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California Legislature Angered by Tax Bill Delay

Sacramento - (UPI) - A disgruntled legislature hoped today to receive Gov. Edmund G. Brown's tax reform proposal and prepared to start it moving immediately.

The lawmakers obviously were angered at the delay. Sen. Donald L. Grunsky (R-Watsonville) chairman of the key revenue and taxation committee, said flatly that the legislature would do the job if the governor would leave the members alone.

"This delay is costing the taxpayers money," Grunsky said. "It's just another example of the utter disregard for the taxpayers' money and legislative process we've been seeing from the administration."

Grunsky said his 11-member committee was prepared for an immediate hearing on the tax reform bills Tuesday, but they were not introduced.

The official explanation for this was that Sen. Virgil O'Sullivan, (D-Williams), author of the bills, had a previous engagement in his home district and was unable to attend Tuesday's legislative session.

But others saw it as a calculated delay and some sources hinted the delay was caused by an intra-senate dispute over splitting a personal withholding bill from a bill to eliminate the installment privilege used by professional persons.

During the regular session, which ended June 21, the governor's withholding bill included the installment provision. But this session, the two principles are split into separate measures.

KHRUSHCHEV MEETS WITH HUNGARIAN PREMIER
Moscow - (UPI) - Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev met today with János Kadar, Hungarian premier and Communist party chief, in his Kremlin office, the official news agency Tass said.

U.S. OPPOSES EXCLUSION OF SOUTH AFRICA
Monrovia, Liberia - (UPI) - G. Mennen Williams, U.S. Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs, said Tuesday the United States opposes exclusion of South Africa from the United Nations and other world bodies because of its racial policies.

PLANE FOUND IN NORTHWEST TERRITORIES
Edmonton, Alta. - (UPI) - The Royal Canadian Air Force says a plane which disappeared in the Northwest territories Sept. 29 with four men aboard was found Tuesday. The wreckage was sighted 105 miles west of Fort Simpson. One of the men aboard the plane was Northland Photographer Henry Buss, 66.

House Committee Clears Way for Power Link Bill

Washington - (UPI) - The House Interior Committee today approved a Senate-passed bill designed to pave the way for construction of transmission lines to connect federal power systems in the Pacific Northwest and California.

But as approved by the committee, the bill carried an amendment to require specific congressional approval for federal construction of lines outside the Pacific Northwest.

Way Cleared
The voice vote committee approval cleared the way for the bill to go to the House floor. If passed by the House as amended, the bill might not be acceptable to the Senate. That would require a conference committee to iron out differences.

The amendment was offered by Rep. Jack Westlund (R-Wash.).

Opposition to the bill in its present form was pointed up by a telegram from California Gov. Edmund G. Brown. He said the Westland amendment would make the bill unacceptable to California.

Brown and state water officials had supported the bill as helping to pave the way for sale of surplus Columbia river power in California where it could be used for pumping water.

The bill would give the Pacific Northwest first call on all firm power produced in the area and limit sales outside the region to so-called surplus or dump power.

Second Thoughts
The Westland amendment was overwhelming approved earlier but at least one Democrat who joined a solid block of Republicans in voting for it voiced second thoughts today.

Rep. Ed Edmonson (D-Okla.) expressed fear it might block construction of other transmission lines. He said he would seek to change the bill on the House floor so that the Westland amendment would not apply to construction determined by the President to be needed for national security reasons.

New York Again Scene of Violence Near Restaurant

An angry young Negro leader today promised Savannah, Ga., authorities "we'll probably come out fighting" unless the port city fathers agree to desegregation demands.

"To night we're pleading (for integration); tomorrow it'll be a different story," Benjamin Van Clarke, 19, shouted from atop a black casket in an address to more than 1,500 singing, clapping, shouting Negroes in front of City Hall.

Across the nation - from Maryland to Nebraska to California - the integration struggle continued to swell.

Violence in New York
In New York City, violence erupted again at the scene of a racial demonstration outside a restaurant, while in other areas tensions simmered down pending the outcome of peaceful bi-racial negotiations. In a few cases, courts came up with legal remedies.

Two white men were arrested on assault charges Tuesday night during a scuffle outside a restaurant in the Bronx where members of the Congress of Racial Equality started picketing last week end to protest alleged discriminatory hiring practices. Two patrolmen were injured slightly, and one of those arrested was treated for a head wound.

There have been fights and arrests at the drive-in each night or early morning since the picketing began despite heavy police patrols. At times, crowds of more than 1,000 spectators and hecklers have gathered in the immediate area.

Comments on Bill
An administration spokesman in Washington said President Kennedy's controversial public accommodations bill would envelop nearly all facilities-including "most hamburger stands." In Georgia a Ku Klux Klan grand dragon announced a gigantic rally July 20 in racially tense Savannah.

