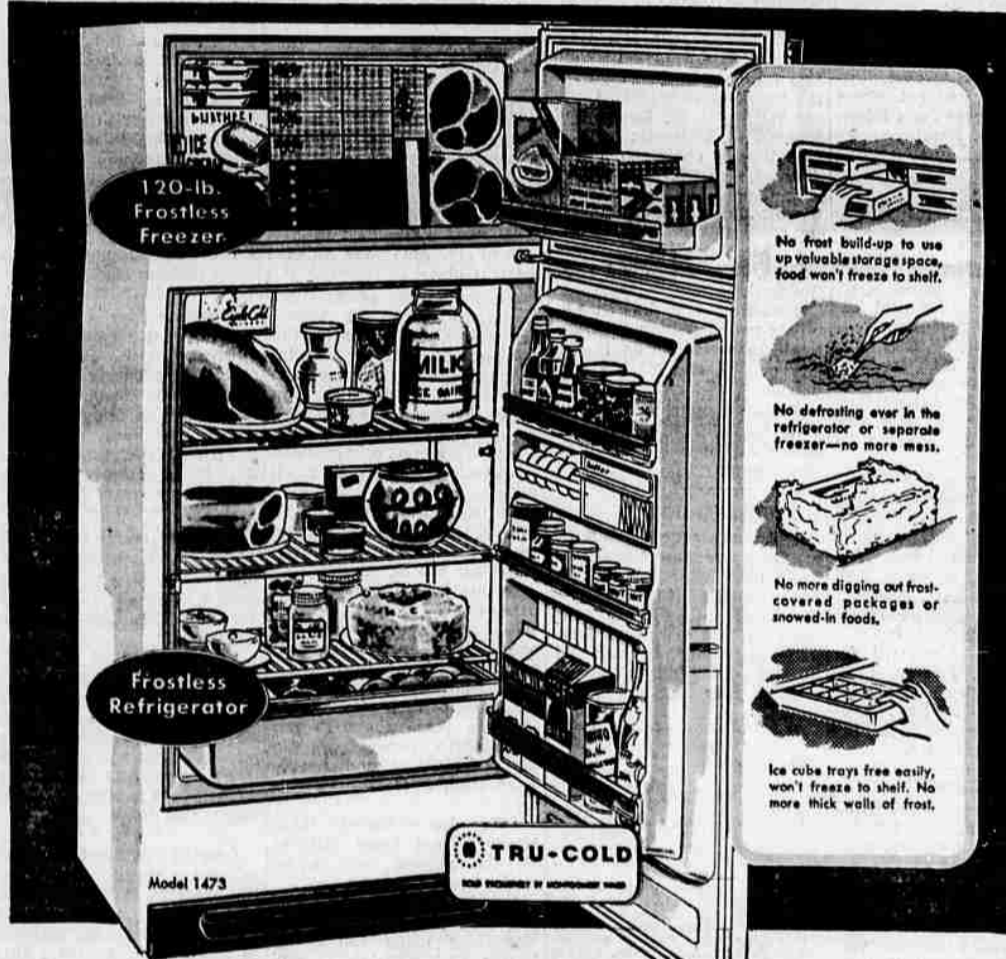

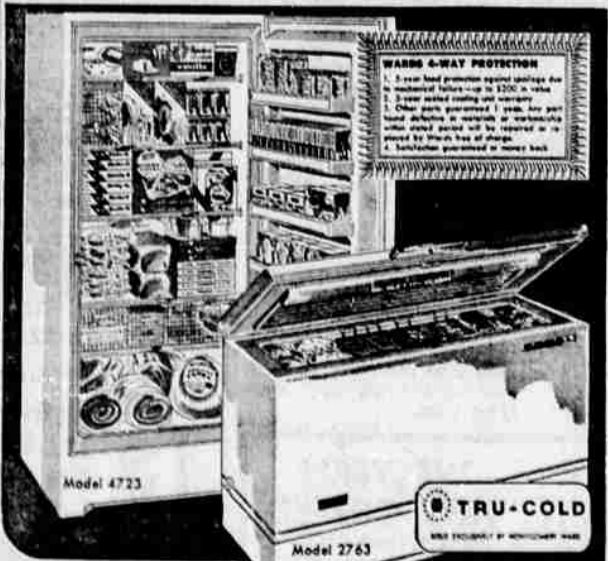

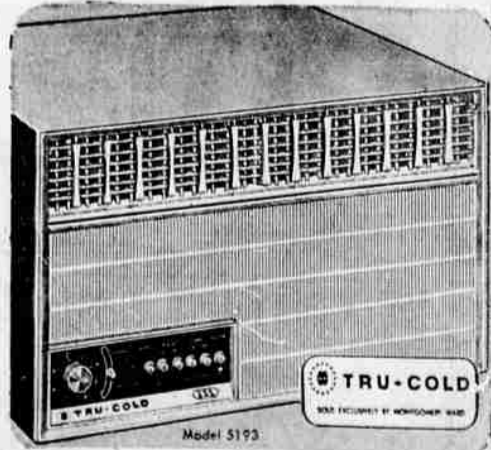
