Enrollment Has Opened For Renaissance Classes

Ashland—The Institute of Renaissance Studies, educational wing of the Oregon Shakespearean festival, opened its 1963 schedule Saturday with registration in Ashland. Formal enrollment for the institute's varied classes and events may be made from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Trinity house, North Second st., across from the Ashland post office.

The Ashland study program provides a broad list of intensive short-term courses in Renaissance life and thinking, framed to supply living background to the plays of Shakespeare. Each summer's curriculum is closely allied to the actual Ashland productions, and all institute students are able to vivify their research by regular attendance at rehearsal sessions. College credit for the courses is granted through both Stanford University and Southern Oregon college.

Participants may enroll for the entire summer, may take one of the short programs during a brief visit to the fes-

tival, or may audit, according to the institute secretary, Shannon Stewart. The 1963 schedule includes such courses as "Shakespeare—Drama of Manners"; "History—Sins of War"; "Roots of Tudor Drama"; "Philosophy—From Stones to Spheres"; "Renaissance Art—Portraiture"; and "Character Patterns—The Scholar."
