

# Rockefeller's Attack on 'Radical Right' Seen Challenge

## California Solons Move On Tax, Revenue Proposals

Sacramento — (UPI) — After a non-productive first week, the California Legislature began to move today on Gov. Edmund G. Brown's twin tax and revenue programs.

The revenue proposal was set for a morning hearing of the Senate Revenue and Taxation Committee — its first test of the special legislative session.

But also before the committee, dominated by Democrats, was a Republican-sponsored compromise designed to get the state through the current fiscal year without added taxes.

Meanwhile, the Senate Finance Committee scheduled its first formal hearing on the Democratic governor's plan to augment the state budget by \$112 million.

Sen. Virgil O'Sullivan (D-Williams), picked by the governor to author the revenue program, so far has declined to introduce one major bill — a measure to free 840,000 small taxpayers from any state income tax.

When the Republicans discovered O'Sullivan's reluctance, they moved quickly. Assemblyman Robert Monaghan (R-Tracy) announced he would introduce the bill. The measure would exempt single persons who would pay less than \$5 and married couples who would pay under \$10 from the state's personal income tax.

The new revenue proposals are nearly identical to those turned aside during the six-month general session of the legislature, which ended June 21 in a nightmare of a logjam during the final two hectic days.

Washington — (UPI) — Supporters of Sen. Barry Goldwater today interpreted as a challenge New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's attack on the GOP's "radical right."

Rockefeller, a possible GOP presidential candidate in 1964, said Sunday his party was being threatened by what he described as a growing subversion from the "radical right lunatic fringe." Rockefeller also cautioned against abandoning northern industrial areas in order to concentrate on getting the southern vote.

Such a plan would be disastrous, he said. He did not mention Goldwater, a conservative favorite for the GOP nomination, by name but his inference appeared clear.

Mrs. Ione F. Harrington, Republican national committee-woman from Indiana and co-chairman of the new draft Goldwater committee, said today she believed Rockefeller's statement was "probably a prelude to the national governors' conference next week."

Rockefeller has announced that he plans to introduce a strong civil rights resolution at the conference. Previous attempts to put the governors on record with similar resolutions have resulted in a southern governors' talkathon that led to tabling of the resolutions.

## Sen. Goldwater's Draft Supporters Express Concern

Washington — (UPI) — A special presidential committee studying the facts in the railroad work rules dispute "hopefully" will submit its report Friday to President Kennedy, a Labor Department spokesman said today.

Railway company and union representatives met today to inform the panel of their concept of the issues. At a similar meeting Tuesday, the parties will outline for the panel their positions on the issues.

A closed session of the special committee will be held Wednesday and "the report to the President hopefully will be submitted on Friday," a spokesman said. This would be three days before the original target date.

The special committee was appointed by President Kennedy to make recommendations for a solution to the deadlock over new work rules. Kennedy intends to use the committee's report as a basis for proposals to Congress next Monday to end the dispute.

The railroads have agreed to postpone until July 29 imposition of new work rules which eventually would eliminate the jobs of 37,000 firemen on diesel locomotives. The unions have rejected all proposals for arbitration of the dispute, saying most of the firemen are needed as a safety measure.

Chances that both sides would settle the dispute without outside help were dim. Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz said Sunday both railroad management and the five operating unions were assuming that the government or Congress would settle it and "there is no affirmative attempt" to break the deadlock.

Wirtz said there still were "all manners of procedures" that could be used for settling the dispute short of compulsory arbitration.

He said "every single proposal which has been made in this case has been immediately labeled as compulsory arbitration." But he said this