And in Portsmouth, N.H., Charles C. Sprague, a barber, was scheduled to be arraigned on a charge of refusing to cut a Negro's hair.

Police, including a specially trained riot squad, stood by in Savannah with tear gas grenades, gas masks and shotguns when the Negroes converged by car and on foot through the humid night to the City Hall shortly after midnight. Six demonstrators spearheaded the march shouldering a casket and a placard stating: "We'll bury segregation in here."

A bi-racial committee was scheduled to talk out racial differences later today.

Negro Leaders Meet
In Cambridge, Md., integration leaders announced a meeting to decide whether they would call off further Negro demonstrations until the U.S. Department of Justice begins mediation Friday on the town's desegregation problems.

The announcement followed another demonstration in the Maryland city by 150 persons. One white heckler was arrested after a fist fight.

Kansas City Bus Strike Pondered

Kansas City, Mo. - (UPI) - The city's bus drivers went on strike early today. Fifteen minutes later the walkout was postponed for 24 hours while the Kansas City Transit, Inc., considered a new contract proposal.

A strike would paralyze bus service in this metropolitan area of more than one million persons.

Federal mediator Harry O'Connell said the company's board of directors would consider a proposal designed to end the 21-month contract dispute.

The strike began as scheduled at 12:01 a.m. (est) today while Loren Hargus, Transit Workers Union president, O'Connell and company representatives still were in a negotiating session that began Monday.

Pickets went up at the bus barn and the 38 bus drivers who were working at the time were ordered to return to the barn.

But 15 minutes later, while most of the buses were still en route to the barn, Hargus ordered the drivers back to work and called off the strike for 24 hours.

He set a new "absolute deadline" of 12:01 a.m. Thursday for a strike, maintaining that only "solid agreement" could avert it.

Largest British Peacetime Guard Called To Protect Greek Royalty

Angry Woman Demonstrator Evades Police

London - (UPI) - Britain turned out its largest peacetime police guard today to protect visiting King Paul and Queen Frederika of Greece, but an angry woman demonstrator broke through the massive bodyguard and came within a few feet of the royal couple.

Sparse crowds watched quietly as the king and queen drove from Buckingham Palace at noon. They were outnumbered by thousands of police who stood shoulder-to-shoulder to prevent demonstrators from soaring again to the explosion point. Demonstrators have demanded the release of Greek political prisoners.

The royal motorcade, guarded by police in cars and on motorcycles, drove to Westminster Pier where the party boarded a cruise boat for a trip to the "City of London," the financial district where the king and queen were to receive new honors.

But as the royal couple left their car for the boat, a demonstrator made a desperate attempt to reach them. Mrs. Tony Ambatielos, wife of an imprisoned Greek union leader, broke through the barricade of police, darted past officers who tried to tackle her and almost made good her attempt before a burly plainclothesman brought her to earth.

She was carried away, kicking, by four men who held her until the royal couple left the area.

Mrs. Ambatielos, a prominent demonstrator at Greek royal appearances, touched off a major disturbance last April by leading a band of demonstrators in a rush at Queen Frederika, who was here on a visit. The demonstrators smashed through the queen's personal bodyguard and sent them running before police subdued them. She also was a leader of demonstrations Tuesday.

Carried Placard
This time Mrs. Ambatielos carried a small white placard protesting her husband's 16-year imprisonment.

The launch, trailed by an escort of other boats, brought the party up to the famous Tower of London, where deposed kings and queens have whiled away their time.

The king and queen then took a car to Guildhall for a luncheon. Hundreds of police officials were stationed inside and outside the building, with plainclothesmen on duty at all entrances.

Although Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip were not attending, Princess Marina met the Greek royal couple with Sir Ralph Ferring, lord mayor of London.

Massive Police Lines
Hundreds of city office workers gathered along the route to Guildhall, pressing against the massive police cordon.

A few isolated boos could be heard. Authorities took the added precaution of blocking the entrance of the streets leading to the Guildhall.

Tuesday's demonstration on the arrival of the royal couple almost reached the explosion point causing police to tighten their security measures.

Stock Market Prices Decline On Action of Railroad Unions

New York - (UPI) - Stocks moved lower on heavy trading today after rail unions rejected President Kennedy's plan to settle the railroad labor dispute.

Great Northern, Chesapeake and Ohio, Southern Pacific and Rock Island all were off fractions to nearly a point.

Trading was halted in Chrysler because of heaving selling. The last sale was off 1 1/2. There was no indication as to when the stock would reopen. Steels and other motors weakened. Some oils, cosmetics, metals and electronics moved lower. Getty Oil, U.S. Rubber, U. S. Smelting, National Cash, Polaroid and Control Data lost a point or more.
