

Greece Announces Liberation of Many Political Prisoners

Rails Pace Sizable Market Advance; Steel, Chemical Issues Mostly Firm

New York - (UPI) - Rails paced a sizable advance on the stock market today. Nortalk & Western and Great Northern featured a list of about a half dozen rail gainers which added large fractions. Motors also responded to the news with Chrysler, Ford and Parmelee Transportation up fractions to more than a point. Steels and chemicals were mostly firm. Electronics joined the general advance with IBM up roughly 3 and Texas Instruments, Control Data, and Litton up about 1 each. Beckman lost a large fraction.

Some metals, drugs and sugar stocks moved higher. Polaroid and Xerox rose around 4 and 2, respectively.

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Foreign Briefs

BODIES OF WAR II VICTIMS FOUND IN SINGAPORE
 Singapore - (UPI) - The bodies of 50 Australian soldiers apparently shot by the Japanese during World War II were unearthed in a mass grave here Wednesday. The exhumation was carried out by the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, which has been pressing Japan for compensation for relatives of thousands of Chinese massacred in Singapore during the war.

IRISH PARLIAMENT SUSTAINS PREMIER
 Dublin - (UPI) - The Irish Parliament sustained Premier Sean F. Lemass' government by a single vote Wednesday night on the issue of a controversial tax on all commodities. The vote was 72-71.

RADAR STATION TO BE BUILT ON FUJI
 Tokyo - (UPI) - Ten helicopters will airlift 340 tons of building materials to the top of 11,000-foot Mt. Fuji for construction of a radar station, the Japanese Meteorological agency said today. The station will be used for the detection of typhoons.

AMERICAN TO ATTEMPT DISTANCE SWIM
 San Sebastian, Spain - (UPI) - American distance swimmer Mary Margaret Revell of Washington, D. C., said today she will attempt a 28-mile swim to Biarritz tomorrow.

Action Follows Pressure Exerted By London Groups

London - (UPI) - Greece today freed a score of political prisoners under pressure from leftwing demonstrators who have harassed visiting Greek King Paul and Queen Frederika and even booted Britain's Queen Elizabeth in an unprecedented outburst. As leftists readied a massive new London demonstration tonight, the Greek government announced the "conditional release" of 20 prisoners held in connection with the bitter civil war with the Communists shortly after World War II. The Justice Ministry announcement said the prisoners would be freed under the "pacification law" which stipulates that such prisoners must abstain from subversive activities. At the same time, a British-born school teacher whose determined campaign to get her Greek husband freed sparked violent London demonstrations against Greek royalty, indicated she had received satisfaction after presenting a petition to the Greek monarch. Mrs. Betty Ambatielos was received at the Greek embassy in London by Greek Prime Minister Panayiotis Pipinelis. She presented a petition to King Paul for the release of her Communist husband, jailed for more than 13 years. After the 45-minute interview, Mrs. Ambatielos announced she was calling off her own one-woman demonstrations for the rest of the royal visit and said she thought her husband "will be freed within a few months." Mrs. Ambatielos has been dogging the movements of the visiting Greek royal couple since they arrived two days ago, battling police in a relentless attempt to present her demands in person. Last April, she led a group of demonstrators who chased Queen Frederika down a London street and forced her to take refuge in the apartment of an American actress. Mrs. Ambatielos' husband Tony, was sentenced to death then received a commutation to life imprisonment, for his role in helping the Communist guerrillas fighting in northern Greece in 1947. Friction over the prisoner issue reached dramatic proportions Wednesday night when Queen Elizabeth II was booed by a London crowd as she escorted the Greek royal couple to a gala theater show. The British queen appeared startled and astonished when the crowd outside the theater shouted jeers and insults. It was the first known time that Queen Elizabeth has been booed by her subjects. More disturbances were threatened before the Greek royal couple leaves for home Friday. One of Britain's major ban-the-bomb organizations called for a big rally in Trafalgar Square tonight in open defiance of an order barring such demonstrations against the visitors.

Gervais Student Officer of FHA

Kansas City, Mo. - (UPI) - Glenda Ziellinski, a senior at Gervais, Ore., Union High school this fall, was elected to one of 12 national offices Wednesday at the national Future Homemakers of America convention here. She was named national vice president of recreation for the FHA organization. Glenda, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Ziellinski of Brooks, Ore., will meet with representatives from the four geographical regions of the organization and guide the committee in researching and developing a wholesome recreational activity which would be applicable in local FHA chapters. Glenda is one of ten Oregon high school girls and two adult advisors here to attend the national conference which ends today. In October Glenda and her homemaking teacher at Gervais Union High school, Mrs. Betty Welty, will go to Washington, D.C., to attend a meeting of the national executive council of Future Homemakers of America.

Congress Uneasy Over Rail Arbitration Possibility

Washington - (UPI) - Congress, which has never legislated a solution to a national railroad labor dispute, was uneasy today over the prospect of having to do so now. Republicans and Democrats alike shuddered at the thought of imposing compulsory arbitration to settle the current labor-management clash over rail work rules. Federal seizure of the carriers likewise was viewed with alarm. Key legislators predicted a long debate, possibly extending beyond the week President Kennedy has given Congress after he submits his legislative recommendations on July 22. Railway management and unions have agreed to do nothing until July 29 that would cause a nationwide strike. There was no indication what the President would propose, but some congressional leaders said they believed it would seek only to settle the dispute at hand. Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen (Ill.) said: "I can see no other course than legislation - dealing with this one dispute. But we should understand that this will be putting a precedent on the statute books, and it may rise up to haunt us." Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (Minn.), assistant Senate Democratic leader, said Congress could "open up a Pandora's box of troubles" if it had to pass legislation to deal with the situation. Humphrey said a law requiring compulsory arbitration could seriously harm collective bargaining, and railroad seizures could lead to nationalization of the rail industry.

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
