

Rep. Duncan Scores On ACA Evaluation

Washington - (AP) - Americans for Constitutional Action Wednesday gave perfect ratings to three freshman senators and 19 House members for their voting record in the first six months of the 88th Congress.

All were Republicans. Two senators and 24 representatives, all Democrats, drew zeros.

The organization evaluated the voting records of 12 new senators and 67 freshmen representatives on a number of issues.

The canvas top of the shell is being made by Carl Burk of Burk Awning company, and all the lighting for the building and grounds is being handled by Ben Trowbridge Jr., Trowbridge Electric, with the help of employees from P&L.

Lumber Donated
All lumber required for the construction of the pavilion and adjacent storage facilities has been given by Alley Lumber, Double Dee Lumber, Elk Lumber, Kogap, McGrew Bros., Sawmill, Medco, Olson-Lawyer Lumber and Timber Products and hauled to the site on a truck furnished by Mitchell Brothers. Cable for the canopy support was given by Cal-Ore Machinery, and hardware will be available from Hubbard Brothers.

In conjunction with preparations for the coming festival, Ryan Outdoor Advertising will prepare the billboards and Jim Tucker of Tucker Sno-Cat Corporation will clear an area of his property on the corner of California and Oregon sts. in Jacksonville to give ample free parking space for those attending the concert.

Cordele, Ga. - (AP) - Mac Hyman, 41, author of the satirical book "No Time for Sergeants" died Wednesday night of an apparent heart attack.

Hyman, who lived here with his wife and three children, was stricken at his home. He was rushed to the Crook County hospital where he died a few minutes after arrival.

Hyman wrote "No Time for Sergeants" shortly after returning from service as an Air Force lieutenant in World War II. The book was made into a Broadway play and a motion picture. Actor Andy Griffith starred in both.
